











Hot Dots Community Polling





TOTAL BY SUPERVISOR DISTRICT




Community Chooses Top 3 Health Issues Combined Results

Race/Ethnicity Comparison to County Population




Community Chooses Top 3 Health Issues Combined Results


Age Comparison to County Population




Population/Policy-Based

Seek or support programs/policies designed to address one or more of the prioritized root causes to improve population health

Focus Areas:


- Community Health Workers
- Transportation
- Digital Inclusion
- Community Education--focused on the 4 root causes
- Access to Therapy Services
- Policies that address health equity/vulnerable populations/health disparities



Population/Policy-Based

Desired Outcomes:

- Continuum of Community Health Workers who have access to regularly updated resources in the community
- Improved access to services for vulnerable populations by improved connection to expanding transportation services and better use of technology when transportation isn't available
- Improved connection to expanding network of Broadband/Internet Hubs
- Two Community Education Campaigns on parenting and risk reduction (specific outcomes determined after topics identified)
- Decrease financial and access barriers to therapy services
- Improved health equity policy and advocacy skills among stakeholders


Parenting Support

Address root causes, health inequity and priority health issues through a focus on early intervention and safe, stable, nurturing parent-child interactions

Focus Areas:

- New Parents
- Population-based parenting program
- Home-based interventions






Parenting Support

Desired Outcomes:

- 1. Continuum of parenting education and support
 - Improved access to and participation in parenting programs
 - Expanded access to home-based parenting programs
- 2. Decreased stigma around parenting programs participation
- 3. Improvements in child wellbeing indicators
 - ACEs scores
 - Preventive health visits
 - Dental visits
 - ED visits for preventable illnesses and injuries
 - Immunization rates
 - Others as determined by Public Health Epi team




Risk Reduction

Strengthen the mental health and substance abuse response system by focusing on upstream interventions especially among parents and youth

Focus Areas:

- Substance misuse and overdose prevention
- Improving parenting skills for populations in dual treatment of mental health and substance use disorder
- Youth K-12



Risk Reduction

Desired Outcomes:

- 1. Improved access to mental health and substance abuse services/programs
- 2. Improved access to perinatal residential treatment and recovery
- 3. Improvements in mental health and substance abuse data
 - Decrease in Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome
 - Decrease in overdose deaths
 - Improvement in BRFSS/CHIS mental health indicators
 - Other indicators identified by HHSA
- 4. Expanded parent-infant mental health program
- 5. Reduced stigma around risk reduction programs


