

First 5 El Dorado Commission

Mission

First 5 El Dorado Children and Families Commission is committed to strengthening children birth through five and their families by promoting and enhancing comprehensive early childhood systems.

- Proposition 10 in 1998, tobacco tax dollars.
- Nine member Commission appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- Declining revenue source, \$1M annually.
- Expectant parents and families with children ages 0 through 5 years.
- Strategic Plan to improve child health and development, strong families, and early childhood systems.
- Required to have annual external audit and evaluation reports.





Evaluation



2015-16 School Readiness Report:

- More than half (55%) of the county's licensed early care and education providers are engaged in High 5 for Quality (82 of 148).
- The majority of First 5 participating children (96%) had a well-child exam in the 12 months. The percentage of children participating in First 5 services that received preventive dental care within the last six months totaled 39%.
- Thirty-nine (39%) of First 5 participating families report their child had a developmental screen in the previous 12 months.
- Two thirds (65%) of First 5 participating families report reading to their children every day, a total of 82% report reading to their children at least 5 days a week.



First 5's role in implementing Community Hubs will be to serve as the backbone organization, linking with other stakeholders to provide prevention services for families with children birth through 5.

Together, the Commission and other stakeholders will:

- Invest in core early childhood services while committing to leverage additional resources
- Lead the implementation of Community Hubs across the five Supervisorial Districts in collaboration with key stakeholders
- Act as a good steward of public funds, seeking to maximize resources and reduce duplication of efforts
- Recognize the need focus on core early childhood services and to define roles
- View the Hubs as an organizational tool to facilitate prevention services using a holistic, family-centered approach.










Community Hubs

Community Hubs are partners who provide prevention and early intervention strategies within our libraries and neighborhoods to help strengthen communities and families in EDC.









 Decentralize prevention and early intervention services at libraries and schools.

- Hub Team:
 - Community Health Advocates (Outreach)
 - Family Engagement Specialist (Parenting)
 - Early Childhood Specialist (Literacy)
 - Public Health Nurse (Preventive Health)
- Build upon family assets, rather than wait for an emergency.
- Offer active skill building, connection to resources and case management.

WHAT WILL I FIND AT A HUB?

HEALTH

Keeping your family safe and healthy can have its challenges. Learn ways to strengthen your family's health by connecting with staff or participating in Hub activities. Health activities at the Hub include finding insurance, doctors, dentists, classes, and events. Health staff at your Hub are available by appointment to meet with you, provide individual assessment, and assistance.

LITERACY

You are your child's first and most important teacher. At Hubs, you can meet other families and support your child building strong language skills. Early literacy activities at the Hub include story times, workshops, and play centers. Connect with one of the Early Childhood Literacy Specialists at your Hub to



PARENTING

Your child's behavior is linked to their development. Community Hubs provide activities to better understand and support your child's development such as playgroups, developmental screenings, parenting supports, and resources. Family Engagement Specialists are available by appointment to meet with you at your Hub.







■ VISIT THE DOCTOR REGULARLY: Monitor your child's physical and emotional development to keep them healthy. ■ NURTURE YOUR CHILD: Strengthen your family by building positive relationships. ■ TALK, READ AND SING DAILY: Read every day to have a strong bond and build your child's brain.



Community Hubs: Status

Connecting vs. Referrals:

All families are invited and welcomed at Hubs to participate in early literacy, family engagement and health activities.

- Families can self assess and engage staff in active skill building as their child's first teacher.
- Referrals for individualized assistance can be made to Public Health Nursing as needed. 1 (800) 844-4491

Staff Development:

To promote consistency in service delivery, all Hub Staff will have opportunities for professional development.

Improved Child Health

- 1. Percentage of those mothers who gave birth who accessed prenatal care in the first trimester.
- 2. Number/Percent of children ages 0-5 receiving timely well-child visits.
- 3. Number/Percent of children ages 6-18 receiving timely well-child visits.
- 4. Number/Percent of program parents report taking their child (ages 1 through 5) to the dentist every six months.
- 5. Number/Percent of program parents report taking their child (ages 6 and older) to the dentist every six months.
- 6. Number/Percent of parents that reported monitoring their child's development (one year ago or less.)

Improved Child Development: Number/Percent of licensed early care and education programs are tier 3 and above on the quality rating matrix.

Improved Family Functioning

- 1. Number/Percent of parents report that they or another family member reads with the child each day.
- 2. Number/Percentage of Parents of children birth through 5 use positive strategies to guide and teach their child:
 - Number/Percent of families with improvement in the Nurturing and Attachment category of the Protective Factors domain.
 - Number/Percent of families with improvement in the Social Emotional Support category of the Protective Factors domain.
 - Number/Percent of families with improvement in the Concrete Support category of the Protective Factors domain.
 - Number/Percent of families with improvement in the Family Functioning and Resiliency category of the Protective Factors domain.
 - Number/Percent of families with improvement in the Child Development and Knowledge of Parenting category of the Protective Factors domain.


EDC Maternal, Child, Adolescent Health Five Year Strategic Plan Goals, Access to Health Care, 2015.

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- Broad Community Support.


Creating a Hub Network
