ITEM 1. Proposed Project

This proposed project is for El Dorado County Sheriff's Office (EDSO) to provide law enforcement services to theRubicon Trail, which is located between Georgetown, California and Homewood (Lake Tahoe) in theCalifornia Counties of El Dorado and Placer. It is generally accepted to be the first and oldest recreational off- highway vehicle (OHV) trail in the United States. It is now widely renowned and considered one of the top ten four-wheeling destinations in the world. The portion of the trail within El Dorado County is a designated unpaved county road that is bordered by both United States Forest Service (USFS) and private properties. The Rubicon Trail has recently been deemed a legal easement through the El Dorado National Forest. It has received a significant level of attention from various user groups, the State Water Resources Board, and environmental conservation interests over thelast several years. El Dorado County has established a model OHV trail management and law enforcement program, setting an example throughout the state and nation.

EDSO is the primary law enforcement agency in the project area, and is responsible for all state and local law enforcement, and criminal investigation. EDSO works with the USFS enforcing laws of trespass, fire permits, resource damage, etc. We partner with California State Parks Officers to coordinate comprehensive law enforcement services. While California Highway Patrol would normally be the primary agency to enforce vehicle code violations and investigate traffic accidents, they do not have the resources to access the trail. Therefore, EDSO takes the lead role in traffic enforcement as well. EDSO will continue to provide support to other agencies and organizations in compliance with the Cleanupand Abatement Order affecting the project area since 2009.

Deputies assigned to the Rubicon Trail focus enforcement efforts on violations that affect the health and safety of trail users, along with violations that impact the surrounding environment. EDSO, USFS, and California State Parks have recently entered into an MOU for Law Enforcement services on the Rubicon Trail. Deputies assist USFS, California State Parks, and the El Dorado County Department of Transportation (DOT) with educating the public about the history of the trail, rights of way, trespass issues, code violations, safety, sanitation, pollution, and resource conservation. EDSO Deputies will continue to inform and educate the public about responsible use of the Rubicon Trail.

Due to the remote location and extreme terrain of the project area, response times for a normal Patrol Deputy couldvary from two to eight hours by vehicle, by foot, or by air depending on the location of the emergency. Last year we increased staffing from one Deputy to two full time Deputies. This year, we plan on continuing staffing a second deputy to partner with the first. Two deputies are required to ensure officer safety during enforcement activities due to the extremely extended response time of backup. The Rubicon Trail Patrol Deputies would reside in the project area during their work days to provide for quick and ready response to emergencies and other calls for service. State Parks Officers will be working on the Placer County portion of the trail with some overlap into El Dorado County.

Maintenance-intensive highly modified vehicles with trained operators are required to access the area with adequate staff and equipment to handle law enforcement tasks. EDSO currently has one modified 2007 Rubicon Patrol Jeep as the primary patrol vehicle. EDSO does have two ATV's in disrepair, purchased from previous grant funding that could be made serviceable as alternative emergency means of transportation. EDSO has submitted a proposal to Chrysler/Jeep Corporation requesting assistance with a donation of a 2014 Jeep Rubicon. Should we be successful in obtaining this donation, we would have a new patrol vehicle and a reliable back up jeep for patrol purposes.

The proposed project would provide equipment and staffing for a consistent law enforcement presence during the busy summer months, and the ability to provide periodic patrols and emergency response during the winter months.

ITEM 2. Project Coverage

The Rubicon Trail within El Dorado County includes approximately 14 miles of designated non-maintained county roadway consisting of extremely rugged terrain. The center of the roadway in some areas has been marked or is clearly delineated by the terrain on either side. It has been determined that in these areas, the county roadway extends 25ft on either side of the centerline. There are several areas where the trail is unmarked and unclear which has caused several variant routes. The Board of Supervisors approved the route on January 26, 2010 which closes several variant routes. The proposed project would provide patrol to the adopted Rubicon Trail and provide enforcement for the variant trail areas to insure compliance and enforcement when necessary. The Patrol Deputies would also assist USFS and State Parks with educationand enforcement in the areas surrounding and adjoining the Rubicon Trail.

ITEM 3. Describe the frequency of the patrols

Patrols by two Deputies would be conducted on the Rubicon Trail, generally working 12-hour days on Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays, from mid-May through October 2014. Holidays would be staffed with additional personnel as necessary, as well as special events such as Marlin Roundup, Cantina for the Con, DOT security details, or OHMVR Commission Tour requiring added law enforcement presence. Due to issues of off-season vandalism and resource damage that have been reported, EDSO will provide random weekend patrols during the winter months as well. Occasional winter patrols will send the messageto users that EDSO will have a law enforcement presence year-round, not just during the summer season.

