It has come to our attention that the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors is considering a proposal to have the historic tracks removed from a portion of the Sacramento Placerville Rail Corridor, which is owned and governed by a multi-jurisdictional Joint Powers Agency.

The rail line is a historic resource, the value of which was recognized by the participating jurisdictions some 15 years ago, when the tracks and the right-of-way were sold by Southern Pacific, and the Joint Powers Agency was formed to buy and manage it. It was the hope that rail excursions on the corridor would enable future residents and tourists, adults and children, to appreciate and enjoy the unique rail heritage and the spectacular scenery on the line. There is nothing in the agreement that would prohibit other transportation uses of the corridor.

However, we understand that some trails advocates are proposing a trails-only use for the corridor.

Removal of the tracks would be an irreversible first step in this strategy. The track could never be replaced.

Not only could they not be replaced, they are a historic resource that is protected by state law.

We have observed that trail users can be contentious often among themselves, urging exclusive uses for pedestrians, or cyclists, or equestrians. Removing the tracks will not put an end to the contention.

For the above reasons, the Heritage Preservation League of Folsom strongly advises El Dorado County against removal of the historic tracks.
