Environmental Planning Services for the Shingle Springs El Dorado Class I Improvements Project #36109014

AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES #9315

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into by and between the County of El Dorado, a political subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY"), and HELIX Environmental Planning, Inc., a corporation duly qualified to conduct business in the State of California, whose principal place of business is 7578 El Cajon Boulevard, La Mesa, California 91942 (hereinafter referred to as "CONSULTANT").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, COUNTY has determined that it is necessary to obtain a consultant to provide environmental planning services for the Shingle Springs El Dorado Class I Improvements Project #36109014 (hereinafter referred to as "Project") for the COUNTY's Department of Transportation;

WHEREAS, CONSULTANT has represented to COUNTY that it is specially trained, experienced, is an expert, and competent to perform the special services described in ARTICLE I Scope of Work; that it is an independent and bona fide business operation, advertises and holds itself as such, is in possession of a valid business license, and is customarily engaged in an independently established business that provides similar services to others; and COUNTY relies upon those representations;

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the parties hereto that such services conform with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and ordinances applicable to the work, including compliance with prevailing wage rates and their payment in accordance with California Labor Code Section 1775;

WHEREAS, COUNTY has determined that the provision of such services provided by CONSULTANT are in the public's best interest and requires specialty skills and qualifications not expressly identified in COUNTY classifications, in accordance with El Dorado County Ordinance Code, Section 3.13.030(b), El Dorado County Charter, Section 210(b)(6) and/or Government Code Section 31000;

WHEREAS, on September 25, 2024, CONSULTANT was formally awarded competitive Request for Proposals (RFP) 24-0070 for environmental planning services for the Shingle Springs El Dorado Trail Class I Improvements Project #36109014;

NOW, THEREFORE, COUNTY and CONSULTANT mutually agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

Scope of Work: CONSULTANT is engaged in the business of doing the services and tasks required under this Agreement, including those services and tasks that are

identified in Exhibit A, marked "Scope of Work", incorporated herein and made by reference a part hereof, and those services and tasks that reasonably necessary for the completion of the work identified in the Scope of Work.

CONSULTANT shall, at CONSULTANT's own expense, furnish all personnel, subconsultants, equipment, tools, services, and materials necessary to perform various environmental planning services, in accordance with the Standards for Work set forth herein, and tasks required by this Agreement, including those services and tasks identified in Exhibit A, and those services and tasks that reasonably necessary for the completion of the work identified in the Scope of Work. CONSULTANT shall complete those services and tasks in accordance with Exhibit B, marked "Cost Estimate", incorporated herein and made by reference a part hereof.

COUNTY will issue one (1) official Notice to Proceed for the work specified herein, with the exception of Subtasks 6.4, 6.5 and Tasks 8, 9,10, and 11. A separate written Notice to Proceed will be issued for each of Subtasks 6.4, 6.5 and Tasks 8, 9,10, and 11 if COUNTY determines this work is required. No payment will be made for any work performed prior to the effective date of the notice to proceed.

COUNTY shall review CONSULTANT's progress at key points as specified in the Agreement. Milestone reviews shall be performed for the specific products and deliverables listed in the Agreement. Milestones may only be changed by written agreement (may consist of an email) between COUNTY's Contract Administrator, or designee, and CONSULTANT.

Funding from various local, state, and federal sources may be utilized to fund certain assignments to be performed under this Agreement and, as a consequence, the requirements of the funding agencies related to those grants will be incorporated herein below.

CONSULTANT's responsibilities for compliance with DBE requirements are described in ARTICLE XLIII, Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Considerations, and in ARTICLE XLIV, DBE Participation, herein.

Deliverables shall be submitted via electronic file and Consultant shall produce the file using Microsoft (MS) 365 applications (specifically, MS Word, MS PowerPoint, and MS Excel). Signed reports shall be submitted in Adobe portable document format (PDF). Electronic AutoCAD 2010 or AutoCAD Civil 3D 2010 format shall be used for submittal of plans or other similar documents as specified by COUNTY's Contract Administrator. All deliverables shall be submitted in the language, format and design that are compatible with and completely transferable to COUNTY's computer, and that are acceptable to COUNTY Contract Administrator. Newer versions of software may be used, and other types of software used for analytical purposes may be authorized if approved in advance of the submittal by County's Contract Administrator. Consultant shall submit all deliverables to COUNTY's Contract Administrator in accordance with completion time schedules identified herein. Failure to submit the required deliverables in the format required shall be grounds for termination of the Agreement, as provided in ARTICLE VI, Termination, herein.

CONSULTANT shall perform the services and tasks required under this Agreement in a safe, professional, skillful, and workmanlike manner. CONSULTANT is responsible for ensuring that its employees, as well as any subconsultants, if applicable, perform the services and tasks required under this Agreement accordingly.

All of the services included in this Article and Exhibit A are the responsibility of CONSULTANT, unless specifically described as a task or item of work to be provided by COUNTY. CONSULTANT shall be responsible for the supervision, administration and work performed by any subconsultant for services rendered under this Agreement.

ARTICLE II

Compensation for Services: For services provided herein, including all of the forms and reports required under the DBE provisions of this Agreement, and including the progress reports required by ARTICLE III, Progress Reports, below, COUNTY agrees to pay CONSULTANT in arrears. Payment shall be made within forty-five (45) days following COUNTY's receipt and approval of itemized invoices detailing services rendered.

For the purposes hereof, the billing rates shall be in accordance with Exhibit C, marked "Cost-Plus-Fixed Fee," incorporated herein and made by reference a part hereof.

Subconsultant's services, other outside services, and other direct costs including, at a minimum, materials, equipment, printing, special reproductions, and delivery charges, authorized herein, shall be invoiced at CONSULTANT's cost, without markup, for the services rendered. Rates and fees included in such direct costs will require prior authorization from COUNTY's Contract Administrator. Any invoices that include subconsultant services and/or other direct costs shall be accompanied by backup documentation to substantiate CONSULTANT's costs for the services being billed on those invoices.

Reimbursement for mileage and travel (i.e., overnight lodging, meals, parking, airfare, bridge tolls, and other per diem expenses) expenses for CONSULTANT and subconsultants, if applicable, shall not exceed the lesser of (1) the rates to be paid to COUNTY employees under the current Board of Supervisors Travel Policy at the time the mileage expenses are incurred; or (2) the rates authorized to be paid to rank and file state employees under the then current State of California Department of Human Resources rules. References to the State of California Department of Human Resources rates and CONSULTANT's responsibilities for cost differences and any overpayments are more fully described in ARTICLE VII, Cost Principles and Administrative Requirements, herein. Mileage and travel reimbursement rates apply to CONSULTANT and to any subconsultants authorized under this Agreement. There shall be no markups allowed on mileage and travel, for CONSULTANT or for any subconsultant. Any reimbursements for mileage and travel expenses will only be made if such expenses are included in Exhibit C. The total amount payable by COUNTY shall not exceed the amount agreed to in this Agreement, unless COUNTY's Contract Administrator and CONSULTANT amend this Agreement in writing and prior to the performance of the work.

For the purposes of budgeting the Tasks in Exhibit A, the billing amounts for each Task are identified in Exhibit B. In the performance of the scope of services to be provided under this Agreement, CONSULTANT may request to reallocate the expenses listed in Exhibit B among the various Scope of Work Tasks, Optional Subtasks and Tasks, mileage, and other direct costs, and subconsultants' tasks, subject to COUNTY Contract Administrator's prior written approval. In no event shall the total not-to-exceed amount of the Agreement, be exceeded.

In accordance with ARTICLE XII, State Prevailing Wage Rates, CONSULTANT shall provide COUNTY's Contract Administrator with certified payroll for applicable personnel for the period for which payment is requested and such certified payroll shall accompany each invoice submitted. The certified payroll shall contain information related only to the applicable project. No invoice shall be paid until the certified payroll is submitted. CONSULTANT shall keep payroll records in accordance with California Labor Code Section 1776.

ARTICLE III

Progress Reports: CONSULTANT shall submit written progress reports to COUNTY's Contract Administrator at intervals that are commensurate with the requirements of the items of work and tasks being performed and based upon a mutually agreeable schedule. At a minimum, CONSULTANT shall submit progress reports once per month. The reports shall be sufficiently detailed for COUNTY's Contract Administrator to determine if CONSULTANT is performing to expectations and is on schedule, to provide communication of interim findings, and to afford occasions for airing difficulties or special circumstances encountered so that remedies can be developed. COUNTY's review of these reports seeks to ensure that CONSULTANT's work meets a level of acceptability as determined by COUNTY's Contract Administrator, and CONSULTANT shall be required to modify its work as necessary to meet that level of acceptability as defined by COUNTY's Contract Administrator. Progress reports shall include the total number of hours worked by CONSULTANT and any authorized subconsultants and shall include descriptions of the tasks and work performed, including a description of any deliverables submitted during the reporting period and the anticipated tasks, work and deliverables proposed for the subsequent reporting period. Any invoices submitted by CONSULTANT for payment under the terms of this Agreement shall include copies of the progress reports that relate to the services being billed on those invoices.

ARTICLE IV

Performance Period:

- A. This Agreement shall go into effect upon execution, contingent upon approval by COUNTY, and CONSULTANT shall commence work after notification to proceed by COUNTY's Contract Administrator. The Agreement shall end three (3) years thereafter, unless extended by Agreement amendment.
- B. CONSULTANT is advised that any recommendation for contract award is not binding on COUNTY until the Agreement is fully executed and approved by COUNTY.

ARTICLE V

Allowable Costs and Payments:

- A. The method of payment for this Agreement will be based on actual cost plus a fixed fee. COUNTY will reimburse CONSULTANT for actual costs (including labor costs, employee benefits, equipment rental costs, overhead and other direct costs) incurred by CONSULTANT in performance of the work. CONSULTANT will not be reimbursed for actual costs that exceed the estimated wage rates, employee benefits, equipment rental, overhead, and other estimated costs set forth in the approved CONSULTANT's Cost Proposal, unless additional reimbursement is provided by Agreement amendment. In no event, will CONSULTANT be reimbursed for overhead costs at a rate that exceeds COUNTY's approved overhead rate set forth in the Cost Proposal. In the event, that COUNTY determines that a change to the work from that specified in the Cost Proposal and Agreement is required, the Agreement time or actual costs reimbursable by COUNTY shall be adjusted by Agreement amendment to accommodate the changed work. The maximum total cost as specified in Paragraph "H" of this Article shall not be exceeded, unless authorized by Agreement amendment.
- B. The indirect cost rate established for this Agreement is extended through the duration of this specific Agreement. CONSULTANT's agreement to the extension of the one (1) year applicable period shall not be a condition or qualification to be considered for the work or Agreement award.
- C. In addition to the allowable incurred costs, COUNTY will pay CONSULTANT a fixed fee of \$14,490.02. The fixed fee is nonadjustable for the term of the AGREEMENT, except in the event of a significant change in the scope of work and such adjustment is made by AGREEMENT amendment.
- D. Reimbursement for transportation and subsistence costs shall not exceed the rates as specified in the approved Cost Proposal.
- E. When milestone cost estimates are included in the approved Cost Proposal, CONSULTANT shall obtain prior written approval for a revised milestone cost estimate from COUNTY's Contract Administrator before exceeding such estimate.
- F. Progress payments will be made monthly in arrears based on services provided and allowable incurred costs. A pro rata portion of CONSULTANT's fixed fee will be included in the monthly progress payments. If CONSULTANT fails to submit the required deliverable items according to the schedule set forth in Article III, Progress Reports, COUNTY shall have the right to delay payment or terminate the Agreement.
- G. No payment will be made prior to approval of any work, nor for any work performed prior to approval of this Agreement.
- H. CONSULTANT will be reimbursed promptly according to California Regulations upon receipt by COUNTY's Contract Administrator of itemized invoices in duplicate. Invoices shall be submitted no later than thirty (30) calendar days after the

performance of work for which CONSULTANT is billing. Invoices shall detail the work performed on each milestone and each project as applicable. Invoices shall follow the format stipulated for the approved Cost Proposal and shall reference this Agreement number and project title. Final invoice must contain the final cost and all credits due COUNTY including any equipment purchased under the provisions of Article XI, Equipment Purchase and Other Capital Expenditures. The final invoice should be submitted within sixty (60) calendar days after completion of CONSULTANT's work. Invoices shall be mailed or emailed to COUNTY at the following address:

or to such other location as COUNTY directs.

- I. The total amount payable by COUNTY including the fixed fee shall not exceed \$192,900.94.
- J. For personnel subject to prevailing wage rates as described in the California Labor Code, all salary increases, which are the direct result of changes in the prevailing wage rates are reimbursable.

ARTICLE VI

Termination:

- A. 1.Termination by Default: If either party becomes aware of an event of default, that party shall give written notice of said default to the party in default (notice) that shall state the following:
 - 1) The alleged default and the applicable Agreement provision, and
 - 2) That the party in default has ten (10) days upon receiving the notice to cure the default (Time to Cure).

If the party in default does not cure the default within ten (10) days of the Time to Cure, then such party shall be in default and the party giving notice may terminate the Agreement, or any Task Order or Work Order issued under this Agreement, by issuing a Notice of Termination. The party giving notice may extend the Time to Cure at their discretion. Any extension of Time to Cure must be in writing, prepared by the party in default for signature by the party giving notice, and must specify the reason(s) for the extension and the date in which the extension of Time to Cure expires.

- 2. If COUNTY terminates this Agreement, in whole or in part, for default:
 - COUNTY reserves the right to procure the goods or services, or both, similar to those terminated, from other sources and CONSULTANT shall be liable to COUNTY for any excess costs for those goods or services. COUNTY may deduct from any payment due, or that may thereafter become due to CONSULTANT, the excess costs to procure from an alternate source.
 - 2) COUNTY shall pay CONSULTANT the sum due to CONSULTANT under this Agreement prior to termination, unless the cost of completion to COUNTY exceeds the funds remaining in the Agreement. In which case the overage shall be deducted from any sum due CONSULTANT under this Agreement and the balance, if any, shall be paid to CONSULTANT upon demand.
 - 3) COUNTY may require CONSULTANT to transfer title and deliver to COUNTY any completed work under the Agreement.
- 3. The following shall be events of default under this Agreement:
 - 1) Failure by either party to perform in a timely and satisfactory manner any or all of its obligations under this Agreement.
 - 2) A representation or warranty made by CONSULTANT in this Agreement proves to have been false or misleading in any respect;
 - 3) CONSULTANT fails to observe and perform any covenant, condition or agreement on its part to be observed or performed under this Agreement, unless COUNTY agrees, in writing, to an extension of the time to perform before that time period expires.
 - 4) A violation of ARTICLE XIII, Conflict of Interest.
- B. The maximum amount for which COUNTY shall be liable if this Agreement is terminated is the not-to-exceed amount of this Agreement.
- C. Bankruptcy: COUNTY may terminate this Agreement immediately in the case of bankruptcy, voluntary or involuntary, or insolvency of CONSULTANT.
- D. Ceasing Performance: COUNTY may terminate this Agreement immediately in the event CONSULTANT ceases to operate as a business or otherwise becomes unable to substantially perform any term or condition of this Agreement.
 - 1) Termination or Cancellation without Cause: COUNTY may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, for convenience upon thirty (30) calendar days' written Notice of Termination. If such termination is effected, COUNTY will pay

for satisfactory services rendered before the effective date of termination, as set forth in the Notice of Termination provided to CONSULTANT, and for any other services that COUNTY agrees, in writing, to be necessary for contract resolution. In no event, however, shall COUNTY be obligated to pay more than the total amount of the Work Order or the total amount of the Agreement, as applicable. Upon receipt of a Notice of Termination, CONSULTANT shall promptly discontinue all services affected, as of the effective date of termination set forth in such Notice of Termination, unless the Notice directs otherwise. In the event of termination, COUNTY reserves the right to take over and complete the work by contract or by any other means.

