## **CURRENT MEMBERSHIP**

### Dennis Byrne - District I


fishing, gardening, and exploring the outdoors with her family. She remains deeply engaged in her community and is committed to environmental and wildlife stewardship.

## WHAT WE DO....

Our commission cooperates with Game Wardens and the District Attorney's Office to ensure successful prosecutions of Fish and Game code violations and collection of resultant fines.

Revenues accrued to the county from Fines, Forfeitures and Penalties budgeted for FY 25/26 totals \$8,500.

Based on FY 24/25 actuals the Commission is requesting an additional \$13,420 to support funding Youth Fishing Derbies and fish & wildlife projects (note the total amount in the approved budget for FY 25/26 is \$32,323 with additional Fund Balance of \$10,403)