ITEM 4. Deployment of Personnel

The project is requesting monies to staff two full-time Deputies working 40 hours per week (80 hrs/wk for both) from May through October, along with the described additional off-season patrols, and training. The Deputies would be assigned as a two-man "resident" Rubicon patrol unit, using the specially equipped Jeep Rubicon Patrol vehicle as their primary means of transportation. The project is also requesting monies to pay part time for a Sheriff's Sergeant for approximately 10 hours per week to provide for scheduling, records, maintenance of equipment and supervision.

In response to several complaints brought forward during Rubicon Oversight Committee (ROC) meetings along with hearings by the County Board of Supervisors regarding the status of the Rubicon Trail, additional patrols will be scheduled during periods of increased use. These additional patrols will be scheduled mid-week along with additional patrols during the nighttime hours to include overnight patrols. Winter patrols would also be added with this funding.

- 1. Identify areas with high priority law enforcement needs because of public safety, cultural resources, and sensitive environmental habitats, including wilderness areas and areas of critical environmental concerns:
 - El Dorado County currently remains under the 2009 Cleanup and Abatement Order for the entire project area. Areas of priority are Little Sluice and Buck Island; both directly bordering Desolation Wilderness. Because of the difficulty of accessing these areas, the irresponsible users tend to gravitate there. Problems with drinking alcohol while driving in these areas have increased dramatically over other more accessible areas. Water quality and sanitation remains a paramount concern at these locations, and users staying on the trail and using environmentally responsible practices is critical.
- Describe how the proposed Project relates to OHV Recreation and will sustain OHV Recreation, motorized offhighway access to non-motorized recreation, or OHV Opportunities associated with the Project Area:
 - As El Dorado County addresses the many issues on the trail, law enforcement is one of the primary resources needed to bring resolution. Consistent effective law enforcement and education is critical to ensure that this great recreation area remains open to all users. The current project provides law enforcement accessibility and presence, even in the most remote areas of the Rubicon Trail Project Area.
- 3. Describe the Applicant's formal or informal cooperation with other law enforcement agencies:
 - EDSO has an outstanding relationship with the USFS and California State Parks law enforcement. In past years, State Parks officers partnered with EDSO Deputies in an effort to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement service on the trail. This year the EDSO OHV Unit Rubicon Patrol Deputies will be coordinating enforcement efforts with State Parks Officers, working overlapping patrol areas to provide the most thorough coverage possible. An MOU was signed by all involved agencies with jurisdiction throughout the trail to delineate responsibilities for law enforcement, education, natural resource management, and trail maintenance.

Jeepers Jamboree contracts with EDSO for law enforcement services both on the trail and their private property during the two weekends each year the event is held. It is in addition to the resident Rubicon Patrol Deputies that continue their assignment to patrol the trail. The Jamboree is issued a parade permit and additional Deputies are assigned to the event and stay on site over the course of the two to four-day event periods.

- 6. Describe the Applicant's OHV law enforcement training program including how the training program educates personnel to address OHV safety and natural and cultural resource protection:

EDSO, USFS, and State Parks hold several meetings throughout the year to discuss violations, issues, and challenges encountered on the trail, and exchange information and ideas to improve our effectiveness. Each agency brings a different perspective to the table. This collaborative approach has proven to be very beneficial to the program. Officers have to be creative and use unconventional approaches to law enforcement in this unique and remote patrol environment. The sharing of these tactics and various approaches serves not only to improve the individual officers, but to strengthen public perception and support of the program.

Assigned deputies attend a day of training in OHV laws sponsored by the OHMVR, in addition to ongoing skills training with the OHV Unit Supervisor in the field. by foot, or by air depending on the location of the emergency. Last year we increased staffing from one Deputy to two full time Deputies. This year, we plan on continuing staffing a second deputy to partner with the first. Two deputies are required to ensure officer safety during enforcement activities due to the extremely extended response time of backup. The Rubicon Trail Patrol Deputies would reside in the project area during their work days to provide for quick and ready response to emergencies and other calls for service. State Parks Officers will be working on the Placer County portion of the trail with some overlap into El Dorado County.

Maintenance-intensive highly modified vehicles with trained operators are required to access the area with adequate staff and equipment to handle law enforcement tasks. EDSO currently has one modified 2007 Rubicon Patrol Jeep as the primary patrol vehicle. EDSO does have two ATV's in disrepair, purchased from previous grant funding that could be made serviceable as alternative emergency means of transportation. EDSO has submitted a proposal to Chrysler/Jeep Corporation requesting assistance with a donation of a 2014 Jeep Rubicon. Should we be successful in obtaining this donation, we would have a new patrol vehicle and a reliable back up jeep for patrol purposes.

The proposed project would provide equipment and staffing for a consistent law enforcement presence during the busy summer months, and the ability to provide periodic patrols and emergency response during the winter months.