 Completion of Work: In the event of termination of the Agreement, for default or without cause, COUNTY reserves the right to take over and complete any work, service, or task by contract or by other means.

ARTICLE VII

Cost Principles and Administrative Requirements:

- A. CONSULTANT agrees that 48 CFR Part 31, Contract Cost Principles and Procedures, shall be used to determine the cost allowability of individual terms of cost.
- B. CONSULTANT also agrees to comply with Federal procedures in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards.
- C. Any costs for which payment has been made to CONSULTANT that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under 48 CFR Part 31 or 2 CFR Part 200 are subject to repayment by CONSULTANT to COUNTY.
- D. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement to the contrary, payments to CONSULTANT for travel and subsistence (per diem) and mileage expenses, if applicable, for CONSULTANT's staff or for subconsultant's claims for reimbursement shall not exceed the lesser of (1) the rates to be paid to COUNTY employees under the current Board of Supervisors Travel Policy in effect at the time the expenses are incurred; or (2) the rates authorized to be paid to rank and file state employees under the then current State of California Department of Human Resources rates. These rates may be found at http://www.calhr.ca.gov/employees/Pages/travel-reimbursements.aspx. If the rates invoiced are in excess of these authorized rates, then CONSULTANT is responsible for the cost difference and any overpayments shall be reimbursed to COUNTY upon demand. For the purposes of this Agreement, only mileage and travel expenses for CONSULTANT and for subconsultants, if applicable, shall be eligible for reimbursement in accordance with ARTICLE II, Compensation for Services, above.
- E. CONSULTANT and its subconsultants, if applicable shall establish and maintain accounting systems and records that properly accumulate and segregate funds received under this Agreement by line item. The accounting systems of CONSULTANT and all subconsultants shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), shall enable the determination of incurred costs at

interim points of completion, and shall provide support for reimbursement of payment vouchers or invoices.

ARTICLE VIII

Retention of Records/Audit: For the purpose of determining compliance with Public Contract Code Section 10115, et seq. and Title 21, California Code of Regulations, Chapter 21, Section 2500 et seq., when applicable, and other matters connected with the performance of the Agreement pursuant to Government Code Section 8546.7; CONSULTANT, subconsultants, and COUNTY shall maintain and make available for inspection all books, documents, papers, accounting records, Independent CPA Audited Indirect Cost Rate workpapers, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of the Agreement, including at a minimum, the costs of administering the Agreement. All parties shall make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the Agreement period and for three (3) years from the date of final payment under the Agreement. The state, State Auditor, COUNTY, Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), or any duly authorized representative of the Federal Government shall have access to any books, records, and documents of CONSULTANT and its certified public accountants (CPA) work papers that are pertinent to the Agreement and indirect cost rates (ICR) for audit, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and copies thereof shall be furnished if requested.

ARTICLE IX

Audit Review Procedures:

- A. Any dispute concerning a question of fact arising under an interim or post audit of this Agreement that is not disposed of by agreement shall be reviewed by COUNTY's Chief Fiscal Officer, Community Development and Finance Administration, Chief Administrative Office.
- B. Not later than thirty (30) days after issuance of the final audit report, CONSULTANT may request a review by COUNTY's Chief Fiscal Officer of unresolved audit issues. The request for review shall be submitted in writing.
- C. Neither the pendency of a dispute nor its consideration by COUNTY shall excuse CONSULTANT from full and timely performance in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- D. CONSULTANT and subconsultant contracts, including cost proposals and Indirect Cost Rates (ICR), may be subject to audits or reviews such as, at a minimum, a contract audit, an incurred cost audit, an ICR Audit, or a CPA ICR audit work paper review. If selected for audit or review, the Agreement, cost proposal and ICR, and related work papers, if applicable, will be reviewed to verify compliance with 48 CFR, Part 31 and other related laws and regulations. In the instances of a CPA ICR audit work paper review it is CONSULTANT's responsibility to ensure federal, state, or local government officials are allowed full access to the CPA's work papers including making copies as necessary. The Agreement, cost proposal, and ICR shall be adjusted by CONSULTANT and approved by COUNTY's Contract Administrator to conform to the audit or review recommendations. CONSULTANT agrees that individual terms of costs identified in the audit report shall be

incorporated into the Agreement by this reference if directed by COUNTY at its sole discretion. Refusal by CONSULTANT to incorporate audit or review recommendations, or to ensure that the federal, state, or local governments have access to CPA work papers, will be considered a breach of contract terms and cause for termination of the Agreement and disallowance of prior reimbursed costs.

- E. CONSULTANT Cost Proposal may be subject to a CPA ICR Audit Work Paper Review or audit by the Independent Office of Audits and Investigation (IOAI). IOAI, at its sole discretion, may review and/or audit and approve the CPA ICR documentation. The Cost Proposal shall be adjusted by CONSULTANT and approved by COUNTY Contract Administrator to conform to the Work Paper Review recommendations included in the management letter or audit recommendations included in the audit report. Refusal by CONSULTANT to incorporate the Work Paper Review recommendations included in the management letter or audit recommendations included in the Agreement and disallowance of prior reimbursed costs.
 - 1. During a Caltrans' review of the ICR audit work papers created by CONSULTANT's independent CPA, Caltrans will work with the CPA and/or CONSULTANT toward a resolution of issues that arise during the review. Each party agrees to use its best efforts to resolve any audit disputes in a timely manner. If Caltrans identifies significant issues during the review and is unable to issue a cognizant approval letter, COUNTY will reimburse CONSULTANT at a provisional ICR until a FAR compliant ICR {e.g. 48 CFR, part 31; GAGAS (Generally Accepted Auditing Standards); CAS (Cost Accounting Standards), if applicable; in accordance with procedures and guidelines of the American Association of State Highways and Transportation Officials Audit Guide; and other applicable procedures and guidelines is received and approved by A&I. Accepted rates will be as follows:
 - a. If the proposed rate is less than 150% the accepted rate reimbursed will be 90% of the proposed rate.
 - b. If the proposed rate is between 150% and 200% the accepted rate will be 85% of the proposed rate.
 - c. If the proposed rate is greater than 200% the accepted rate will be 75% of the proposed rate.
 - 2. If Caltrans is unable to issue a cognizant letter per paragraph E.1. above, Caltrans may require CONSULTANT to submit a revised independent CPAaudited ICR and audit report within three (3) months of the effective date of the management letter. Caltrans will then have up to six (6) months to review CONSULTANT's and/or the independent CPA's revisions.

- 3. If CONSULTANT fails to comply with the provisions of this paragraph E, or if Caltrans is still unable to issue a cognizant approval letter after the revised independent CPA-audited ICR is submitted, overhead cost reimbursement will be limited to the accepted ICR that was established upon initial rejection of the ICR and set forth in paragraph E.1. above for all rendered services. In this event, this provisional ICR will become the actual and final ICR for reimbursement purposes under this Agreement.
- 4. CONSULTANT may submit to COUNTY final invoice only when all of the following items have occurred: (1) Caltrans approves or rejects the original or revised independent CPA-audited ICR; (2) all work under this Agreement has been completed to the satisfaction of COUNTY; and, (3) Caltrans has issued its final ICR review letter. CONSULTANT must submit its final invoice to COUNTY no later than sixty (60) days after occurrence of the last of these items. This accepted ICR will apply to this Agreement and all other agreements executed between COUNTY and CONSULTANT with the same fiscal period ICR.

The provisional ICR will apply to this Agreement and all other contracts executed between COUNTY and CONSULTANT, either as a prime or subconsultant, with the same fiscal period ICR.

ARTICLE X

Subcontracting:

- Nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise, shall create any contractual relation between COUNTY and any subconsultant(s), and no subcontract shall relieve CONSULTANT of its responsibilities and obligations hereunder. CONSULTANT agrees to be as fully responsible to COUNTY for the acts and omissions of its subconsultant(s) and of persons either directly or indirectly employed by any of them as it is for the acts and omissions of persons directly employed by CONSULTANT. CONSULTANT's obligation to pay its subconsultant(s) is an independent obligation from COUNTY'S obligation to make payments to CONSULTANT.
- CONSULTANT shall perform the work contemplated with resources available within its own organization and no portion of the work pertinent to this Agreement shall be subcontracted without prior written authorization by COUNTY's Contract Administrator, except that which is expressly identified in the approved Cost Proposal.
- All subcontracts entered into as a result of this Agreement shall contain all the provisions stipulated in this Agreement to be applicable to subconsultants.
- CONSULTANT shall pay its subconsultants within fifteen (15) calendar days from receipt of each payment made to CONSULTANT by COUNTY.
- Any substitution of subconsultant(s) must be approved in writing by COUNTY's Contract Administrator prior to the start of work by the subconsultant(s).

Prompt Progress Payment

CONSULTANT or subconsultant shall pay to any subconsultant, not later than fifteen (15) days after receipt of each progress payment, unless otherwise agreed to in writing, the respective amounts allowed CONSULTANT on account of the work performed by the subconsultants, to the extent of each subconsultant's interest therein. In the event that there is a good faith dispute over all or any portion of the amount due on a progress payment from CONSULTANT or subconsultant to a subconsultant, CONSULTANT or subconsultant may withhold no more than 150 percent of the disputed amount. Any violation of this requirement shall constitute a cause for disciplinary action and shall subject the licensee to a penalty, payable to the subconsultant, of two percent (2%) of the amount due per month for every month that payment is not made.

In any action for the collection of funds wrongfully withheld, the prevailing party shall be entitled to his or her attorney's fees and costs. The sanctions authorized under this requirement shall be separate from, and in addition to, all other remedies, either civil, administrative, or criminal. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subconsultants.

• Prompt Payment of Withheld Funds to Subconsultants.

COUNTY may hold retainage from CONSULTANT and shall make prompt and regular incremental acceptances of portions, as determined by the COUNTY, of the contract work, and pay retainage to CONSULTANT based on these acceptances. No retainage will be held by the COUNTY from progress payments due to CONSULTANT. Any retainage kept by CONSULTANT or by a subconsultant must be paid in full to the earning subconsultant within fifteen (15) days after the subconsultant's work is satisfactorily completed. Any delay or postponement of payment may take place only for good cause and with COUNTY's prior written approval. Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating CONSULTANT or subconsultant to the penalties, sanctions, and remedies specified in Section 3321 of the California Civil Code. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative or judicial remedies, otherwise available to CONSULTANT or subconsultant in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by CONSULTANT, deficient subconsultant performance and/or noncompliance by a subconsultant. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subconsultants.

 CONSULTANT is engaged by COUNTY for its unique qualifications and skills as well as those of its personnel. CONSULTANT shall not subcontract, delegate, or assign services to be provided, in whole or in part, to any other person or entity without prior written consent of COUNTY. COUNTY may, at its sole discretion, through its Contract Administrator, authorize CONSULTANT to utilize subconsultants for services performed in Exhibit A, for the particular tasks, work, and deliverables identified therein. Said written authorization and approval shall be sought and obtained by CONSULTANT prior to subconsultants' commencement of any work under this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall require each subconsultant, to the extent of the work to be performed by the subconsultant, to be bound to CONSULTANT by the terms of this Agreement and to assume toward CONSULTANT all of the obligations and responsibilities that CONSULTANT, by this Agreement, assumes toward COUNTY.

ARTICLE XI

Equipment Purchase and Other Capital Expenditures:

- A. Prior authorization in writing by COUNTY's Contract Administrator shall be required before CONSULTANT enters into any unbudgeted purchase order or subcontract exceeding \$5,000 for supplies, equipment, or CONSULTANT services. CONSULTANT shall provide an evaluation of the necessity or desirability of incurring such costs.
- B. For purchase of any item, service, or consulting work not covered in CONSULTANT's Cost Proposal and exceeding \$5,000, prior written authorization by COUNTY's Contract Administrator is required; three (3) competitive quotations must be submitted with the request, or the absence of bidding must be adequately justified.
- C. Any equipment purchased as a result of this Agreement is subject to the following:
 - 1. CONSULTANT shall maintain an inventory of all nonexpendable property. Nonexpendable property is defined as having a useful life of at least two (2) years and an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more. If the purchased equipment needs replacement and is sold or traded in, COUNTY shall receive a proper refund or credit at the conclusion of the Agreement, or if the Agreement is terminated, CONSULTANT may either keep the equipment and credit COUNTY in an amount equal to its fair market value, or sell such equipment at the best price obtainable at a public or private sale, in accordance with established COUNTY procedures, and credit COUNTY in an amount equal to the sales price. If CONSULTANT elects to keep the equipment, fair market value shall be determined at CONSULTANT's expense, on the basis of a competent independent appraisal of that equipment. Appraisals shall be obtained from an appraiser mutually agreeable to COUNTY and CONSULTANT, if it is determined to sell the equipment, the terms and conditions of such sale must be approved in advance by COUNTY.
 - 2. Regulation 2 CFR Part 200 requires a credit to Federal funds when participating equipment with a fair market value greater than \$5,000 is credited to the project.

ARTICLE XII

State Prevailing Wage Rates:

A. No CONSULTANT or Subconsultant may be awarded an Agreement containing public work elements unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) pursuant to Labor Code §1725.5. Registration with DIR must be maintained throughout the entire term of this Agreement, including any subsequent amendments.

