My name is Justin Boyd, I have worked and lived in the Lotus area since 1994 when I became a raft guide straight out of high school. I have been a business owner at Marcos Cafe since 2007 and employed over 200 local people during that time. At the old location at 7221 Hwy 49, we survived the bridge construction, road realignment, which was a difficult Summer of dust and traffic control. In the end we praised the new sidewalk and safety for pedestrians from town and over the river.

Now located at 986 Lotus Road we have new challenges. People constantly drive 55 down the road from the bridge (in a 35 zone) with absolutely no safe spots for people to walk or ride as the edge of the road crumbles into broken pavement and rocks. This multi-use trail would be such an amazing addition to our community, for locals and visitors alike. I believe it will greatly increase local foot traffic from park to park and to the local businesses in town. These kinds of projects will create long lasting positive results as well as an increase in tourism, health and safety.

I have included some photos below of the fun ride we helped to put together from last week 6/12/25 from the Coloma Community Market in Marshall Gold State Park to Henningsen Lotus Park. We unfortunately had to tell a mother and her children not to join as the current road conditions are not safe for families. We will continue to do these fun rides and build up support until we see the changes needed to make this a safe journey for all to take. It is just a short distance between the parks but a huge part of the history of this area, and a magnet for families and visitors alike to enjoy the river valley and all it has to offer.




