

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California Department of Food and Agriculture

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It is my pleasure to submit the 2023 Crop and Livestock Report for El Dorado & Alpine Counties. The report is produced in accordance with Section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code and summarizes the acreage, production and gross values of the Counties' agricultural commodities,

The gross crop value for the County of El Dorado was \$80.5 million, representing an increase of 64.9% over the 2022 value and an increase of 1.1% over the 2021 value. Apples thrived in 2023, producing over 10 tons per acre and resulting in a total value for apples of \$23.2 million. This is a whopping 344% increase over 2022, when production was extremely low due to damage from a hard April freeze. Livestock was the second highest value crop at \$16.8 million, a 27.4% increase over the 2022 value. Wine grapes also rebounded after a hard year, yielding a total value of \$9.75 million, a 133% increase over the 2022 value. Monetary values in this report are F.O.B. (Freight On Board) and do not reflect net returns or profits realized by the growers, It is estimated that the impact of agriculture to the County of El Dorado's economy totaled approximately \$823 million in 2023, of which, Apple Hill and value-added products contributed an estimated \$395 million while the wine industry added another \$409 million.

Alpine County's gross crop value for 2023 was estimated to be \$7.34 million. This represents an increase of 10.2% from the 2022 values.

El Dorado County Wine Grapes

El Dorado wine grapes are grown at high elevations in a diverse range of microclimates, perfect for cultivating a wide range of different varietals. Our strength as a wine region is in our diversity.

As of 2023, there were 82 distinct varietals planted in El Dorado County. Of these 82 varietals, 34 of them are featured on our annual Wine Grape Survey Report*, which details the acreage, production, and price of each varietal, as well as a miscellaneous red and miscellaneous white category.


In 2023 the top 5 highest production varietals were:


- 1. Cabernet Sauvignon 1,062 tons
- 2. Zinfandel 675 tons
- 3. Merlot 470 tons
- 4. Grenache 409 tons
- 5. Syrah 359 tons

The top 3 white varietals were:

- 1. Chardonnay 162 tons
- 2. Viognier 125 tons
- 3. Sauvignon Blanc 79 tons

Most of the vineyards and wineries in El Dorado County are family owned and operated, tended with care and skill, and as a result they produce grapes of excellent

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT SUMMARY

In 2023, the El Dorado & Alpine County Agriculture and Weights & Measures Department:

- Inspected 415 weighing devices, that include certified producers' scales, individual farm scales, winery platform scales, and livestock scales.
- Inspected 1,680 measuring devices, retail motor fuel dispensers, electric meters, water meters, and propane gas meters. Scales and meters are inspected to ensure consumer protection and equity in the marketplace.
- Placed 874 insect traps throughout the counties in both urban and rural areas and serviced them 5,126 times to detect and prevent the establishment of exotic and harmful pests (Pest Detection Program).
- Placed 422 Glassy-winged Sharpshooter (GWSS) traps throughout the county in rural, urban, and nursery settings, inspecting and servicing them 4,573 times (Pest Management Program).
- Inspected 156 nursery stock shipments entering the county from known GWSS infected areas (Pest Management Program).
- Provided management of wildlife that were depredating livestock, property and/or presenting a hazard to public health and safety (Wildlife Management Program).
- Coordinated invasive weed control, education and eradication among federal, state, county and private agencies in El Dorado and Alpine Counties. Participated as an integral partner in the El Dorado, Lake Tahoe Basin, and Alpine/Upper Carson Weed Management Area Groups (Pest Eradication Program).
- Conducted the Pesticide Monitoring Program to protect public health, property, the
 environment and agricultural workers in partnership with the California Department
 of Pesticide Regulation (Pesticide Use Monitoring Program).
- Issued 72 Certified Producer's Certificates for growers selling at Certified Farmer's Markets,
- Issued 13 Farmers Market Certificates.
- · Reviewed 30 Organic Registrations.

PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

Agricultural & Livestock Access Pass

What is the Ag Pass?

The agricultural & livestock access pass program (ag pass) is a program that allows commercial agricultural and livestock operators to access their crops and livestock during a wildfire evacuation in order to perform essential feeding and watering activities.

To qualify for an ag pass, operators must have a minimum of 5 acres of crops or a minimum of 50 head of livestock (including in utero), 100 poultry or rabbits, or 50 beehives. To obtain an ag pass, they must first attend a 3 hour training session, and then a 1 hour refresher course every year after that to instruct farmers and ranchers on proper safety practices behind fire lines and how to use the ag pass in event of an emergency.

In 2023, El Dorado County held our first ever training session for the program and issued 43 passes to local operators.