- B. The CONSULTANT shall comply with all of the applicable provisions of the California Labor Code requiring the payment of prevailing wages. The General Prevailing Wage Rate Determinations applicable to work under this Agreement are available and on file with the Department of Transportation's Regional/District Labor Compliance Officer (<u>https://dot.ca.gov/programs/construction/labor-compliance</u>). These wage rates are made a specific part of this Agreement by reference pursuant to Labor Code §1773.2 and will be applicable to work performed at a construction project site. Prevailing wages will be applicable to all inspection work performed at COUNTY construction sites, at COUNTY facilities and at off-site locations that are set up by the construction contractor or one of its subcontractors solely and specifically to serve COUNTY projects. Prevailing wage requirements do not apply to inspection work performed at the facilities of vendors and commercial materials suppliers that provide goods and services to the general public.
- C. General Prevailing Wage Rate Determinations applicable to this project may also be obtained from the Department of Industrial Relations website at <u>http://www.dir.ca.gov</u>.
- D. Payroll Records
 - 1. Each CONSULTANT and Subconsultant shall keep accurate certified payroll records and supporting documents as mandated by Labor Code §1776 and as defined in 8 CCR §16000 showing the name, address, social security number, work classification, straight time and overtime hours worked each day and week, and the actual per diem wages paid to each journeyman, apprentice, worker, or other employee employed by the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant in connection with the public work. Each payroll record shall contain or be verified by a written declaration that it is made under penalty of perjury, stating both of the following:
 - a. The information contained in the payroll record is true and correct.
 - b. The employer has complied with the requirements of Labor Code §1771, §1811, and §1815 for any work performed by his or her employees on the public works project.
 - 2. The payroll records enumerated under paragraph (1) above shall be certified as correct by the CONSULTANT under penalty of perjury. The payroll records and all supporting documents shall be made available for inspection and copying by COUNTY representatives at all reasonable hours at the principal office of the CONSULTANT. The CONSULTANT shall provide copies of certified payrolls or permit inspection of its records as follows:
 - a. A certified copy of an employee's payroll record shall be made available for inspection or furnished to the employee or the employee's authorized representative on request.

- b. A certified copy of all payroll records enumerated in paragraph (1) above, shall be made available for inspection or furnished upon request to a representative of COUNTY, the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement and the Division of Apprenticeship Standards of the Department of Industrial Relations. Certified payrolls submitted to COUNTY, the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement and the Division of Apprenticeship Standards shall not be altered or obliterated by the CONSULTANT.
- c. The public shall not be given access to certified payroll records by the CONSULTANT. The CONSULTANT is required to forward any requests for certified payrolls to the COUNTY Contract Administrator by both email and regular mail on the business day following receipt of the request.
- 3. Each CONSULTANT shall submit a certified copy of the records enumerated in paragraph (1) above, to the entity that requested the records within ten (10) calendar days after receipt of a written request.
- 4. Any copy of records made available for inspection as copies and furnished upon request to the public or any public agency by COUNTY shall be marked or obliterated in such a manner as to prevent disclosure of each individual's name, address, and social security number. The name and address of the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant performing the work shall not be marked or obliterated.
- 5. The CONSULTANT shall inform COUNTY of the location of the records enumerated under paragraph (1) above, including the street address, city and county, and shall, within five (5) working days, provide a notice of a change of location and address.
- 6. The CONSULTANT or Subconsultant shall have ten (10) calendar days in which to comply subsequent to receipt of written notice requesting the records enumerated in paragraph (1) above. In the event the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant fails to comply within the ten (10) day period, he or she shall, as a penalty to COUNTY, forfeit one hundred dollars (\$100) for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each worker, until strict compliance is effectuated. Such penalties shall be withheld by COUNTY from payments then due. CONSULTANT is not subject to a penalty assessment pursuant to this section due to the failure of a Subconsultant to comply.
- E. When prevailing wage rates apply, the CONSULTANT is responsible for verifying compliance with certified payroll requirements. Invoice payment will not be made until the invoice is approved by the COUNTY Contract Administrator.
- F. Penalty
 - 1. The CONSULTANT and any of its Subconsultants shall comply with Labor Code §1774 and §1775. Pursuant to Labor Code §1775, the CONSULTANT and any Subconsultant shall forfeit to the COUNTY a penalty of not more than two hundred dollars (\$200) for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each worker

paid less than the prevailing rates as determined by the Director of DIR for the work or craft in which the worker is employed for any public work done under the Agreement by the CONSULTANT or by its Subconsultant in violation of the requirements of the Labor Code and in particular, Labor Code §§1770 to 1780, inclusive.

- 2. The amount of this forfeiture shall be determined by the Labor Commissioner and shall be based on consideration of mistake, inadvertence, or neglect of the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant in failing to pay the correct rate of prevailing wages, or the previous record of the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant in meeting their respective prevailing wage obligations, or the willful failure by the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant to pay the correct rates of prevailing wages. A mistake, inadvertence, or neglect in failing to pay the correct rates of prevailing wages is not excusable if the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant had knowledge of the obligations under the Labor Code. The CONSULTANT is responsible for paying the appropriate rate, including any escalations that take place during the term of the Agreement.
- 3. In addition to the penalty and pursuant to Labor Code §1775, the difference between the prevailing wage rates and the amount paid to each worker for each calendar day or portion thereof for which each worker was paid less than the prevailing wage rate shall be paid to each worker by the CONSULTANT or Subconsultant.
- 4. If a worker employed by a Subconsultant on a public works project is not paid the general prevailing per diem wages by the Subconsultant, the prime CONSULTANT of the project is not liable for the penalties described above unless the prime CONSULTANT had knowledge of that failure of the Subconsultant to pay the specified prevailing rate of wages to those workers or unless the prime CONSULTANT fails to comply with all of the following requirements:
 - a. The Agreement executed between the CONSULTANT and the Subconsultant for the performance of work on public works projects shall include a copy of the requirements in Labor Code §§ 1771, 1775, 1776, 1777.5, 1813, and 1815.
 - b. The CONSULTANT shall monitor the payment of the specified general prevailing rate of per diem wages by the Subconsultant to the employees by periodic review of the certified payroll records of the Subconsultant.
 - c. Upon becoming aware of the Subconsultant's failure to pay the specified prevailing rate of wages to the Subconsultant's workers, the CONSULTANT shall diligently take corrective action to halt or rectify the failure, including but not limited to, retaining sufficient funds due the Subconsultant for work performed on the public works project.

- d. Prior to making final payment to the Subconsultant for work performed on the public works project, the CONSULTANT shall obtain an affidavit signed under penalty of perjury from the Subconsultant that the Subconsultant had paid the specified general prevailing rate of per diem wages to the Subconsultant's employees on the public works project and any amounts due pursuant to Labor Code §1813.
- Pursuant to Labor Code §1775, COUNTY shall notify the CONSULTANT on a public works project within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of a complaint that a Subconsultant has failed to pay workers the general prevailing rate of per diem wages.
- 6. If COUNTY determines that employees of a Subconsultant were not paid the general prevailing rate of per diem wages and if COUNTY did not retain sufficient money under the Agreement to pay those employees the balance of wages owed under the general prevailing rate of per diem wages, the CONSULTANT shall withhold an amount of moneys due the Subconsultant sufficient to pay those employees the general prevailing rate of per diem wages if requested by COUNTY.
- G. Hours of Labor

Eight (8) hours labor constitutes a legal day's work. The CONSULTANT shall forfeit, as a penalty to the COUNTY, twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each worker employed in the execution of the Agreement by the CONSULTANT or any of its Subconsultants for each calendar day during which such worker is required or permitted to work more than eight (8) hours in any one calendar day and forty (40) hours in any one calendar week in violation of the provisions of the Labor Code, and in particular §§1810 to 1815 thereof, inclusive, except that work performed by employees in excess of eight (8) hours per day, and forty (40) hours during any one week, shall be permitted upon compensation for all hours worked in excess of eight (8) hours per day and forty (40) hours in any week, at not less than one and one-half (1.5) times the basic rate of pay, as provided in §1815.

- H. Employment of Apprentices
 - 1. Where either the prime Agreement or the subagreement exceeds thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), the CONSULTANT and any subconsultants under him or her shall comply with all applicable requirements of Labor Code §§ 1777.5, 1777.6 and 1777.7 in the employment of apprentices.
 - 2. CONSULTANTs and subconsultants are required to comply with all Labor Code requirements regarding the employment of apprentices, including mandatory ratios of journey level to apprentice workers. Prior to commencement of work, CONSULTANT and subconsultants are advised to contact the DIR Division of Apprenticeship Standards website at https://www.dir.ca.gov/das/, for additional information regarding the employment of apprentices and for the specific journey-

to- apprentice ratios for the Agreement work. The CONSULTANT is responsible for all subconsultants' compliance with these requirements.

Note: The Federal "Payment of Predetermined Minimum Wage" applies only to federalaid construction contracts.

ARTICLE XIII

Conflict Of Interest:

- During the term of this Agreement, CONSULTANT shall disclose any financial, business, or other relationship with COUNTY that may have an impact upon the outcome of this Agreement or any ensuing COUNTY construction project. CONSULTANT shall also list current clients who may have a financial interest in the outcome of this Agreement or any ensuing COUNTY construction project that will follow. CONSULTANT has acknowledged this interest of consultant and CONSULTANT has duly executed Exhibit D, marked "Interest of Consultant Disclosure Statement," incorporated herein and made by reference a part hereof.
- CONSULTANT certifies that it has disclosed to COUNTY any actual, apparent, or potential conflicts of interest that may exist relative to the services to be provided pursuant to this Agreement. CONSULTANT agrees to advise COUNTY of any actual, apparent or potential conflicts of interest that may develop subsequent to the date of execution of this Agreement. CONSULTANT further agrees to complete any statements of economic interest if required by either COUNTY ordinance or State law. COUNTY'S Contract Administrator shall at the time this Agreement is executed make an initial determination whether or not the individuals who will provide services or perform work pursuant to this Agreement are consultants within the meaning of the Political Reform Act and COUNTY'S Conflict of Interest Code. Statements of economic interests are public records subject to disclosure under the California Public Records Act.
- CONSULTANT hereby certifies that it does not now have, nor shall it acquire, any financial or business interest that would conflict with the performance of services under this Agreement.
- CONSULTANT hereby certifies that CONSULTANT or subconsultant and any firm
 affiliated with CONSULTANT or subconsultant that bids on any construction contract
 or on any Agreement to provide construction inspection for any construction project
 resulting from this Agreement, has established necessary controls to ensure a
 conflict of interest does not exist. An affiliated firm is one, which is subject to the
 control of the same persons, through joint ownership or otherwise.
- CONSULTANT covenants that during the term of this Agreement neither it, or any
 officer or employee of CONSULTANT, has or shall acquire any interest, directly or
 indirectly, in any of the following:
 - 1) Any other contract connected with, or directly affected by, the services to be performed by this Agreement.

- 2) Any other entities connected with, or directly affected by, the services to be performed by this Agreement.
- 3) Any officer or employee of COUNTY that are involved in this Agreement.

If CONSULTANT becomes aware of a conflict of interest related to this Agreement, CONSULTANT shall promptly notify COUNTY of the existence of that conflict, and COUNTY may, in its sole discretion, immediately terminate this Agreement by giving written notice of termination specified in ARTICLE VI, Termination.

ARTICLE XIV

Rebates, Kickbacks, or Other Unlawful Consideration: CONSULTANT warrants that this Agreement was not obtained or secured through rebates, kickbacks, or other unlawful consideration, either promised or paid to any COUNTY employee. For breach or violation of this warranty, COUNTY shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to terminate the Agreement without liability; to pay only for the value of the work actually performed; to deduct from the Agreement price; or otherwise recover the full amount of such rebate, kickback, or other unlawful consideration.

ARTICLE XV

Prohibition of Expending COUNTY, State, or Federal Funds For Lobbying:

A. CONSULTANT certifies to the best of his or her knowledge and belief that:

- 1. No state, federal, or county appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid by or on behalf of CONSULTANT to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any state or federal agency; a Member of the State Legislature or United States Congress; an officer or employee of the Legislature or Congress; or any employee of a Member of the Legislature or Congress, in connection with the awarding of any state or federal contract; the making of any state or federal grant; the making of any state or federal loan; the entering into of any cooperative agreement; and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any state or federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
- 2. If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid, or will be paid, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency; a Member of Congress; an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress; in connection with this federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, CONSULTANT shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure of Lobbying Activities," in accordance with its instructions which form and instructions are attached hereto as Exhibit E and are incorporated herein and made by reference a part hereof.
- B. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.

C. CONSULTANT also agrees by signing this document that he or she shall require that the language of this certification be included in all lower-tier subcontracts, which exceed \$100,000 and that all such sub recipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

ARTICLE XVI

Non-Discrimination Clause and Statement of Compliance:

- A. CONSULTANT's signature affixed herein, and dated, shall constitute a certification under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that CONSULTANT has, unless exempt, complied with the nondiscrimination program requirements of Government Code § 12990 and 2 CCR §11102.
- B. During the performance of this Agreement, CONSULTANT and its subconsultants shall not unlawfully discriminate, harass, or allow harassment against any employee or applicant for employment because of sex, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), mental disability, medical condition (e.g., cancer), age (over 40), marital status, genetic information, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, or military and veteran status, and denial of family care leave. CONSULTANT and subconsultants shall insure that the evaluation and treatment of their employees and applicants for employment are free from such discrimination and harassment.
- C. CONSULTANT and subconsultants shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Gov. Code § 12900 [a-f] et seq.) and the applicable regulations promulgated there under (2 CCR §11000 et seq.), the provisions of Gov. Code §§ 11135-11139.5, and the regulations or standards adopted by COUNTY to implement such article. The applicable regulations of the Fair Employment and Housing Commission implementing Government Code Section 12900 (a-f), set forth in Subchapter 5 of Chapter 5 of Division 4.1 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations, are incorporated into this Agreement by reference and made a part hereof as if set forth in full.
- D. CONSULTANT shall permit access by representatives of the Department of Fair Employment and Housing and County upon reasonable notice at any time during the normal business hours, but in no case less than twenty-four (24) hours' notice, to such of its books, records, accounts, and all other sources of information and its facilities as said Department or COUNTY shall require to ascertain compliance with this clause.
- E. CONSULTANT and its subconsultants shall give written notice of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other Agreement.
- F. CONSULTANT shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this clause in all subcontracts to perform work under this Agreement.
- G. CONSULTANT with regard to the work performed under this Agreement, shall act in accordance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. §2000d et seq.). Title VI provides that the recipients of federal assistance will implement and maintain

a policy of nondiscrimination in which no person in the state of California shall, on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, or disability, be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or subject to discrimination under any program or activity by the recipients of federal assistance or their assignees and successors in interest.

