



- Foothill counties (El Dorado, Amador, Calaveras, Tuolumne) took the lead in exploring alternative models




# **Reorganization Outcomes**

- Reduce administration and build stronger programs
- Maximize Efficiencies eliminate redundancy of administration, budgeting, and other tasks that are duplicated at the county and UC levels
- Pool Resources combine resources to provide stronger program support and be more competitive for new university positions
- Increase resiliency to fluctuating budgets stabilize funding to continue the highest quality programs and increase the resources focused on programs

# **Current Organizational Structure**

- In each County
  - Administrator; County Dept head and UC County Director
  - University Advisors (Agriculture, Natural Resources, Nutrition, Livestock)
  - 4H Program Coordinator
  - Master Gardener Coordinator
  - Master Food Preserver Coordinator
  - Clerical Support
  - Fiscal Manager
  - Program Support Staff

#### University of California Cooperative Extension Current Model



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
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# **Proposed Organizational Structure**

#### For the Region

- Eliminate Administrator at county level and eliminate multiple reporting entities
- One administrator that serves entire area (.5 FTE)
- All Advisors would serve the region
- 4H Program Coordinators across region
- Master Gardener Coordinators across region
- Master Food Preserver Coordinators across region
- Implement an administrative hub with fiscal support, program support and administrative support for entire area



Programmatic Coverage – September 2010 (El Dorado, Amador, Calaveras & Tuolumne Counties)

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


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Programmatic Coverage - Proposed July 2011 (El Dorado, Amador, Calaveras & Tuolumne Counties)

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# Implementation

- UCCE would no longer be a county department
- County would enter into an Interlocal Agreement between the other counties and the University
- County staff positions would end and new University positions created
- An advisory committee would be created to work with the MCP Director

# Impacts to Budget

- Eliminating redundancies and cost sharing will result in savings.
  - Existing model: 2011/2012 Net County Cost \$299,842
  - New model: 2011/12 Net County Cost \$269,858
    - 10% reduction
- Moving UCCE out of a county department will result in savings (A-87 costs, internal department costs, personnel costs, liability, insurance).

# Cooperative Extension will still be local.

- UC will maintain an office in each county for program delivery.
- The central administrative office will be housed in the El Dorado county.
- Amador, Calaveras and Tuolumne would be open 2.5 days a week.





#### Can you really do more with less?

Yes, in fact more resources could be made available through:

- Capturing administrative efficiencies and re-directing funds to program delivery
- Larger populations or acreage may attract more or greater grant funds





# What will happen to the volunteer programs?

- Master Gardener, Master Food Preserver, and 4-H Youth Development volunteers will continue to serve at the local level.
- 4-H community clubs will keep their local presence.





Won't staff be stretched out over a larger area?

- Technically yes . . .
- •Each staff will have a more defined technical area.
- •New University advisors covering other areas will be made available.
- You'll be able to draw upon an expanded pool of expertise.







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
