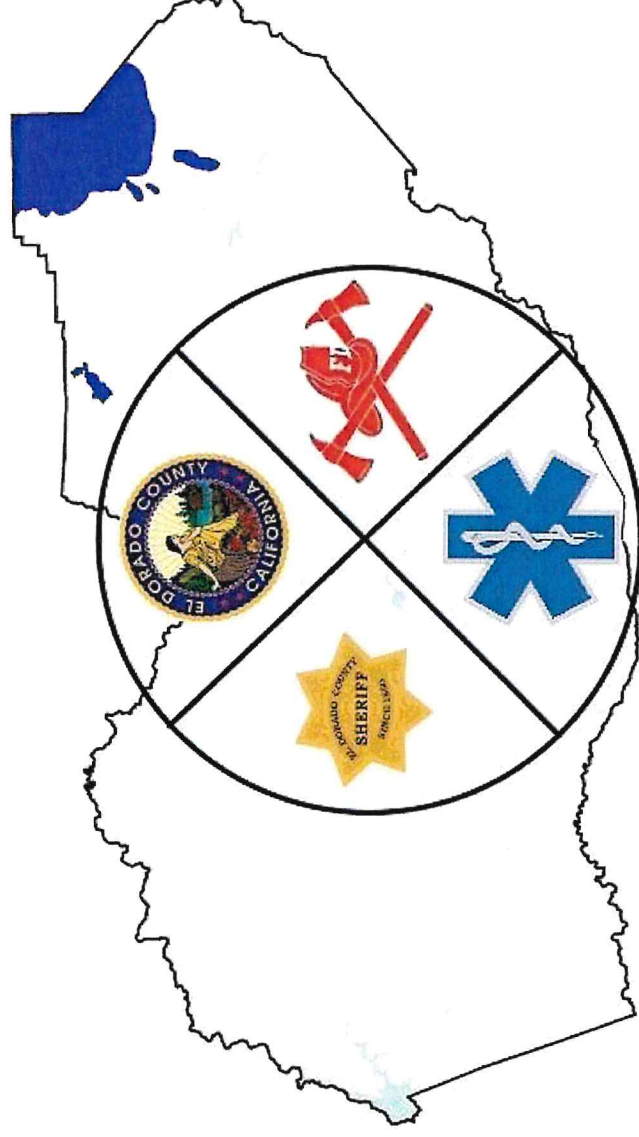

OES Planning



- Emergency Operations Plan - Reviewed every 3 years
- Local Hazard Mitigation Plan - Reviewed every 5 years

- Evaluation, reviews, and recommendations for public and private emergency response plans (government agencies, utilities, churches, schools etc.)

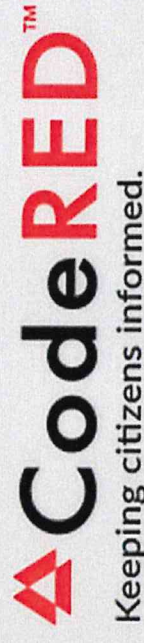




Emergency Operations Center (EOC)



- 24/7 On-call coverage for events or disasters
- Code Red Emergency Notifications
- Self-Registration Portal for cellular telephones
- Annual/Regular activation drills and events
 - Winter Storms
 - Pandemic
 - Wild Land Fires
 - Hazardous Material Spills
- Purchase and install equipment upgrades to EOC
 - Wireless telephones
 - Interoperability radio equipment
 - Audio/Visual equipment

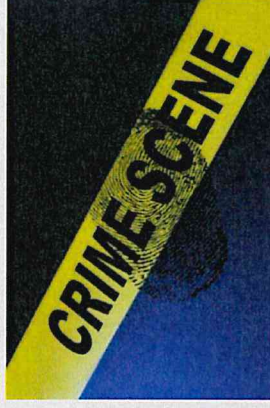

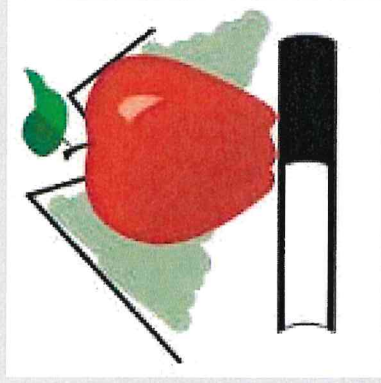

Terrorism



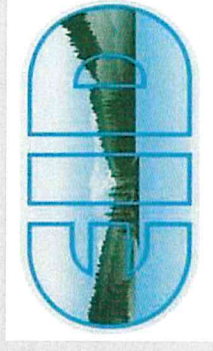
- Terrorism Liaison Officer Coordinator (TLOC)