- H. CONSULTANT shall comply with regulations relative to non-discrimination in federally assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation (49 CFR Part 21 - Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964). Specifically, CONSULTANT shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by 49 CFR §21.5, including employment practices and the selection and retention of Subconsultants.
- I. CONSULTANT, subrecipient or subconsultant will never exclude any person from participation in, deny any person the benefits of, or otherwise discriminate against anyone in connection with the award and performance of any contract covered by 49 CFR 26 on the basis of race, color, sex, or national origin. In administering the COUNTY components of the DBE Program Plan, CONSULTANT, subrecipient or subconsultant will not, directly, or through contractual or other arrangements, use criteria or methods of administration that have the effect of defeating or substantially impairing accomplishment of the objectives of the DBE Program Plan with respect to individuals of a particular race, color, sex, or national origin.
- J. CONSULTANT agrees to comply with the following non-discrimination statues and authorities; including at a minimum:
 - 1. The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, (42 U.S.C. § 4601);
 - 2. Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1973, (23 U.S.C. § 324 et seq.);
 - 3. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, (29 U.S.C. § 794 et seq.), as amended; and 49 CFR Part 27;
 - 4. The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, (42 U.S.C. § 6101 et seq.)
 - 5. Airport and Airway Improvement Act of 1982, (49 U.S.C. § 471, Section 47123), as amended;
 - 6. The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, (PL 100-209), (Broadened the scope, coverage and applicability of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, The Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, by expanding the definition of the terms "programs or activities" to include all of the programs or activities of the Federal-aid recipients, sub-recipients and contractors, whether such programs or activities are Federally funded or not); Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability in the operation of public entities, public and private transportation systems, places of public accommodation, and certain testing

entities (42 U.S.C. §§ 12131-12189) as implemented by Department of Transportation regulations at 49 C.P.R. parts 37 and 38;

- The Federal Aviation Administration's Non-discrimination statute (49 U.S.C. § 47123) (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, and sex);
- Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations, which ensures discrimination against minority populations by discouraging programs, policies, and activities with disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on minority and low-income populations;
- Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency, and resulting agency guidance, national origin discrimination includes discrimination because of limited English proficiency (LEP). To ensure compliance with Title VI, you must take reasonable steps to -ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to your programs (70 Fed. Reg. at 74087 to 74100);
- Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended, which prohibits you from discriminating because of sex in education programs or activities (20 U.S.C. 1681 et seq).

ARTICLE XVII

Debarment and Suspension Certification:

- A. CONSULTANT's signature affixed herein shall constitute a certification under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that CONSULTANT or any person associated therewith in the capacity of owner, partner, director, officer, or manager:
 - a. Is not currently under suspension, debarment, voluntary exclusion, or determination of ineligibility by any federal agency;
 - b. Has not been suspended, debarred, voluntarily excluded, or determined ineligible by any federal agency within the past three (3) years;
 - c. Does not have a proposed debarment pending; and
 - d. Has not been indicted, convicted, or had a civil judgment rendered against it by a court of competent jurisdiction in any matter involving fraud or official misconduct within the past three (3) years.
- B. Any exceptions to this certification must be disclosed to COUNTY. Exceptions will not necessarily result in denial of recommendation for award but will be considered in determining CONSULTANT responsibility. Disclosures must indicate to whom exceptions apply, initiating agency, and dates of action.

C. Exceptions to the Federal Government Excluded Parties List System maintained by the General Services Administration are to be determined by the Federal Highway Administration.

ARTICLE XVIII

Taxes: CONSULTANT certifies that as of today's date, it is not in default on any unsecured property taxes or other taxes or fees owed by CONSULTANT to COUNTY. CONSULTANT agrees that it shall not default on any obligations to COUNTY during the term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XIX

Standards for Work: Environmental services provided under this Agreement shall be performed in accordance with, and in full compliance with, COUNTY, Caltrans and FHWA guidelines, the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), Pub. L. 91-190, 42 U.S.C. 4321-4347, January 1, 1970, as amended by Pub. L. 94-52, July 3, 1975, Pub. L. 94-83, August 9, 1975, and Pub. L. 97-258, § 4(b), September 13, 1982, all NEPA guidelines and related regulations, the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), Public Resources Code Sections 21000 et. seq., and in full compliance with CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Sections 15000 et. seq., such that the work will result in NEPA and CEQA certifiable environmental documents. Services shall further conform to all State of California statutes, regulations and procedures (including those set forth in the Caltrans Local Assistance Procedures Manual and the Local Assistance Program Guidelines) relating to federal-aid programs, all Title 23 federal requirements, and all applicable federal laws, regulations, and policy and procedural or instructional memoranda.

All of CONSULTANT's services and deliverables must adhere to current COUNTY, Caltrans and federal requirements for project development and shall be made available to COUNTY and Caltrans for review and approval at the appropriate stages, upon request by COUNTY's Contract Administrator.

CONSULTANT has full responsibility for the accuracy and completeness of the deliverables, reports, and such other documents that may be required for the tasks or items of work assigned. Assistance, cooperation and oversight by COUNTY, Caltrans, FHWA, or other regulatory agencies will not relieve CONSULTANT of this professional responsibility.

All work must be performed and work products prepared in a format and manner customarily anticipated by the appropriate approving agencies.

ARTICLE XX

Licenses: CONSULTANT hereby represents and warrants that CONSULTANT and any of its subconsultants employed under this Agreement has all the applicable licenses, permits, and certifications that are legally required for CONSULTANT and its subconsultants to practice its profession or provide the services or work contemplated under this Agreement in the State of California. CONSULTANT and its subconsultants shall obtain or maintain said applicable licenses, permits, or certificates in good standing throughout the term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XXI Ownership of Data:

- A. It is mutually agreed that all materials prepared by CONSULTANT under this Agreement shall become the property of COUNTY, and CONSULTANT shall have no property right therein whatsoever. Immediately upon termination, COUNTY shall be entitled to, and CONSULTANT shall deliver to COUNTY, reports, investigations, appraisals, inventories, studies, analyses, drawings, and data estimates performed to that date, whether completed or not, and other such materials as may have been prepared or accumulated to date by CONSULTANT in performing this Agreement which is not CONSULTANT's privileged information, as defined by law, or CONSULTANT's personnel information, along with all other property belonging exclusively to COUNTY which is in CONSULTANT's possession. Publication of the information derived from work performed or data obtained in connection with services rendered under this Agreement must be approved in writing by COUNTY.
- B. Additionally, it is agreed that the Parties intend this to be an Agreement for services and each considers the products and results of the services to be rendered by CONSULTANT hereunder to be work made for hire. CONSULTANT acknowledges and agrees that the work (and all rights therein, including, without limitation, copyright) belongs to and shall be the sole and exclusive property of COUNTY without restriction or limitation upon its use or dissemination by COUNTY.
- C. Nothing herein shall constitute or be construed to be any representation by CONSULTANT that the work product is suitable in any way for any other project except the one detailed in this Contract. Any reuse by COUNTY for another project or project location shall be at COUNTY's sole risk.
- D. Applicable patent rights provisions regarding rights to inventions shall be included in the contracts as appropriate (48 CFR 27 Subpart 27.3 Patent Rights under Government Contracts for federal-aid contracts).
- E. COUNTY may permit copyrighting reports or other agreement products. If copyrights are permitted; the Agreement shall provide that the FHWA shall have the royalty-free nonexclusive and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use; and to authorize others to use, the work for government purposes.

ARTICLE XXII

CONSULTANT's Project Manager: CONSULTANT designates Lesley Owning, Principal Planner, as its Project Manager for this Agreement. CONSULTANT's Project Manager, or COUNTY-approved designee, shall be accessible to COUNTY's Contract Administrator, or designee, during normal COUNTY working hours and shall respond within twenty-four (24) hours to COUNTY inquiries or requests. CONSULTANT's Project Manager shall be responsible for all matters related to CONSULTANT's personnel, operations, and any subconsultants authorized under this Agreement including, at a minimum, (1) assigning qualified personnel to perform the required work and to prepare the deliverables required pursuant to this Agreement; (2) reviewing, monitoring, training, and directing CONSULTANT's personnel and any subconsultants authorized herein; and (3) providing qualified and appropriate traffic control services for field work.

ARTICLE XXIII

Changes to Agreement: This Agreement may be amended by mutual consent of the parties hereto. Amendments may be made to permit mutually acceptable changes in the scope, character, or complexity of the work if such changes become desirable or necessary as the work progresses. Appropriate extensions of time in case of unavoidable delays and for consideration of warranted adjustments in payment may also be accomplished by amendments to the Agreement. Said amendments shall become effective only when in writing and fully executed by duly authorized officers of the parties hereto. There shall be no change in CONSULTANT's Project Manager or subconsultants without prior written approval by COUNTY's Contract Administrator.

ARTICLE XXIV

Consultant to County: It is understood that the services provided under this Agreement shall be prepared in and with cooperation from COUNTY and its staff. It is further understood that this Agreement does not create an exclusive relationship between COUNTY and CONSULTANT, and CONSULTANT may perform similar work or services for others. However, CONSULTANT shall not enter into any agreement with any other party or provide any information in any manner to any other party, that would conflict with CONSULTANT'S responsibilities or hinder CONSULTANT'S performance of services hereunder, unless COUNTY'S Contract Administrator, in writing, authorizes that agreement or sharing of information.

ARTICLE XXV

Confidentiality:

- 1. CONSULTANT and any subconsultants authorized under this Agreement shall maintain the confidentiality and privileged nature of all records, including billing records, all financial, statistical, personal, technical, or other data and information relative to COUNTY's operations together with any knowledge therein acquired, in accordance with all applicable state and federal laws and regulations, as they may now exist or may hereafter be amended or changed. CONSULTANT, and all CONSULTANT's staff. employees. and representatives. including any subconsultants authorized herein, shall not use or disclose, directly or indirectly at any time, any said confidential information, other than to COUNTY's Community Development Agency or to such person with COUNTY's consent for the purpose of, and in the performance of, this Agreement.
- B. Permission granted by COUNTY to disclose information on one occasion shall not authorize CONSULTANT or any subconsultants authorized under this Agreement, to further disclose such information or disseminate the same on any other occasion.
- C. CONSULTANT and any subconsultants authorized under this Agreement shall not comment publicly to the press or any other media regarding this Agreement or COUNTY's actions on the same, except to COUNTY's staff, CONSULTANT's own personnel or authorized subconsultants involved in the performance of this Agreement, at public hearings, or in response to questions from COUNTY's Board of Supervisors.

- D. CONSULTANT and any subconsultants authorized under this Agreement shall not issue any news release or public relations item of any nature, whatsoever, regarding services performed or to be performed under this Agreement without prior review of the contents thereof by COUNTY and receipt of COUNTY's Contract Administrator's written permission.
- E. Any non-final or draft administrative reports, studies, materials and documentation, including but not limited to, all environmental documents and any Project Report (PR), relied upon, produced, created or utilized for any items of work performed under this Agreement shall be held in confidence pursuant to Government Code §6254.5(e) until release in accordance with CEQA. COUNTY and CONSULTANT agree that such material will not be distributed, released or shared with any other organization, person or group other than COUNTY's and CONSULTANT's employees and agents whose work requires that access.
- F. Any subcontract entered into as a result of this Agreement shall contain all of the provisions of this Article.
- G. This confidentiality provision shall survive after the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XXVI

Independent Contractor: The parties intend that an independent contractor relationship will be created by this contract. CONSULTANT is, and shall be at all times, deemed independent and shall be wholly responsible for the manner in which it performs services required by the terms of this Agreement. CONSULTANT exclusively assumes responsibility for acts of its employees, agents, affiliates, and subcontractors, if any are authorized herein, as they relate to the services or work to be performed under this Agreement during the course and scope of their employment by CONSULTANT. Those persons will be entirely and exclusively under the direction, supervision, and control of CONSULTANT.

COUNTY may designate the tasks to be performed and the results to be accomplished under this Agreement, provide information concerning the work or services, approve or disapprove the final work product and/or services provided, and set deadlines for the completion of the work or services, but COUNTY will not control or direct the manner, means, methods, or sequence in which CONSULTANT performs the work or services for accomplishing the results. CONSULTANT understands and agrees that CONSULTANT lacks the authority to bind COUNTY or incur any obligations on behalf of COUNTY.

CONSULTANT, including any subcontractor or employees of CONSULTANT, shall not receive, nor be eligible for, any benefits COUNTY provides for its employees, including, but not limited to, vacation pay, paid holidays, life insurance, health insurance, social security, disability insurance, pension, or 457 plans. CONSULTANT shall not receive, nor be eligible for, workers' compensation, including medical and indemnity payments. COUNTY is not responsible for withholding, and shall not withhold, Federal Income Contribution Act amounts or taxes of any kind from any payments which it owes

CONSULTANT. CONSULTANT shall not be subject to the work schedules or vacation periods that apply to COUNTY employees.

CONSULTANT shall be solely responsible for paying its employees, and for withholding Federal Income Contribution Act amounts and other taxes, workers' compensation, unemployment compensation, medical insurance, life insurance, or any other benefit that CONSULTANT provides for its employees.

CONSULTANT acknowledges that it has no authority to bind the COUNTY or incur any obligations on behalf of the COUNTY with regard to any matter and shall not make any agreements or representations on the COUNTY'S behalf.

ARTICLE XXVII

Fiscal Considerations: The parties to this Agreement recognize and acknowledge that COUNTY is a political subdivision of the State of California. As such, COUNTY is subject to the provisions of Article XVI, Section 18 of the California Constitution and other similar fiscal and procurement laws and regulations and may not expend funds for products, equipment, or services not budgeted in a given year. It is further understood that in the normal course of COUNTY business, COUNTY will adopt a proposed budget prior to a given fiscal year, but that the final adoption of a budget does not occur until after the beginning of the fiscal year.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement to the contrary, COUNTY shall give notice of cancellation of this Agreement in the event of adoption of a proposed budget that does not provide for funds for the services, products, or equipment subject herein. Such notice shall become effective upon the adoption of a final budget, which does not provide funding for this Agreement. Upon the effective date of such notice, this Agreement shall be automatically terminated and COUNTY released from any further liability hereunder.

In addition to the above, should the Board of Supervisors during the course of a given year for financial reasons reduce or order a reduction in the budget for any COUNTY department for which services were contracted to be performed, pursuant to this paragraph in the sole discretion of COUNTY, this Agreement may be deemed to be canceled in its entirety subject to payment for services performed prior to cancellation.

