Thousands of seniors, workers, and families in EDC can't afford to live here.

- 3,555 low-income renter households in EDC lack access to an affordable home.
- 70% of extremely low-income (ELI) households spend more than half their income on housing—leaving little for essentials like food, healthcare, and transportation.
- Renters need to earn \$35.21/hour (2.2 times the minimum wage) to afford the average asking rent of \$1,831/month.

A Housing Crisis Hurts the Entire Community.

When families and seniors spend most of their income on rent, they have **less to buy groceries**, **support local businesses**, **donate to charities**, **or invest in education and job growth**. Affordable housing means more financial stability for our residents and a stronger local economy.
