NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that a public hearing will be held on Friday, July 10, 2009 at 10:00 a.m., by the County of El Dorado, at 937 Spring Street, Room 46, Placerville, CA, 95667 in order to discuss possible applications for funding under the Fiscal Year 2009/10 State Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and to solicit citizen input on possible activities to be included in these applications.
The General and Economic Development Allocations of the State CDBG program publish Notices of Funding Availability (NOFAs) each program year (July 1 to June 30). Eligible cities and counties may submit applications for CDBG funds under these NOFAs. The maximum amount of funding available is described in the NOFA. Typically, up to \$500,000 is available under the General Allocation NOFA each year. Typically, up to \$600,000 is available under the Economic Development Enterprise Allocation each year. Also, the Economic Development Over-the-Counter Allocation can award up to \$2,500,000 per year. Each year Planning and Technical Assistance Grants up to \$70,000 under the General Component and \$70,000 from the Economic Development Component are awarded on a "first come first served" basis. The Department issues two small NOFAs each year under the Native American and Colonial's Allocations. The Native American Allocation is only for areas where concentrations of low income Native Americans live who are not part of a federally recognized Indian tribe or Band/Chieftain. The Colonial's funding is only for designated communities within 120 miles of the United States - Mexico border. Eligible activities under the above allocations and NOFAs consist of housing - new construction projects, housing acquisition and housing rehabilitation programs; community facility and public work projects; public service programs and planning studies. Economic development programs and projects are also eligible along with planning activities. Eligible activities paid for with State CDBG funds must meet one or more of the three national objectives listed in CDBG federal statutes as follows: benefit to low income households or persons; elimination of slums and blight; or meeting urgent community development need (a need from a state or federally declared disaster).
The County of El Dorado anticipates submitting applications under one or more of the State CDBG NOFAs published during the next program year. Applications are anticipated under the General and Economic Development Components as well as the Planning and Technical Assistance Components. A separate public hearing will be held to discuss and approve each proposed application prior to submittal to the State.

Final activity from the Divide Community Economic Development Strategic Plan is expected to result in the retention of between 23 and 47 jobs, in addition to the creation of 18 to 45 new jobs over the next three to five years. The Office of Economic Development will organize, coordinate, and guide the activities of a hired consultant who, coordinating with ongoing Office of Economic Development initiatives will utilize data that result from the following outreach and facilitation activities to develop a Community Economic Development Strategic Plan for the Divide. The activities are as follows:

I. Call to Order- Forum was called to order at 6:42 PM

II. Welcome/Introductions

III. Role of the Community in growing the local economic opportunity
Supervisor Ron Briggs welcomed the audience and members of EDAC. He stressed that growing the Divide's economy is a team effort involving government, the private sector, education, and workforce development agencies along with local communities. In acknowledging the importance of community involvement, the supervisor underscored the idea that community input and grass-roots feedback will most effectively identify issues of concern.

IV. Why Economic Development is important to the community and to Georgetown Divide as a whole?
Commission Chair, Rachel Michelin, spoke about the importance of community activism in improving the economic well-being and quality of life by creating/retaining jobs that facilitate growth and provide for a stable tax base. She also delivered a power point presentation that reviewed the role of

the EDAC and discussed the County's draft economic development strategy. Attachment A
She kicked the forum off by asking three questions:

- 1) How is business?
- 2) What do you like about doing business in the area?
- 3) What can be done to improve the business climate upon the Divide?

V. Summary Statement

Businesses and citizens of the Divide discussed and provided insight on the three questions.

1) How is Business?

Feedback identified concerns and areas for improvement. Discussion revealed concern over a divergence of economic fortunes between small and larger-sized merchants due to economic/market trends and an increasingly strict regulatory environment. An example of the strict regulatory environment was the U.S. Forest Service road closures that would negatively affect Jeepers, hiking and camping enthusiasts and other outdoor and recreational devotees who frequent the Divide's many shops and lodging establishments. We heard that merchants in Cool and Lotus were doing better than those from Georgetown. It was observed that Coloma and Lotus business tend to be somewhat more seasonal while Cool was an example of a steadier marketplace.