ARTICLE XXVIII

Notice to Parties: All notices to be given by the parties hereto shall be in writing and served by depositing the same in the United States Post Office, postage prepaid and return receipt requested. Notices to COUNTY shall be in duplicate and addressed as follows:

ARTICLE XXIX

Change of Address: In the event of a change in address for CONSULTANT's principal place of business, CONSULTANT's Agent for Service of Process, or Notices to CONSULTANT, CONSULTANT shall notify COUNTY in writing as provided in ARTICLE XXVIII, Notice to Parties. Said notice shall become part of this Agreement upon acknowledgment in writing by COUNTY's Contract Administrator, and no further amendment of the Agreement shall be necessary provided that such change of address does not conflict with any other provisions of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XXX

Indemnity: To the fullest extent permitted by law, CONSULTANT shall defend at its own expense, indemnify, and hold the COUNTY harmless, its officers, employees, agents, and volunteers, against and from any and all liability, claims, suits, losses, damages, or expenses of every name, kind and description, including attorney's fees and costs incurred, brought for, or on account of, injuries to or death of any person, including at a minimum workers, COUNTY employees, and the public, or damage to property, or any economic or consequential losses, which are claimed to or in any way arise out of or are connected with the acts or omissions of CONSULTANT or its officers, agents, or employees in rendering the services, operations, or performance hereunder, except for liability, claims, suits, losses, damages or expenses arising from the sole negligence or willful acts of the COUNTY, its officers and employees, or as expressly prescribed by statute. This duty of CONSULTANT to indemnify and save COUNTY harmless includes the duties to defend set forth in California Civil Code Section 2778.

The insurance obligations of CONSULTANT are separate, independent obligations under the Agreement, and the provisions of this defense and indemnity are not intended to modify nor should they be construed as modifying or in any way limiting the insurance obligations set forth in the Agreement.

Nothing herein shall be construed to seek indemnity in excess of that permitted by Civil Code section 2782, et seq. In the event any portion of this Article is found invalid, the Parties agree that this Article shall survive and be interpreted consistent with the provisions of Civil Code section 2782, et seq.

ARTICLE XXXI

Insurance: CONSULTANT shall provide proof of a policy of insurance satisfactory to COUNTY's Risk Management Division and documentation evidencing that CONSULTANT maintains insurance that meets the following requirements:

- A. Full Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Insurance covering all employees of CONSULTANT as required by law in the State of California.
- B. Commercial General Liability Insurance of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage and a \$2,000,000 aggregate limit.
- C. Automobile Liability Insurance of not less than \$1,000,000 is required in the event motor vehicles are used by CONSULTANT in performance of the Agreement.
- D. In the event CONSULTANT is a licensed professional or professional consultant and is performing professional services under this Agreement, Professional Liability Insurance is required with a limit of liability of not less than \$1,000,000.
- E. CONSULTANT shall furnish a certificate of insurance satisfactory to COUNTY's Risk Management Division as evidence that the insurance required above is being maintained.
- F. The insurance will be issued by an insurance company acceptable to COUNTY's Risk Management Division or be provided through partial or total self-insurance likewise acceptable to the Risk Management Division.
- G. CONSULTANT agrees that the insurance required herein shall be in effect at all times during the term of this Agreement. In the event said insurance coverage expires at any time or times during the term of this Agreement, CONSULTANT agrees to provide at least thirty (30) days prior to said expiration date, a new certificate of insurance evidencing insurance coverage as provided for herein for not less than the remainder of term of the Agreement, or for a period of not less than one (1) year. New certificates of insurance are subject to the written approval of COUNTY's Risk Management Division, and CONSULTANT agrees that no work or services shall be performed prior to the giving of such approval. In the event CONSULTANT fails to keep in effect at all times insurance coverage as herein provided, COUNTY may, in addition to any other remedies it may have, terminate this Agreement upon the occurrence of such event.
- H. The certificate of insurance must include the following provisions stating that:
 - 1. The insurer will not cancel the insured's coverage without thirty (30) days prior written notice to COUNTY; and
 - 2. The County of El Dorado, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are included as additional insured, on an additional insured endorsement,

but only insofar as the operations under this Agreement are concerned. This provision shall apply to the general liability policy.

- CONSULTANT's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance in respect to COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or selfinsurance maintained by COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers shall be in excess of CONSULTANT's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- J. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to, and approved by, COUNTY. At the option of COUNTY, either: The insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions in respect to COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers; or CONSULTANT shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.
- K. Any failure to comply with the reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to COUNTY, its officers, officials, employees, or volunteers.
- L. The insurance companies shall have no recourse against the County of El Dorado, its officers, employees, and volunteers or any of them for payment of any premiums or assessments under any policy issued by any insurance company.
- M. CONSULTANT's obligations shall not be limited by the foregoing insurance requirements and shall survive the expiration of this Agreement.
- N. In the event CONSULTANT cannot provide an occurrence policy, CONSULTANT shall provide insurance covering claims made as a result of performance of this Agreement for not less than three (3) years following completion of performance of this Agreement.
- O. The certificate of insurance shall meet such additional standards as may be determined by the contracting COUNTY department, either independently or in consultation with COUNTY's Risk Management Division as essential for protection of COUNTY.
- P. CONSULTANT shall ensure that all subconsultants authorized pursuant to this Agreement shall maintain workers' compensation, general liability, automobile liability, and professional liability insurance as specified above and shall provide COUNTY with proof of same if requested.

ARTICLE XXXII

Force Majeure: Neither party will be liable for any delay, failure to perform, or omission under this Agreement that is due to any cause that it is beyond its control, not due to its own negligence, and cannot be overcome by the exercise of due diligence. In that event, the affected party will:

- 1) Promptly give written notice to the other of the fact that it is unable to so perform and the cause(s) that is beyond its control.
- 2) Once the cause(s) has ceased, provide written notice to the other party and immediately resume its performance under this Agreement.

For purposes of this Article, "cause that is beyond its control" includes labor disturbances, riots, fires, earthquakes, floods, storms, lightning, epidemics, war, disorders, hostilities, expropriation or confiscation of properties, failure of and delays by carriers, interference by civil or military authorities, whether legal or de facto, and whether purporting to act under some constitution, decree, or law, or otherwise, or acts of God.

ARTICLE XXXIII

California Residency (Form 590): All independent consultants providing services to COUNTY must file a State of California Form 590, certifying their California residency or, in the case of a limited liability company or corporation, certifying that they have a permanent place of business in California. CONSULTANT will be required to submit a Form 590 prior to execution of this Agreement, <u>or</u> COUNTY shall withhold seven (7) percent of each payment made to CONSULTANT during the term of this Agreement. This requirement applies to any agreement/contract exceeding \$1,500.

ARTICLE XXXIV

COUNTY Payee Data Record Form: All independent contractors or corporations providing services to COUNTY who do not have a Department of the Treasury Internal Revenue Service Form W-9 (Form W-9) on file with COUNTY must file a County Payee Data Record Form with COUNTY.

ARTICLE XXXV

Business License: COUNTY's Business License Ordinance provides that it is unlawful for any person to furnish supplies or services or transact any kind of business in the unincorporated territory of El Dorado County, without possessing a COUNTY business license unless exempt under COUNTY Ordinance Code Section 5.08.070. CONSULTANT warrants and represents that it shall comply with all of the requirements of COUNTY's Business License Ordinance, where applicable, prior to beginning work under this Agreement and at all times during the term of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XXXVI

California Forum and Law: Any dispute resolution action arising out of this Agreement, including, at a minimum, litigation, mediation, or arbitration, shall be brought in El Dorado County, California, and shall be resolved in accordance with the laws of the State of California.

ARTICLE XXXVII

Compliance with Federal, State, and COUNTY Requirements: COUNTY is relying on federal assistance or grants, state funds, COUNTY or other grant funds for all or a portion of the funding for the services to be provided herein. As a requirement of COUNTY's use of federal, state, and COUNTY grant funds, COUNTY is required to

comply with certain contracting requirements and to extend those requirements to all third-party contracts. CONSULTANT shall comply with all applicable provisions of federal, state, and COUNTY regulations, including those required by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) grant funding requirements, regulations, and related executive orders regarding the use, expenditure, control, reporting, allowable costs, and management of such funds. The following Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circulars, as applicable, and as implemented by various parts of the Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.), are incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement:

2 CFR Part 200, Subpart E, "Cost Principles. Special Considerations for States, Local Governments and Indian Tribes (formerly OMB Circular A-87)"

2 CFR Part Part 200, Subpart F "Audit Requirements" and the most recent compliance supplement

Copies of the OMB Circulars are available on the Internet at: <u>https://www.whitehouse.gov/omb/information-for-agencies/circulars</u>

Failure of CONSULTANT to comply with any federal, state, or COUNTY provision may be the basis for withholding payments for charges made by CONSULTANT and for such other remedies as may be appropriate including termination of this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall further comply with any flow-down or third-party contracting provisions which may be required under the federal, state, or COUNTY regulations and which may apply to CONSULTANT's subcontracts, if any, associated with this Agreement.

ARTICLE XXXVIII

Working Office: CONSULTANT shall establish a working office at a place acceptable to COUNTY. The parties hereto acknowledge and agree that CONSULTANT's office is located at 1180 Iron Point Road, Suite 130, Folsom, California 95630.

ARTICLE XXXIX

Covenant Against Contingent Fees: By executing this Agreement, CONSULTANT warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working for CONSULTANT, to solicit or secure this Agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award or formation of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, COUNTY shall have the right to annul this Agreement without liability or at its discretion to deduct from the Agreement price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or contingent fee.

ARTICLE XL

Design Standards: CONSULTANT shall perform all services under this Agreement and as described in Exhibit A, in conformance with applicable federal, state, and local design standards or other standards for work performance stipulated in ARTICLE XIX, Standards for Work.

ARTICLE XLI

Documentation: CONSULTANT shall document the results of its work to the satisfaction of COUNTY and if applicable, the State of California, and the FHWA. This may include preparation of progress and final reports, plans, specifications and estimates, or similar evidence of attainment of the Agreement objectives.

ARTICLE XLII

Copyrights: COUNTY may permit copyrighting reports or other Agreement products. If copyrights are permitted, COUNTY, FHWA, and State of California shall have the royalty-free non-exclusive and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use, the work for State or Federal Government purposes:

- (a) The copyright in any work developed under this Agreement; and
- (b) Any rights of copyright to which CONSULTANT purchases ownership with grant support.

ARTICLE XLIII

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Considerations: CONSULTANT must give consideration to DBE firms as specified in 23 C.F.R. § 172.5(b) and in Appendix A to 49 C.F.R. Part 26. CONSULTANT shall ensure that certified DBE firms have the opportunity to participate in the performance of this Agreement and CONSULTANT shall take all necessary and reasonable steps for such assurance.

As applicable, DBE requirements will be discussed at the meeting or telephone conference held to determine the specific services required in a Task Order or Work Order. COUNTY's Contract Administrator will provide CONSULTANT with the necessary DBE forms and information for use and/or submittal with CONSULTANT's Task Order/Work Order proposal or CONSULTANT's final invoice.

ARTICLE XLIV

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Participation:

A. CONSULTANT, COUNTY, or subconsultant shall take necessary and reasonable steps to ensure that DBEs have opportunities to participate in the contract (49 CFR 26). To ensure equal participation of DBEs provided in 49 CFR 26.5, COUNTY shows a contract goal for DBEs. CONSULTANT shall make work available to DBEs and select work parts consistent with available DBE subconsultants and suppliers.

CONSULTANT shall meet the DBE goal shown elsewhere in these special provisions or demonstrate that they made adequate good faith efforts to meet this goal. It is CONSULTANT's responsibility to verify that the DBE firm is certified as DBE at date of proposal opening and document the record by printing out the California Unified Certification Program (CUCP) data for each DBE firm. A list of DBEs certified by the CUCP can be found at https://dot.ca.gov/programs/civil-rights/dbe-search.

All DBE participation will count toward the California Department of Transportation's federally mandated statewide overall DBE goal. Credit for materials or supplies

CONSULTANT purchases from DBEs counts towards the goal in the following manner:

- 100 percent counts if the materials or supplies are obtained from a DBE manufacturer.
- 60 percent counts if the materials or supplies are purchased from a DBE regular dealer.
- Only fees, commissions, and charges for assistance in the procurement and delivery of materials or supplies count if obtained from a DBE that is neither a manufacturer nor regular dealer. 49CFR26.55 defines "manufacturer" and "regular dealer".

This Agreement is subject to 49 C.F.R. § 26 entitled "Participation by Disadvantaged Business Enterprises in Department of Transportation Financial Assistance Programs". Consultants who obtain DBE participation on this Agreement shall assist Caltrans in meeting its federally mandated statewide overall DBE goal.

- B. The goal for DBE participation for this Agreement is 17%. Participation by DBE CONSULTANT or subconsultants shall be in accordance with information contained in the Consultant Proposal DBE Commitment (Exhibit 10-O1) or in the Consultant Contract DBE Commitment (Exhibit 10-O2). If a DBE subconsultant is unable to perform, CONSULTANT must make a good faith effort to replace him/her with another DBE subconsultant, if the goal is not otherwise met.
- C. DBEs and other small businesses, as defined in 49 C.F.R. § 26.5, are encouraged to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with federal funds. CONSULTANT or subconsultant shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. CONSULTANT shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 C.F.R. Part 26 in the award and administration of US DOT-assisted agreements. Failure by CONSULTANT to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this Agreement, which may result in the termination of this Agreement or such other remedy as COUNTY deems appropriate.
- D. Contract Assurance

Under 49 CFR 26.13(b):

CONSULTANT, subrecipient or subconsultant shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. CONSULTANT shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR 26 in the award and administration of federal-aid contracts.

Failure by CONSULTANT to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or such other remedy as the recipient deems appropriate, which may include, at a minimum:

- 1. Withholding monthly progress payments;
- 2. Assessing sanctions;
- 3. Liquidating damages; and/or
- 4. Disqualifying CONSULTANT from future proposing as non-responsible
- E. Termination and Substitution of DBE Subconsultants

CONSULTANT shall utilize the specific DBEs listed to perform the work and supply the materials for which each is listed unless CONSULTANT or DBE subconsultant obtains COUNTY's written consent. CONSULTANT shall not terminate or substitute a listed DBE for convenience and perform the work with their own forces or obtain materials from other sources without the authorization from COUNTY. Unless COUNTY's consent is provided, CONSULTANT shall not be entitled to any payment for work or material used unless it is performed or supplied by listed DBE on the Exhibit 10-02 Consultant Contract DBE Commitment form, included in the bid.

Termination of DBE Subconsultants

- 1. Listed DBE fails or refuses to execute a written contract based on plans and specifications for the project.
- 2. COUNTY stipulated that a bond is a condition of executing the subcontract and the listed DBE fails to meet the COUNTY's bond requirements.
- 3. Work requires a consultant's license and listed DBE does not have a valid license under Contractors License Law.
- 4. Listed DBE fails or refuses to perform the work or furnish the listed materials (failing or refusing to perform is not an allowable reason to remove a DBE if the failure or refusal is a result of bad faith or discrimination).
- 5. Listed DBE's work is unsatisfactory and not in compliance with the contract.
- 6. Listed DBE is ineligible to work on the project because of suspension or debarment.
- 7. Listed DBE becomes bankrupt or insolvent.
- 8. Listed DBE voluntarily withdraws with written notice from the contract.
- 9. Listed DBE is ineligible to receive credit for the type of work required.
- 10.Listed DBE owner dies or becomes disabled resulting in the inability to perform the work on the contract.
- 11.COUNTY determines other documented good cause.

