 - 1 FTE MH Clinician will be assigned to provide services to the 0-5 population and families and collaborate closely with other HHSA Division programs serving this population.
 - 0.5 FTE Office Assistant I/II will be assigned to the SUD program to result in a 1 FTE Office Assistant I/II position.






- SLT crisis team continue to collaborate with STACS officer to address crisis needs in the community.

WS:

WS PES continues to meet with PHF, Marshall, EDSO, and Placerville PD to improve our relationships and understanding. i.e. PES forwards our crisis schedule for the month to Marshall/local LE so that they can contact PES directly when needed. PES/PERT continues to familiarize themselves with our partners and cross train into other services provided by EDC BH to provide effective linkage to the crisis clients with the goal of achieving a safe, dignified, and least restrictive solution for our clients in crisis. With this goal in mind, PERT provided field support to a client and provider struggling in the field. PERT provided PES interventions and psychoeducation to achieve a positive outcome in the least restrictive environment.

South Lake Tahoe Alternative Collaboration Services (STACS) (Chris Kernes)


Officer Hazelet was out for two weeks for training. EDC BH clinicians and SLTPD were able to coordinate on multiple crisis assessments in the field, two of which led to inpatient hospitalization. As the snow melts and temperatures warm up, STACS has plans to be more active in the field. Motel 6 and the surrounding parcel has been purchased by the Tahoe Conservancy, the hotel will be demolished, and the surrounding parcel will be returned to wetland and marsh to serve as a filtration system for the lake. The motel 6 meadow has been illegally inhabited for the past 10 years by undomiciled residents year-round. With the purchase of the parcel, the land can no longer be inhabited. Residents have transitioned to other parcels, STACS will work on outreach and education for these residents to offer resources and support.

SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER SERVICES (Salina Drennan)

- SUDS Quality Assurance continues the Annual On-Site Monitoring process with the Network Providers and plan to complete the process in May. Annual monitoring helps to ensure that network providers continue to provide quality care to county beneficiaries.
- SUDS Prevention programs continue to build capacity for youth prevention services in the county. The newest initiative is the creation of a Youth Action Counsel – a Youth Led Advisory Board focused on development of local prevention efforts. This program is in partnership with our local Coalition for Opioid Overdose and Prevention (COPE).

group therapy and case management services and supports. Services are
delivered in the Clinic, in clients' residences, in the community or via telehealth.

There have been several WS Wellness Center participants who have begun to volunteer regularly and consistently in the Wellness Center in various roles such as thoughtfully engaging participants in activities to encourage socialization, decorating for the seasons and kitchen clean-up activities, stating that they want to "give back" because they have benefitted from attending and have received so much from their participation at the Wellness Center.

ICM Activities:

Tahoe: 14 clients participated in the DBT Mindfulness Skills group, 8 clients attended the Housing Applications Support group and applied for the new Sugar Pine apartments in SLT. 8 clients engaged in the Seasonal Cooking group, where they prepared Corn Chowder that was enjoyed by all. Field trips included 10 clients volunteering to go to the Animal Shelter where they walked and played with the dogs, a Carson City Shopping trip, a trip to the library, and a Walk to the Lake group. Action and Fitness groups were Disc Golf, Pickleball, and Beginner Fitness & Mental Health. Closed groups included DBT skills, Yoga, and Wellness action-planning groups.

West Slope: ICM clients continue to actively participate in Wellness. ICM team is actively working on developing a schedule for the T-Houses that will be implemented in May 2024. Groups in the T-Houses has been implemented 1x/week with the intention of offering it daily in May 2024.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES (Justine Collinsworth)

Changes in billing and processes have created payment delays for our contractors. EDC HHSA is working on developing a more efficient invoice approval and payment process that meets everyone's needs.

Summitview Child & Family:

- Working collaboratively with other community-based organizations and EDCOE to further increase our footprint in elementary and middle schools.
- Youth facilities are holding at 4 currently and are some of the highest acuity youth we have ever served.
- In the last 6 weeks, we have hired 12 front line staff and an offer has been made to a licensed residential therapist
- In the process of moving our Adult Residential Facility to a new location in the county as well as certifying it as Medi-Cal to allow for additional funding streams and serve a wider base.
- Several individuals have received promotion in the agency in accordance with strengthening the infrastructure, given some recent changes. Congratulations to Jess Schnetz who will be serving as our Chief Program Officer.
- Summitview's Administrative offices and nonpublic school will be moving to EL Dorado Hills business park in the next few months. This is an exciting step for our agency to expand our services.
- Summitview will maintain an office in Placerville for outpatient services