Many present acknowledged that shifting target demographics on the Divide were adversely affecting businesses today. Digging deeper we learned from those present that a sizeable portion of the Divide population is aging, with older population groups typically spending less. The young Divide families, we learned, tend to be single/two income families with parents working off the Divide. This is of interest, for those working parents shop off the Divide during their "work hours" in locations that have more and diverse retail options.

Other factors influencing business success were storefront appearance, variety of consumer products and services, customer/shopkeeper relations, vagrancy and juvenile delinquency, lack of streetscape, graffiti, ADA compliance, and sidewalk mobility. Though subtle, these all influence consumer decisions – if you do not feel safe or welcome you will not stop and shop.

2) What do you like about doing business in the area?

Many in attendance stated that the folksy friendliness of neighbors and Divide consumers contributed to their businesses success. Others stated that they felt the Divide had its own "feel" or business climate. This feeling or sense of place is not easily replicated and residents would much prefer, when possible to stay and shop on the Divide. In other words, to most, *The Divide is home!*

3) What can be done to improve the business climate on the Divide?

A number of businesses and residents commented that they were eager to see the following programs strengthened and expanded on the Divide:

- After-school programs (and/or a swimming pool) aimed at providing organized activities in a safe place;
- Improved public transportation links, both in frequency and routes;
- Child-care and education facilities for working families.

Several commented that expansion of broadband coverage would enable residents and others to conduct business from the Divide, growing economic activity that would potentially have a benefit of bringing more residents up to the Divide. Still others stated that the Georgetown airport and its business-park offered a great-untapped possibility for attracting or expanding businesses. Improved infrastructure (road, water, and sewer connections) potentially could jump-start development and diversification of the recreation and tourism economy of Georgetown.

All agreed that the core competitive advantage for the Divide was to enhance and broaden tourist marketing. A two-pronged campaign could include external messaging to jeepers, bikers, RV's, antiquers, recreational and tourism types with the coupling an internal marketing strategy of a "Shop Local" campaign. Side initiatives would need to include the retention and expansion of the restaurants, lodging, and retail sector. A benefit for the business sector, in addition to increased sales, would be the collaboration of the business and local community in taking charge and tackling issues on the Divide.

VII. Common Issues/Themes Identified

General comments centered on the following issues or areas of concern:

- Too much petty crime, including panhandling, vagrancy, nuisances, drunken and disorderly, vandalism, etc.
- Many talked about the lack of family support structures for those on the Divide, including child and early care facilities, affordable housing, elder facilities, medical offices and drug stores, etc.
- More signage needed, such as area identifiers, landmark directions, street signs, business locators, etc.
- Continued investment in all types of Divide infrastructure including, public transport, broadband, streetlights, swimming pool, recreation options, sidewalks, etc.
- An opportunity for targeted marketing and communications to internal and external audiences. Strategies mentioned included: shop local campaign, marketing to recreation & tourism sectors – jeepers, outdoors enthusiasts, craft types, cross-country runners – more media outlets, etc.
- The realization of and extreme desire for economic diversification. Mentioned were retail alternatives, farm stay, recreation & tourism destinations, drug store, organic food stores, emergency & medical facilities attraction, lodging facilities, Georgetown airport uses, etc.

VIII. Insight/Observations

Enthusiasm for engagement by business and community leaders was evident throughout the Community Forum. A sense of urgency and energy was also

evident. Harnessing that energy generated by the Community Forum and the desire of those on the Divide will be critical. Attachment A

Many of the challenges identified have external forces driving them – changing demographics of the population, single/two parent working families, a stricter national and state regulatory environment, and escalating replacement costs for an aging infrastructure. We should focus our efforts on areas where we can have the greatest impact.

Several opportunities exist to build on the Divide's core competitive advantage – Recreation and Tourism.

- Convene a multi-jurisdictional roundtable (if one does not exist already) where issues of recreation and tourism, business development, and regulatory reform are discussed and solutions generated.
- Work with local Divide Chamber of Commerce, and other local organizations in putting together a pro-active and systematic business visitation program.
- Co-develop a two-pronged marketing campaign focusing on:
 - Internal – Shop Local
 - External – Attract Target Audiences for the recreational and tourism industry as well as the Hwy. 49 trekkers
- Use U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Community Development Block Grant program funds to underwrite an economic analysis study of possible projects for the Divide
 - Broadband deployment
 - Georgetown Airport business park
 - Affordable Housing and Child Care Facilities