CONSULTANT must use the following procedures to request the termination of a DBE or portion of DBE's work:

- Send a written notice to the DBE of the CONSULTANT's intent to use other forces or material sources and include one or more justifiable reasons listed above. Simultaneously send a copy of this written notice to the COUNTY. The written notice to the DBE must request they provide any response within five (5) business days to both the CONSULTANT and the COUNTY by either acknowledging their agreement or documenting their reasoning as to why the use of other forces or sources of materials should not occur.
- 2. If the DBE does not respond within five (5) business days, CONSULTANT may move forward with the request as if the DBE had agreed to CONSULTANT's written notice.
- 3. Submit CONSULTANT's DBE termination request by written letter to the COUNTY and include:
 - a. One of more of the above listed justifiable reasons along with supporting documentation.
 - b. CONSULTANT's written notice to the DBE regarding the request, including proof of transmission and tracking documentation of CONSULTANT's written notice.
 - c. The DBE's response to CONSULTANT's written notice, if received. If a written response was not provided, provide a statement to that effect.

The COUNTY shall respond in writing to CONSULTANT's DBE termination request within five (5) business days.

Replacement of DBE Subconsultants

After receiving COUNTY's written authorization of DBE termination request, CONSULTANT must obtain COUNTY's written agreement for DBE replacement. CONSULTANT must find or demonstrate GFEs to find qualified DBE replacement firms to perform the work to the extent needed to meet the DBE commitment.

The following procedures shall be followed to request authorization to replace a DBE firm:

- 1. Submit a request to replace a DBE with other forces or material sources in writing to COUNTY which must include:
 - a. Description of remaining uncommitted work item made available for replacement DBE solicitation and participation.

- b. The proposed DBE replacement firm's business information, the work they have agreed to perform, and the following:
 - Description of scope of work and cost proposal
 - Proposed subcontract agreement and written confirmation of agreement to perform on the Contract
 - Revised Exhibit 10-02: Consultant Contract DBE Commitment
- 2. If CONSULTANT has not identified a DBE replacement firm, submits documentation of CONSULTANT's GFEs to use DBE replacement firms within seven (7) days of COUNTY's authorization to terminate the DBE. CONSULTANT may request COUNTY's approval to extend this submittal period to a total of fourteen (14) days. Submit documentation of actions taken to find a DBE replacement firm, such as:
 - a. Search results of certified DBEs available to perform the original DBE work identified and/or other work CONSULTANT had intended to self-perform, to the extent needed to meet DBE commitment
 - b. Solicitations of DBEs for performance of work identified
 - c. Correspondence with interested DBEs that may have included contract details and requirements
 - d. Negotiation efforts with DBEs that reflect why an agreement was not reached
 - e. If a DBE's quote was rejected, provide reasoning for the rejection, such as why the DBE was unqualified for the work, or why the price quote was unreasonable or excessive
 - f. Copies of each DBE's and non-DBE's price quotes for work identified, as COUNTY may contact the firms to verify solicitation efforts and determine if the DBE quotes are substantially higher
 - g. Additional documentation that supports CONSULTANT's GFE

COUNTY shall respond in writing to CONSULTANT'S DBE replacement request within five (5) business days.

F. Commitment and Utilization

COUNTY's DBE program must include a monitoring and enforcement mechanism to ensure that DBE commitments reconcile to DBE utilization.

COUNTY shall request CONSULTANT to:

1. Notify COUNTY's contract administrator or designated representative of any changes to its anticipated DBE participation

- 2. Provide this notification before starting the affected work
- 3. Maintain records including:
 - Name and business address of each 1st-tier subconsultant
 - Name and business address of each DBE subconsultant, DBE vendor, and DBE trucking company, regardless of tier
 - Date of payment and total amount paid to each business (see Exhibit 9-F Monthly Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Payment)

If CONSULTANT is a DBE CONSULTANT, they shall include the date of work performed by their own forces and the corresponding value of their work.

If a DBE is decertified before completing its work, the DBE must notify CONSULTANT in writing of the decertification date. If a business becomes a certified DBE before completing its work, the business must notify CONSULTANT in writing of the certification date. CONSULTANT shall submit the notifications to COUNTY. On work completion, CONSULTANT shall complete a Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE) Certification Statue Change, Exhibit 17-O, form and submit the form to COUNTY within thirty (30) days of contract acceptance.

Upon work completion, CONSULTANT shall complete Exhibit 17-F Final Report – Utilization of Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE), First-Tier Subcontractors and submit it to the COUNTY within ninety (90) days of contract acceptance. The COUNTY will withhold \$10,000 until the form is submitted. The COUNTY will release the withhold upon submission of the completed form.

If COUNTY reports of DBE participation to Caltrans, the COUNTY must display both commitments and attainments.

G. Commercially Useful Function (CUF)

DBEs must perform a commercially useful function (CUF) under 49 CFR 26.55 when performing work or supplying materials listed on the DBE Commitment form. The DBE value of work will only count toward the DBE commitment if the DBE performs a CUF. A DBE performs a CUF when it is responsible for execution of the work of the contract and is carrying out its responsibilities by actually performing, managing, and supervising the work involved. To perform a CUF, the DBE must also be responsible with respect to materials and supplies used on the contract, for negotiating price, determining quality and quantity, ordering the material, and installing (where applicable) and paying for the materials itself.

CONSULTANT must perform CUF evaluation for each DBE working on a federal-aid contract, with or without a DBE goal. Perform a CUF evaluation at the beginning of the DBE's work and continue to monitor the performance of CUF for the duration of the project.

CONSULTANT must provide written notification to COUNTY at least fifteen (15) days in advance of each DBE's initial performance of work or supplying materials for the Contract. The notification must include the DBE's name, work the DBE will perform on the contract, and the location, date, and time of where their work will take place.

Within ten (10) days of a DBE initially performing work or supplying materials on the Contract, CONSULTANT shall submit to the LPA the initial evaluation and validation of DBE performance of a CUF using the LAPM 9-J: Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Commercially Useful Function Evaluation. Include the following information with the submittal:

- Subcontract agreement with the DBE
- Purchase orders
- Bills of lading
- Invoices
- Proof of payment

CONSULTANT must monitor all DBE's performance of CUF by conducting quarterly evaluations and validations throughout their duration of work on the Contract using the LAPM 9-J: DBE Commercially Useful Function Evaluation. CONSULTANT must submit to COUNTY these quarterly evaluations and validations by the 5th of the month for the previous three months of work.

CONSULTANT must notify COUNTY immediately if they believe the DBE may not be performing a CUF. COUNTY will verify DBEs performance of CUF by reviewing the initial and quarterly submissions of LAPM 9-J: DBE Commercially Useful Function Evaluation, submitted supporting information, field observations, and through any additional COUNTY evaluations. The COUNTY must evaluate DBEs and their CUF performance throughout the duration of a Contract. COUNTY will provide written notice to the CONSULTANT and the DBE at least two (2) business days prior to any evaluation. The CONSULTANT and the DBE must participate in the evaluation. Upon completing the evaluation, COUNTY must share the evaluation results with the CONSULTANT and the DBE. An evaluation could include items that must be remedied upon receipt. If COUNTY determines the DBE is not performing a CUF, the CONSULTANT must suspend performance of the noncompliant work.

CONSULTANT and DBEs must submit any additional CUF related records and documents within five (5) business days of COUNTY's request such as:

- · Proof of ownership or lease and rental agreements for equipment
- Tax records
- Employee rosters
- Certified payroll records
- Inventory rosters

Failure to submit required DBE Commercially Useful Function Evaluation forms or requested records and documents can result in withholding of payment for the value of work completed by the DBE.

If CONSULTANT and/or COUNTY determine that a listed DBE is not performing a CUF in performance of their DBE committed work, CONSULTANT must immediately suspend performance of the noncompliant portion of the work. COUNTY may deny payment for the noncompliant portion of the work. COUNTY will ask the CONSULTANT to submit a corrective action plan (CAP) to the COUNTY within five (5) days of the noncompliant CUF determination. The CAP must identify how the CONSULTANT will correct the noncompliance findings for the remaining portion of the DBE's work. COUNTY has five (5) days to review the CAP in conjunction with the CONSULTANT's review. The CONSULTANT must implement the CAP within five (5) days of COUNTY's approval. COUNTY will then authorize the prior noncompliant portion of work for the DBE's committed work.

If corrective actions cannot be accomplished to ensure the DBE performs a commercially useful function on the Contract, CONSULTANT may have good cause to request termination of the DBE.

- H. A DBE does not perform a CUF if its role is limited to that of an extra participant in a transaction, contract, or project through which funds are passed in order to obtain the appearance of DBE participation. In determining whether a DBE is such an extra participant, examine similar transactions, particularly those in which DBEs do not participate.
- If a DBE does not perform or exercise responsibility for at least thirty percent (30%) of the total cost of its contract with its own work force, or the DBE subcontracts a greater portion of the work of the contract than would be expected on the basis of normal industry practice for the type of work involved, it will be presumed that it is not performing a CUF.
- J. CONSULTANT shall maintain records of materials purchased or supplied from all subcontracts entered into with certified DBEs. The records shall show the name and business address of each DBE or vendor and the total dollar amount actually paid each DBE or vendor, regardless of tier. The records shall show the date of payment and the total dollar figure paid to all firms. DBE prime consultants shall also show the date of work performed by their own forces along with the corresponding dollar value of the work.
- K. If a DBE subconsultant is decertified during the life of the Agreement, the decertified subconsultant shall notify CONSULTANT in writing with the date of decertification. If a subconsultant becomes a certified DBE during the life of the Agreement, the subconsultant shall notify CONSULTANT in writing with the date of certification. Any changes should be reported to COUNTY's Contract Administrator within thirty (30) days.

L. For projects awarded on or after March 1, 2020, but before September 1, 2023: after submitting an invoice for reimbursement that includes a payment to a DBE, but no later than the 10th of the following month, the prime contractor/consultant shall complete and email the Exhibit 9-F: Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Running Tally of Payments to <u>business.support.unit@dot.ca.gov</u> with a copy to the Agency.

For projects awarded on or after September 1, 2023: Exhibit 9-F is no longer required. Instead, by the 15th of the month following the month of any payment(s), the CONSULTANT must no submit Exhibit 9-P to COUNTY administering the contract. If the CONSULTANT does not make any payments to subconsultants, supplier(s), and/or manufacturers they must report "no payments were made to subs this month" and write this visibly and legibly on Exhibit 9-P.

M. Any subcontract entered into as a result of this Agreement shall contain all of the provisions of this section.

ARTICLE XLV

Compliance with Disability Acts: CONSULTANT shall comply with: (a) Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in federally assisted programs; (b) the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability irrespective of funding; and (c) all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to both the Rehabilitation Act and the ADA.

ARTICLE XLVI

Disputes:

- A. Any dispute, other than audit, concerning a question of fact arising under this Agreement that is not disposed of by agreement shall be decided by a committee consisting of COUNTY's Contract Administrator and the Department of Transportation Director, or designee, which may consider written or verbal information submitted by CONSULTANT.
- B. Not later than thirty (30) calendar days after completion of all deliverables necessary to complete the plans, specifications, and estimate, CONSULTANT may request review by COUNTY's Board of Supervisors of unresolved claims or disputes, other than audit. The request for review shall be submitted in writing.
- C. Neither the pendency of a dispute, nor its consideration by the committee, will excuse CONSULTANT from full and timely performance in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.
- D. CONSULTANT's failure to follow this dispute resolution procedure shall constitute a waiver of any and all claims arising out of or related to the dispute and a bar to any further proceedings or legal or equitable remedy.

ARTICLE XLVII

Inspection of Work: CONSULTANT and any subconsultants authorized herein shall permit COUNTY, the State of California, and the FHWA, if federal participating funds

are used in this Agreement, to review and inspect the project activities and files at all reasonable times during the performance period of this Agreement, including review and inspection on a daily basis.

ARTICLE XLVIII

Safety:

- A. CONSULTANT shall comply with OSHA regulations applicable to CONSULTANT regarding necessary safety equipment or procedures. CONSULTANT shall comply with safety instructions issued by COUNTY's Safety Officer and other COUNTY representatives. CONSULTANT's personnel and any subconsultants authorized herein shall wear hard hats and safety vests at all times while working on construction project sites.
- B. Pursuant to the authority contained in Section 591 of the Vehicle Code, COUNTY has determined that there are areas that may be within the limits of certain projects that are open to public traffic. CONSULTANT shall comply with all of the requirements set forth in Divisions 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15 of the Vehicle Code. CONSULTANT shall take all reasonably necessary precautions for safe operation of its vehicles and the protection of the traveling public from injury and damage from such vehicles.

ARTICLE XLIX

Claims Filed by COUNTY'S Construction Contractors:

- A. If claims are filed by COUNTY's construction contractors relating to work performed by CONSULTANT's personnel or subconsultants, and additional information or assistance from CONSULTANT's personnel or subconsultants is required in order to evaluate or defend against such claims, CONSULTANT agrees to make its personnel and/or subconsultants available for consultation with COUNTY's construction contract administration and legal staff and for testimony, if necessary, at depositions and at trial or arbitration proceedings.
- B. CONSULTANT's personnel and subconsultants that COUNTY considers essential to assist in defending against construction contractor claims will be made available on reasonable notice from COUNTY. Any consultation or testimony that may be required by COUNTY will be reimbursed at the same rates that are being paid for CONSULTANT's personnel services under Exhibit C hereto, unless the construction contractor claims are covered in whole or in part by ARTICLE XXX, Indemnity, in which case no compensation will be paid.
- C. Services of CONSULTANT's personnel or subconsultants in connection with COUNTY's construction contractor claims will be performed pursuant to a written contract amendment, if necessary, extending the termination date of this Agreement in order to finally resolve the claims.

ARTICLE L

National Labor Relations Board Certification: In accordance with Public Contract Code Section 10296, CONSULTANT hereby states under penalty of perjury that no more than one final unappealable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has

been issued against CONSULTANT within the immediately preceding two-year period, because of CONSULTANT's failure to comply with an order of a federal court that orders CONSULTANT to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board.

ARTICLE LI

Evaluation of CONSULTANT: CONSULTANT's performance will be evaluated by COUNTY. A copy of the evaluation will be sent to CONSULTANT for comments. The evaluation together with the comments shall be retained as part of the contract record.

ARTICLE LII

Title VI Assurances:

APPENDICES A - E of the TITLE VI ASSURANCES

[The <u>U.S. Department of Transportation Order No.1050.2A</u> requires all federal-aid Department of Transportation contracts between an agency and a consultant to contain Appendices A and E of the Title VI Assurances. Include Appendices B, C, and D if appliable as shown below. In addition, the CONSULTANT must include the Title VI Assurances Appendices A and E, and if applicable Appendices B, C, and D in all subcontracts to perform work under the contract.

