

 Attempted Murder and Manslaughter
- All off the above apply, Even If The Result Of A Plea Agreement





Race Blind Charging

- Effective Date 01/01/25
- DAO Must Establish & Implement RBC Procedures
- DAO Must Record And Report RBC Decisions
- Make Data Available To Defense
- Make Data Available To Educational & Research Institutions (Governed By PRA Rules)
- Approximately 5,360 Cases Submitted Each Year Will be Subject to RBC Procedure
- This New Process Will Add the Workload of Approximately 1 FT DDA
- In Addition, the RBC Process Requires the Development of a Process to Redact Reports, Record Decisions, Audit, Maintain and Report Data



Racial Justice Act

- Creates Post-Conviction Process To Challenge <u>Any Conviction</u> Based On Claims Of Racial Disparity
- Challenges May Be Based On Statistical Analysis Of Data
- Current Data Set Incomplete, Thus Subject to Manipulative Interpretation



Race Blind Charging And Racial Justice Act = Tip of the Data Iceberg....

- Justice Data Accountability and Transparency Act ("J-DATA")
 - Requires DAO to Track and Report <u>103 Specific Data Points</u>
 - Many of these Data Points are not Currently Recorded or Tracked by CMS
 - Timeline:

10/01/23 - Advisory Board Formed

07/01/24 - Release of Data Dictionary by DOJ

03/01/27 – DAO Data Collection Required

06/01/27 – DAO Data Reporting Required
