Dear Members of the Board,

Concerning 4-7-26 BOS Agenda Item #5, File #26-0426 Mosquito Fire Settlement:

The Mosquito Fire's impact on the Volcanoville area of District 4 was deep and widespread. Many people lost their homes and our roads and surrounding lands suffered severe damage. While some recovery has occurred, much of the land remains a stark reminder of the devastation and heartbreak our community has endured. The fire serves to remind us how vulnerable we are in Volcanoville and reinforces our need for safer roads, fire safe landscape improvements, and our need for a viable secondary ingress/egress route, as well as a landing area for emergency air assets.

For several years, we have been working with County DOT, Supervisor Parlin, the Georgetown Fire Department, and the Eldorado National Forest to address these issues. We appreciate the repairs DOT has made; however, the lack of available funding has prevented meaningful gains.

Our roads remain in a degraded state, our long-neglected drainages are clogged, and we continue to face the very real risk of losing our only access route to storm damage—as occurred when the road washed out several years ago.

For these reasons, we respectfully ask that the remaining Mosquito Fire Settlement funds be fully allocated to Volcanoville, the area most impacted by the Mosquito Fire, for critical road and safety improvements, including:

Substantial resurfacing on the entire road.

Widening the road where feasible to improve safety and emergency access.

Clearing and improving drainages, particularly in areas where no work has been done for many years.

Exploring and advancing the development of a secondary ingress/egress route.

Developing a helicopter landing area in Donaldson Park (discussions with the national Forest Service are currently underway.)

Additional removal of hazard trees left standing after the fire where no funding currently exists. Consideration of special funding for improvements and seasonal staffing of the Georgetown Fire Department's Station 63 in Volcanoville during peak fire season.

Thank you for your time and consideration of these critical needs for our community.

District 4 Supervisor Lori Parlin has alerted the Volcanoville community that the Board of Supervisors will soon decide how to allocate the remaining PG&E Mosquito Fire settlement funds. As a long time member of this community, I ask the monies remain in our area for repairs and clean up from that fire.

We strongly believe the \$8.5 million still available should be spent within the Mosquito Fire footprint not . Where the funds were allocated to be used. Please be advised that our community does not want you to move this remaining amount into the General Fund Disaster relief account where it would be used outside of our fire footprint. There is a lot of work to be done on the road, the shoulders & turnouts, as well as the remaining dead burnt forest behind our homes. If EDC releases that money, for our repairs, the work will never be done. It should be spent in our community, not in El Dorado Hills and elsewhere.. Please do not discount us, the voting & tax paying constituents on Volcanoville Rd as you consider your vote. Please keep the remaining settlement funds invested in OUR community where we are directly impacted by the fire. Not only do we need the many road repairs, and fire-safety improvements like turnouts and wider shoulders, but we have been trying to organize a helicopter landing zone, and a second exit route for years now.

You know very well that the individual homeowner does not have the necessary funds or mechanical resources to make these repairs on our own. Large fire equipment broke down the asphalt integrity on the apron of my private road, now it has degraded farther and large potholes have developed. It needs an actual repair with hot asphalt, not loose gravel under a cold patch. The pile-aster at our entrance was pushed over and we can not possibly straighten it. The large trucks driving through our fragile roads left many road areas broken and damaged. The remaining burned , dead trees are still falling and are a definite safety hazard. We need your support & assistance to rebuild our damaged community. Please do not fail us.

This email is regarding File #26-0426 Mosquito Fire Settlement.

The Mosquito Fire changed Volcanoville in ways our community will carry for a long time. Many of our neighbors lost their homes, and our roads, hillsides, and forests were scarred in ways that are still visible every day. Even now, when we drive through the burn scar, we're reminded of how vulnerable our mountain community truly is — and how urgently we need safer roads, healthier drainages, fire-resilient landscapes, a reliable secondary way in and out, and a place for emergency air support to land when minutes matter.

We're grateful for the repairs DOT has done but without dedicated funding, the larger needs have remained out of reach. Our only access road is still in rough shape, and we're constantly reminded how easily we could lose our one way in and out access.

Because Volcanoville was the area most deeply affected by the Mosquito Fire, we respectfully ask that the remaining settlement funds be fully directed to the critical safety and recovery needs of our community, including but not limited to:

- Resurfacing the entire road to restore safe travel
- Widening the road where possible to improve emergency access
- Clearing and repairing drainages, especially in long-overlooked sections
- Advancing a secondary ingress/egress route for true emergency resilience
- Developing a helicopter landing area in Donaldson Park (active discussions with the National Forest Service are underway)
- Removing remaining hazard trees where no funding currently exists.

Volcanoville is a small community, but we show up for one another — during storms, during fires, and during the long recovery that follows. We're asking for your support so we can continue to keep our neighbors safe and strengthen the place we call home.

Thank you for your time and for considering these essential needs.