The clauses of Appendix B of this Assurance shall be included as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States effecting or recording a transfer of real property, structures, use, or improvements thereon or interest therein to COUNTY.

The clauses set forth in Appendix C and Appendix D of this Assurance shall be included as a covenant running with the land, in any future deeds, leases, licenses, permits, or similar instruments entered into by COUNTY with other parties:

a. for the subsequent transfer of real property acquired or improved under the applicable activity, project, or program; and

b. for the construction or use of, or access to, space on, over, or under real property acquired or improved under the applicable activity, project, or program.]

APPENDIX A

During the performance of this Agreement, the CONSULTANT, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter collectively referred to as CONSULTANT) agrees as follows:

a. <u>Compliance with Regulations</u>: CONSULTANT shall comply with the regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally assisted programs of the Department of Transportation, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the REGULATIONS), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement.

- b. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>: CONSULTANT, with regard to the work performed by it during the Agreement, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, sex, national origin, religion, age, or disability in the selection and retention of sub-applicants, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. CONSULTANT shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by Section 21.5 of the Regulations, including employment practices when the Agreement covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the Regulations.
- c. <u>Solicitations for Sub-agreements, Including Procurements of Materials and Equipment:</u> In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by CONSULTANT for work to be performed under a Sub- agreement, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential sub-applicant or supplier shall be notified by CONSULTANT of the CONSULTANT's obligations under this Agreement and the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.
- d. Information and Reports: CONSULTANT shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the recipient or FHWA to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations or directives. Where any information required of CONSULTANT is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, CONSULTANT shall so certify to the recipient or FHWA as appropriate and shall set forth what efforts CONSULTANT has made to obtain the information.
- e. <u>Sanctions for Noncompliance</u>: In the event of CONSULTANT's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this Agreement, the recipient shall impose such Agreement sanctions as it or the FHWA may determine to be appropriate, including, at a minimum:
 - i. withholding of payments to CONSULTANT under the Agreement within a reasonable period of time, not to exceed ninety (90) days; and/or
 - ii. cancellation, termination, or suspension of the Agreement, in whole or in part.
- f. <u>Incorporation of Provisions</u>: CONSULTANT shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (6) in every sub-agreement, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto.

CONSULTANT shall take such action with respect to any sub-agreement or procurement as the recipient or FHWA may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance, provided, however, that, in the event CONSULTANT becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subapplicant or supplier as a result of such direction, CONSULTANT may request the recipient enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the State, and, in addition, CONSULTANT may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

APPENDIX B CLAUSES FOR DEEDS TRANFERRING UNITED STATES PROPERTY

The following clauses will be included in deeds effecting or recording the transfer of real property, structures, or improvements thereon, or granting interest therein from the United States pursuant to the provisions of Assurance 4:

NOW THEREFORE, the U.S. Department of Transportation as authorized by law and upon the condition that the recipient will accept title to the lands and maintain the project constructed thereon in accordance with Title 23 U.S.C., the regulations for the administration of the preceding statute, and the policies and procedures prescribed by the FHWA of the U.S. Department of Transportation in accordance and in compliance with all requirements imposed by Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation pertaining to and effectuating the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252; 42 U.S.C. § 2000d to 2000d-4), does hereby remise, release, quitclaim and convey unto the recipient all the right, title and interest of the U.S. Department of Transportation in and to said applicable lands.

(HABENDUM CLAUSE)

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said lands and interests therein unto the recipient and its successors forever, subject, however, to the covenants, conditions, restrictions and reservations herein contained as follows, which will remain in effect for the period during which the real property or structures are used for a purpose for which Federal financial assistance is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits and will be binding on the recipient, its successors and assigns. The recipient, in consideration of the conveyance of said lands and interest in lands, does hereby covenant and agree as a covenant running with the land for itself, its successors and assigns, that (1) no person will on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination with regard to any facility located wholly or in part on, over, or under such lands hereby conveyed [,] [and]* (2) that the recipient will use the lands and interests in lands and interest in lands so conveyed, in compliance with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation, Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as said Regulations and Acts may be amended [, and (3) that in the event of breach of any of the abovementioned nondiscrimination conditions, the Department will have a right to enter or re-enter said lands and facilities on said lands, and that above described land and facilities will thereon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the U.S. Department of Transportation and its assigns as such interest existed prior to this instruction1.*

In the event facilities are constructed, maintained, or otherwise operated on the property described in this (deed, license, lease, permit, etc.) for a purpose for which a U.S. Department of Transportation activity, facility, or program is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.) will maintain and operate such facilities and services in compliance with all requirements imposed by the Acts and Regulations(as may be amended) such that no person on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of said facilities.
- B. With respect to licenses, leases, permits, etc., in the event of breach of any of the above Nondiscrimination covenants, the recipient will have the right to terminate the (lease, license, permit, etc.) and to enter, re-enter, and repossess said lands and facilities thereon, and hold the same as if the (lease, license, permit, etc.) had never been made or issued.*
- C. Electronic Signatures: Each party agrees that the electronic signatures, whether digital or encrypted, of the parties included in this Agreement, are intended to authenticate this writing and to have the same force and effect as manual signatures. Electronic Signature means any electronic visual symbol or signature attached to or logically associated with a record and executed and adopted by a party with the intent to sign such record, including facsimile or email electronic signatures, pursuant to the California Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (Civil Code sections 1633.1 to 1633.17) as amended from time to time.

ARTICLE LVII

Partial Invalidity: If any provision, part of a provision, sentence, or word of the Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions, parts, sentences, or words will continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

No Third-Party Beneficiaries: Nothing in this Agreement is intended, nor will be deemed, to confer rights or remedies upon any person or legal entity not a party to this Agreement.

ARTICLE LX

Waiver: No failure on the part of the parties to exercise any rights under this Agreement, and no course of dealing with respect to any right hereunder, shall operate as a waiver of that right, nor shall any single or partial exercise of any right preclude the exercise of any other right. The remedies herein provided are cumulative and are not exclusive of any other remedies provided by law.

Exhibit A

Scope of Work

Task 1: Project Management, Meetings, and Coordination

Upon receipt of Notice to Proceed, CONSULTANT shall attend a Project kickoff meeting with the COUNTY and Project team to establish communication protocols, exchange project data, and discuss the proposed Project alignment, anticipated limits of disturbance, construction methods, areas of controversy (if any), and expectations for deliverables and schedule. CONSULTANT shall consult with the COUNTY on an asneeded basis, as requested by the COUNTY, to provide environmental planning support for the Project which is anticipated to include coordination with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and/or other regulatory agencies as needed for documentation associated with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Categorical Exclusion (CE).

CONSULTANT's Project Manager and lead environmental planner shall attend up to ten (10) Project coordination meetings, including the Project kickoff meeting, with COUNTY staff as requested by the COUNTY. Project meetings are anticipated to occur bi-weekly (twice per month) for up to one (1) hour via Microsoft Teams.

Other Project management tasks include formal and informal communications with COUNTY staff and Project team members, tracking the Project budget, invoicing, preparing invoice progress reports, and reviewing schedule progress.

Deliverables

- Attend up to ten (10) Project coordination meetings (Microsoft Teams)
- Meeting minutes following Project coordination meetings (electronic format within one [1] business day)

Schedule

 CONSULTANT shall distribute meeting minutes following each Project coordination meeting for COUNTY review and comment within twenty-four (24) hours (or one [1] business day) after the Project coordination meeting

Task 2: Preliminary Environmental Study (PES) Form Review

CONSULTANT shall review the draft PES Form that has been prepared by COUNTY staff and revise or update the draft PES Form as needed within one (1) week of receipt from the COUNTY to facilitate an expeditious approval with Caltrans. This scope of

work also includes time to coordinate with COUNTY staff as well as Caltrans to finalize the PES Form for Caltrans approval and assumes there would be one (1) round of comments from Caltrans on the PES Form before finalization and approval.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft PES Form (electronic format)
- One (1) Final PES Form (electronic format)

Schedule

Review or update Draft PES within one (1) week of receipt from COUNTY

Task 3: Area of Potential Effects (APE) Map

CONSULTANT shall prepare a draft Archaeological and Biological APE Map based on the AutoCAD boundary to be provided by the COUNTY or COUNTY's engineer and current Caltrans requirements. The APE Map shall be plotted on an aerial photograph at a scale of 1 inch = 200 feet per Caltrans standards.

CONSULTANT shall coordinate with the COUNTY and COUNTY's engineer to ensure that the APE Map considers the proposed improvement features and temporary impact areas, including construction staging areas.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft APE Map (electronic format)
- One (1) Final APE Map (electronic format)

Schedule

- The Draft APE Map shall be submitted to the COUNTY and Caltrans for approval prior to the commencement of technical studies and within two (2) weeks of receipt of the AutoCAD files to be provided by the COUNTY or COUNTY's engineer.
- A final APE Map shall be submitted within one (1) week of receipt of COUNTY and Caltrans comments.

Task 4: Natural Environment Study (NES) Report

CONSULTANT biologists shall conduct a site assessment of the 2.15-mile proposed trail alignment including any associated staging areas or other areas of potential disturbance based on the APE established as part of Task 3. The site assessment shall consist of mapping habitats within and immediately adjacent to the project footprint, staging areas, and other areas of potential disturbance. Digital photographs of the current environment shall be taken in the field. Upon completion of the site assessment,

CONSULTANT shall prepare a NES Report consistent with the Caltrans template and requirements for NESs. A draft NES Report shall be provided to the COUNTY and Caltrans for review. Upon incorporation of COUNTY and Caltrans comments, a final NES Report shall be submitted and included as an attachment to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and NEPA documentation. This scope of work assumes that CONSULTANT shall respond to a single round of COUNTY and Caltrans comments up to the budgeted amount. Additional rounds of comments may require a contract amendment.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft NES Report (electronic format)
- One (1) Final NES Report (electronic format)

Task 5: Biological Assessment (BA)

A CONSULTANT biologist shall prepare a Section 7 BA according to Caltrans' format that analyzes the potential effect of the proposed 2.15-mile trail alignment on federally listed plant and wildlife species that may occur within the designated APE. Federally listed and candidate species that may occur within the Project's APE include northwestern pond turtle (Actinemys marmorata), California red-legged frog (CRLF) (Rana draytonii), foothill yellow-legged frog (Rana boylii), and Pine Hill endemic plant species including El Dorado bedstraw (Galium californicum ssp. sierrae), Layne's butterweed (Packera layneae), Pine Hill ceanothus (Ceanothus roderickii), Pine Hill flannelbush (Fremontodendron decumbens), and Stebbins' morning glory (Calystegia stebbinsii). The field data collected during execution of Task 4 (NES) shall be utilized to prepare the BA, and no separate site visit shall be necessary. The BA shall address the field data collected and potential direct and indirect effects to habitat for species federally listed as threatened or endangered or candidate species for listing under the Federal Endangered Species Act (ESA). A draft BA shall be provided in electronic format for COUNTY and Caltrans review and comment. Upon receipt of COUNTY and Caltrans comments, a final BA shall be submitted to the COUNTY and Caltrans to be included as an attachment to the NEPA document. This scope of work assumes that CONSULTANT shall respond to a single round of COUNTY and Caltrans comments up to the budgeted amount. Additional rounds of comments may require a contract amendment.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft Section 7 BA (electronic format)
- One (1) Final Section 7 BA

Task 6: Archaeological Survey Report, Historic Property Survey Report, and Historical Resources Evaluation Report

Task 6.1: Archaeological Survey Report (ASR)

CONSULTANT shall prepare an ASR based on current Caltrans requirements. To prepare the ASR, CONSULTANT shall conduct background research and a field survey as described below.

Cultural Resources Records Search: As part of the background research, CONSULTANT shall conduct a records search for the APE and a 0.5-mile radius at the North Central Information Center (NCIC) of the California Historical Resources Information System in Sacramento, California. A literature review, as necessary, of archaeological, ethnographic, historical, and environmental publications and maps shall also be conducted. The records search and literature review shall identify previously recorded or otherwise known cultural resources and previous cultural resource studies conducted within or adjacent to the APE. As part of the background research, CONSULTANT shall contact the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) to request a search of the Sacred Lands File (SLF) for the APE. The results of the SLF search, as well as a contact list for tribal organizations and individuals, shall be provided to the COUNTY for use by the Local Assistance-District Native American Coordinator (LA-DNAC) to send outreach letters to listed tribal representatives.

Cultural Resources Survey: CONSULTANT shall conduct a pedestrian archaeological field survey of the APE to identify the presence of precontact and/or historic-era archaeological cultural resources that could be impacted by project activities. The fieldwork shall consist of an intensive visual inspection of the APE's ground surface by CONSULTANT staff on foot using transects spaced 5- to 10-meters apart. During the survey, the ground surface shall be examined for the presence of precontact artifacts (e.g., flaked stone tools, tool-making debris, stone milling tools), historic artifacts (e.g., metal, glass, ceramics), sediment discoloration that might indicate the presence of midden, and depressions and other features that might indicate the former presence of structures or buildings (e.g., postholes, foundations). If resources are encountered during the survey, they shall be photographed, their position(s) shall be recorded with Global Positioning System (GPS) equipment, and they shall be documented on the appropriate California Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) 523 Series forms.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft ASR (electronic format)
- One (1) Final ASR (electronic format)

Schedule

 The Draft ASR shall be submitted to the COUNTY and Caltrans for review within eight (8) weeks of approval of the APE Map. A revised ASR shall be submitted within two (2) weeks of receipt of COUNTY and Caltrans comments.

Task 6.2: Historic Property Survey Report (HPSR)

CONSULTANT shall prepare a HPSR based on current Caltrans requirements. The HPSR serves as a summary report to which the ASR and additional documentation are attached. The HPSR short form shall be used.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft HPSR (electronic format)
- One (1) Final HPSR (electronic format)

Schedule

The draft HPSR shall be submitted to the COUNTY and Caltrans within eight (8) weeks of approval of the APE Map. A revised HPSR shall be submitted within two (2) weeks of receipt of COUNTY and Caltrans comments.

Task 6.3: Historical Resources Evaluation Report (HRER)

CONSULTANT'S subconsultant, Cogstone Resource Management (Cogstone), shall prepare the HRER following approval of the APE Map. Cogstone shall document all historic buildings, structures, objects, districts, cultural landscapes, and historical archaeological sites within the project APE. It is assumed that a maximum of one (1) historic railroad shall require recording or updating on DPR 523 forms.

