Mike was a passenger in his own car, having given the keys to a friend because Mike knew he was too tired to drive - and the friend fell asleep at the wheel. Michael was in a coma for 3 weeks, and has been in one medical facility or another for the last almost 11 months. He is currently residing at Placerville Pines in Placerville. Mike has made an amazing recovery from his many injuries (broken rt knee, badly broken rt femur, broken rt elbow, broken rt forearm, lacerated liver, broken rib, jaw broken in 2 places, numerous facial fractures, and 5 separate and distinct brain injuries - any one of which could have been fatal. Mike has had extensive physical, occupational and speech therapies, and can now maneuver himself around on his motorized wheelchair. He just had his feeding tube removed, the last 'connection' to any machines.