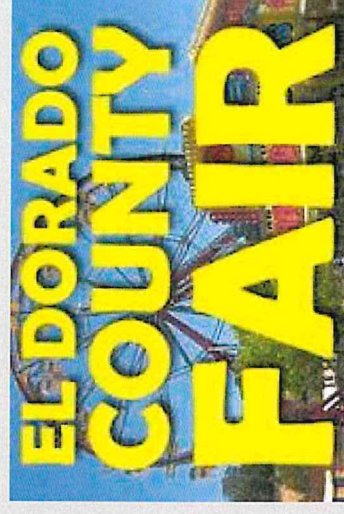

Volunteer and Resource Management



- Search and Rescue (SAR)
- Funding
 - General Fund
 - Title 3 Monies
- Staffing:
 - 365 / 24 / 7 On–Call Coverage
 - 3 Primary Coordinators West Slope; 1 Primary Coordinator SLT; 7 Secondary Coordinators
 - 100+ call-outs per year
 - 10-15 Mutual aid responses per year through out Northern Ca.



Search and Rescue Training



- SAR Academy
- Monthly Training for specialized teams:
 - Management
 - Ground, K9, Cliff, Swift-Water
 - OHV
 - Mounted
- Summer and Winter Full-Scale Exercises
- Monthly Meetings
 - All SAR
 - El Dorado Search and Rescue Council (ESARC)
 - Quarterly Statewide SAR Coordinators Meetings at Cal-OES





Search and Rescue Administration



- Approximately 180 active volunteers
- SAR mission reports
- Personnel issues
- Accident / Injury reports and investigations
- Recruitment / Application process / Background investigation
- Policy and procedure reviews and updates



OES / SAR Equipment



- OES / SAR Vehicles:
 - SUV 4x4 with specialized radios and equipment – Deputy assigned
 - Pick-up truck 4x4 with specialized radios and equipment– Deputy assigned
 - SAR Rescue truck 4x4 crew cab with specialized SAR Mgmt. and medical equipment – For West-Slope volunteers
 - SAR Rescue truck 4x4 with specialized Cliff and Swift Water rescue equipment – For West-Slope volunteers
 - SAR Rescue Truck 4x4 crew cab with specialized equipment – For Tahoe volunteers



OES / SAR Equipment

- Snow Cat with trailer - West Slope
- Snow Cat with trailer - Tahoe
- Snow mobiles with trailer - Tahoe





OES / SAR Equipment



- SAR Trailers:
 - SAR cargo trailer – Owned by ESARC and maintained by the Sheriff's Office for field Incident Command Post (ICP) operations
 - 3 Portable generators on trailers – For emergency shelters:
 - 50 KW - Fairgrounds
 - 50 KW - Fairgrounds
 - 25KW - OES Storage Bay



OES / SAR Equipment



- OES Communication Van:
 - Multi-band radio interoperability
 - Satellite communications
 - Desktop computer work stations
 - Multiple cellular phone lines and wireless data router
 - Portable hand held radio cache
 - Multi-channel dispatch console





OES / SAR Equipment



- Additional specialized equipment carried and maintained by Deputy Coordinators for emergency response:
 - Portable VHF & UHF radio cache
 - Portable cross-band mobile radios with portable antennas
 - GPS, satellite phone, digital camera, video camera
 - Laptop computers with data card
 - Fire personal protective equipment
 - Overnight survival pack with equipment and supplies, snowshoes
 - Portable generators with light stands
 - FLIR night vision
 - Electronic signal detection equipment for aircraft