Key tasks to support the preparation of the HRER include:

- Historical Society Consultations: Cogstone shall contact interested local historic preservation groups to obtain information and concerns regarding the APE. Cogstone shall follow-up two times. All letters shall be sent via United State Postal Service (USPS) Certified Mail.
- **Background Research:** Cogstone's Architectural Historian shall conduct archival research and review associated documents for a maximum of twenty-five (25) historic buildings.
- Built Environment Survey: Cogstone's Architectural Historian shall conduct a built environment survey. This scope assumes one historic railroad shall require updating on DPR 523 forms.

• **HRER:** Cogstone's Architectural Historian shall prepare the HRER in accordance with Volume 2 (Cultural) of Caltrans' SER Handbook. Three rounds of responses to comments and revision of the Draft HRER are included.

Cogstone's scope of work includes time for communication with the project team and response to comments of the draft HRER. Following receipt of COUNTY and Caltrans comments on the Draft HRER, Cogstone shall revise the report and prepare a final HRER for COUNTY and Caltrans approval.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft of HRER (electronic format)
- One (1) Final of HRER (electronic format)
- One (1) set of Draft DPR 523 forms (electronic format)
- One (1) set of Final DPR 523 forms (electronic format)

Task 6.4: Finding of Effect (FOE) (Optional)

If deemed necessary based on the results of the reports to be conducted in Tasks 6.1 through 6.3 above, CONSULTANT shall prepare a FOE to document whether or not the proposed Project would result in an adverse effect to cultural resources in the APE under Section 106. The scope of the analysis shall be dependent on the types, nature, and significance of cultural resources subject to effect from implementation of the proposed Project. As those effects are currently unknown, this scope of work assumes one (1) historic period architectural resource would require a FOE analysis. CONSULTANT shall prepare a draft and final FOE by applying the Criteria of Adverse Effect to the Project and evaluating how the Project may affect the historic properties within the APE. The FOE shall be based on the results of the HPSR/ASR package. If there are additional resource(s) found that may be eligible, then additional evaluation can be conducted following authorization of a contract amendment.

Deliverables

- One (1) Draft FOE (electronic format)
- One (1) Final FOE (electronic format)

Schedule

- The draft FOE shall be submitted to the COUNTY and Caltrans within three (3) weeks of authorization of this task by the COUNTY.
- A final FOE shall be submitted within one (1) week of receipt of COUNTY and Caltrans comments.

Task 6.5: Tribal Consultation Support (Optional)

As requested by the COUNTY, CONSULTANT's Cultural Resources Group staff shall act as extension of COUNTY staff to assist with government-to-government outreach and consultation under Assembly Bill (AB) 52. CONSULTANT shall draft notification letters to be sent on COUNTY letterhead to Tribes who have registered with the COUNTY requesting to be notified of projects. This scope assumes up to twelve (12) hours for a senior archaeologist or Principal Cultural Resources Specialist to assist with consultation meetings, including attendance via virtual meetings or telephone, and providing meeting summary notes afterwards. The scope does not include any in-person meetings; however, in-person meetings may be accommodated if adequate budget remains in this task or upon authorization of a contract amendment. In addition, Cogstone shall provide technical assistance in support of Section 106 notifications and consultation. The scope for this task assumes up to an additional fifteen (15) hours for a Principal Archaeologist to provide assistance with consultation meetings, including attendance via telephone and providing meeting minutes afterwards, if requested.

Task 7: CEQA & NEPA Documentation

Task 7.1: NEPA Documentation Support

CONSULTANT shall provide as-needed support to Caltrans with the preparation of the NEPA document, which is anticipated to be a NEPA CE. Support is anticipated to include informal and formal communications with Caltrans staff as well as coordination to provide project details, supporting technical studies, and updates on schedule. This scope of work assumes up to twenty-eight (28) hours of CONSULTANT staff time shall be needed to support Caltrans with the NEPA documentation.

Task 7.2: CEQA Administrative Draft Initial Study/Mitigated Negative Declaration (IS/MND)

CONSULTANT shall prepare an IS, assumed MND, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15063 for the proposed Project. An Initial Study Checklist based on Appendix G of the CEQA Guidelines shall be used to document potential environmental impacts resulting from implementation of the proposed Project. The IS shall contain all mandatory elements including the following:

• Project Description: The Project description shall describe the baseline information for the Project alignment, as well as the major elements of the

Project, and shall include a discussion of the proposed construction and operation of the Project;

- Figures: Figures identifying the local and regional location of the Project alignment and other Project improvements as relevant to CEQA analysis; and
- Impact Analysis: The checklist shall include analysis for each impact question in support of each conclusion, and it shall include discussions (as required by current CEQA statute) relevant to aesthetics, agricultural and forest resources, air quality (AQ), biological resources, cultural resources, energy, geology and soils, greenhouse gases (GHG), hazards and hazardous materials, hydrology and water quality, land use, mineral resources, noise, population and housing, public services, recreation, transportation, tribal cultural resources, utilities/service systems, wildfire, and mandatory findings of significance.

Impact analysis relevant to biological resources shall be based on the NES report to be prepared by CONSULTANT as described in Task 4 as well as the Wetlands Study to be prepared as described in Task 8 below if necessary and authorized by the COUNTY. The cultural resources section of the IS/MND shall be based on the ASR/HPSR/HRER reports to be prepared by CONSULTANT and Cogstone as described in Tasks 6.1 through 6.3. A summary of the AB 52 tribal outreach to be conducted by the COUNTY, with support from CONSULTANT if authorized, shall be provided in the tribal cultural resources section of the IS/MND. Impact analysis relevant to hazards and hazardous materials shall be based on the Initial Site Assessment (ISA) to be prepared by CONSULTANT'S subconsultant PARIKH Consultants, Inc. (PARIKH), if authorized by the COUNTY.

CONSULTANT understands that the Project would consist of a new Class I multiuse trail improvement and would not result in new roads or changes to the capacity of existing roads. Therefore, the Project would be exempt from air quality conformity analysis per 40 CFR 93.126 and analysis of project air quality and GHG emissions effects and impacts shall be focused on Project construction. This scope of work includes the preparation of AQ, GHG emissions, and energy analyses to be incorporated directly into the IS/MND. The analyses to be conducted shall include identifying levels of criteria pollutant and GHG emissions estimated to occur as a result of Project construction. The letter report shall identify the methodology and software used, relevant laws, applicable regulations, construction assumptions (i.e., duration, phasing, vehicle use, equipment types), and guantitative estimates of criteria air pollutants and GHG emissions. The potential for construction AQ and GHG emissions impacts shall be analyzed in accordance with the El Dorado County Air Quality Management District's (EDAQMD) Guide to Air Quality Assessment, and in consideration of AQ and GHG emissions assessment guidance from the Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District (SMAQMD). It is expected that the Project would not result in operational emissions. As such, operational air quality

and GHG emissions impacts shall not be quantified, but rather, shall be addressed qualitatively.

Regarding potential noise impacts, CONSULTANT shall estimate construction noise levels at the nearest noise- sensitive receptors within the noise section of the IS/MND (no technical report proposed). All other resource sections are anticipated to be addressed qualitatively.

Where relevant, the IS/MND sections shall identify feasible and tangible mitigation measures to reduce impacts to less-than-significant levels as applicable to relevant thresholds for all environmental impacts identified in the CEQA IS Checklist as "potentially significant." This scope of work assumes that all potentially significant impacts can be mitigated to less-than-significant levels and that an IS/MND shall meet the requirements for environmental review pursuant to CEQA.

CONSULTANT shall prepare an Administrative Draft IS/MND for review by the COUNTY with supporting technical reports included as appendices

Task 7.3: CEQA Public Review Draft IS/MND

Upon receipt of a single consolidated set of written comments from the COUNTY, CONSULTANT shall revise the Administrative Draft IS/MND to address all comments from the COUNTY. CONSULTANT shall provide the COUNTY with a tracked changes copy of the revisions as well as a clean Public Review Draft IS/MND. CONSULTANT shall also prepare a Notice of Intent (NOI) to adopt an MND, Notice of Completion (NOC), and Summary Form for COUNTY review and comment. Electronic copies of the Public Review Draft IS/MND (including appendices) and final notices shall be submitted to the COUNTY.

It is assumed that the COUNTY shall circulate the NOI in accordance with Section 15072(b) of the CEQA Guidelines and file the NOI with the El Dorado County Clerk. As CONSULTANT is already approved to submit environmental documents to State Clearinghouse on behalf of El Dorado County, this scope of work assumes that CONSULTANT shall submit the Public Review Draft IS/MND, NOI, NOC, and Summary Form to the State Clearinghouse on behalf of the COUNTY.

Task 7.4: CEQA Final IS/MND

Following the close of the 30-day public comment period, CONSULTANT shall consult with the COUNTY and review written comments received on the Public Review Draft IS/MND. CONSULTANT shall prepare draft responses to comments received on the Public Review Draft IS/MND for COUNTY review. It is assumed that comments shall be minor (not requiring additional analysis or studies), up to ten (10) comment letters shall be received, and responses shall consist primarily of clarifying information and directing commenters to the appropriate discussion in the environmental document. Once the COUNTY has reviewed and approved the responses to comments, the comments and responses shall be integrated into a Final IS/MND.

CONSULTANT shall also prepare a Mitigation Monitoring Reporting Program (MMRP) in accordance with Section 15074(d) of the CEQA Guidelines. CONSULTANT shall provide the COUNTY with an electronic of the draft MMRP for review and comment.

CONSULTANT's Project Manager shall plan to attend one (1) public hearing virtually to respond to questions on the analysis presented in the IS/MND as needed. It is assumed the COUNTY shall pay associated California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) filing fees, and the NOD shall be filed by COUNTY staff.

Task 8: Wetlands Study (Optional)

CONSULTANT wetland scientists shall prepare a wetlands study (also referred to as an aquatic resources delineation [ARD]) of the approximately 2.15-mile-long alignment. Mapping of aquatic resources shall follow the mapping guidelines stipulated by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) (February 10, 2016) USACE Updated Map and Drawing Standards for the South Pacific Division Regulatory Program and shall be consistent with the State Water Resources Control Board (April 6, 2021) Procedures for Discharges of Dredged or Fill Material to Waters of the State (Section III, Wetland Delineation). CONSULTANT shall also follow the USACE Wetlands Delineation Manual (USACE 1987), the Regional Supplement to the Corps of Engineers Wetland Delineation Manual: Arid West Region (Version 2.0; USACE 2008), and the National Ordinary High Water Mark (OHWM) Field Delineation Manual for Rivers and Streams (Version: Interim). As applicable, the ARD shall also incorporate the final rule amending the definition of Clean Water Act (CWA) "waters of the U.S.," as issued by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and USACE on August 29, 2023, in response to the May 25, 2023, U.S. Supreme Court Decision in Sackett v. EPA.

Upon completion of the desktop and field assessments, CONSULTANT shall prepare a preliminary ARD Report presenting the methods and results of the delineation. The ARD report shall be based on CONSULTANT's quantification of waters of the U.S. and State on the Project alignment using the current regulations, written policies, and guidance from the regulatory agencies. The jurisdictional boundaries identified within the ARD are subject to verification by the applicable resource agencies. CONSULTANT shall also incorporate comments from the USACE and Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB), as applicable, and shall attend a field verification meeting with USACE, if necessary (assumes up to ten [10] staff hours for field verification and report revisions).

Task 9: Initial Site Assessment (Optional)

PARIKH shall perform a Phase 1 ISA for the project based on American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) E1527-21, Standard Practice for Environmental Site Assessments. The purpose of the ISA is to identify potentially hazardous waste sites

and evaluate environmental factors that may have affected soil and groundwater quality within the Project limits due to past or present activities or incidents. The objective of the ISA is to identify recognized environmental conditions (RECs) and activity and use limitations (AULs) as defined by ASTM E 1527-13. The following tasks shall be performed:

- A records review consisting of a search of federal, State, and COUNTY regulatory databases to find documentation relating to environmental incidents, hazardous waste sites, RECs, or AULs that could affect the Project.
- Conduct a site reconnaissance of the Project alignment and adjoining publicly accessible areas for visual evidence of RECs or adverse environmental conditions.
- Review historical aerial photographs, topographic, and Sanborn maps that may indicate the presence of RECs or adverse environmental conditions.
- Provide an estimate of the risk level associated with potential RECs and/or adverse environmental conditions.

Upon completion of these activities, PARIKH shall prepare a Draft and Final ISA. This scope of work assumes that PARIKH shall respond to a single round of COUNTY comments up to the budgeted amount.

Task 10: Environmentally Sensitive Area Action Plan (Optional)

CONSULTANT staff who meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Archeology (36 CFR Part 61) shall prepare an Environmentally Sensitive Area Action Plan in the event that areas of archaeological sensitivity (e.g., known or newly identified archaeological sites) are identified during the preparation of the cultural resources technical studies to be prepared as described in Task 6. The Environmentally Sensitive Area Action Plan shall describe the actions and responsible party assignments necessary to protect historic properties from potential direct effects during implementation of the Project. The Environmentally Sensitive Area Action Plan shall conform to the requirements of the Caltrans Standard Environmental Reference (SER) Exhibit 2.11, Environmentally Sensitive Area Action Plan Format and Content Guide (12/18/19), and shall be submitted, in draft form, to the COUNTY and Caltrans for review and comment. This scope of work assumes that CONSULTANT shall respond to a single round of COUNTY and Caltrans comments up to the budgeted amount. Additional rounds of comments may require a contract amendment.

- One (1) Final environmentally Sensitive Area Action Plan (electronic format)

Task 11: Extended Phase Investigation (XPI) (Optional)

If the ASR identifies potential resources following the completion of the fieldwork to be conducted as described in Task 6.1, CONSULTANT staff who meet the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Archeology (36 CFR Part 61) shall prepare and implement an XPI Work Plan to identify the potential for buried archaeological cultural resources in the APE. The XPI Work Plan would describe the methods of investigation, decision thresholds, and implementation timelines for fieldwork necessary to archaeologically test those portions of the APE with an elevated sensitivity for buried deposits. The XPI Work Plan shall conform to the requirements of the Caltrans SER Exhibit 5.2, Extended Phase I Proposal Format and Content Guide (6/15/21), and shall be submitted, in draft form, to the COUNTY and Caltrans for review and comment. As the types, nature, and significance of cultural resources that may be encountered during the fieldwork for the ASR are currently unknown, this scope of work assumes one (1) moderately complex archaeological cultural resources would require further investigation.

Following approval, CONSULTANT cultural resources staff shall implement the approved XPI Work Plan, conducting all necessary fieldwork to achieve the objectives of the plan. The results of the investigation shall be documented in an XPI Findings Report that shall conform to the requirements of the Caltrans SER Exhibit 5.3, Extended Phase I Report Format and Content Guide (6/15/21). The XPI Findings Report shall be submitted, in draft form, to the COUNTY and Caltrans for review and comment. No artifacts shall be collected as part of the field investigation.
