This oversight will allow us to better communicate and track Edible Food Recovery within the County.

The other areas of the unincorporated part of the county do not have mandatory service. Areas on the East Slope (South Lake Tahoe) do not have a mandatory collection.</p>

Each area has mandatory residential and commercial waste collection. The other areas of the unincorporated part of the county do not have mandatory service. The unincorporated areas that do not have mandatory service can subscribe to waste service or self-haul their wastes to the Material Recovery Facility. El Dorado Disposal levies extra fees on those residents who do not sort recycling. South Tahoe Refuse accepts self-hauling in unincorporated areas.</p>

The west slope will be assisted by Breathe California and overseen by a contract from El Dorado County using OWR funding.</p> <p>El Dorado Disposal (EDD) provides free recycling for schools. EDD has provided blue cubes for use in the classrooms for ease of use for recycling. EDD conducts MRF tours, truck tours, and school presentations on waste processing, recycling, and composting. South Tahoe Refuse (STR) provides mixed recycling waste recycling services at the Lake Tahoe Environmental Magnet Elementary and Sierra House Elementary Schools in the unincorporated portion of the STR service area. In addition, STR provides educational experiences for schools on request.</p>

Central Services (CAO's Office) manages an area in the basement of the County Library where Departments send surplus office supplies for use by other departments. EDC Facility grounds maintenance staff composts green waste behind the El Dorado County Fairgrounds. EDC uses the composted material for maintenance projects throughout the County and sells it to the public. EDC's DOT and Airports use a hazardous waste hauler to collect used oil, oil filters, antifreeze, and fuel filters. The other areas of the unincorporated part of the county do not have mandatory service. The unincorporated areas that do not have mandatory service can subscribe to waste service or self-haul their wastes to the MRF. EDD provides several unlimited green waste events and waivers. EDD requires all green waste outside of carts to be put in paper bags. All commercial accounts can subscribe to on-site green waste pick-up, but most of the accounts are within the mandatory areas of the County. STR provides a green waste collection service as well. In addition, STR provides green waste curbside to commercial accounts. Green waste is collected and packaged for transport with food waste to the Yolo facility. STR collects green waste and delivers it to Bently Ranch or Full Circle Compost in Nevada.</p>

STR's Resource Recovery Facility RRF streamlines services for commercial customers using an automated scale and accounting system, avoiding congestion at the RRF. Green waste is collected and packaged for transport with food waste to the Yolo facility. Green waste collected by STR goes to Bently Ranch or Full Circle Compost in Nevada.</p>

Commercial rollouts in the El Dorado Hills CSD and Cameron Park CSD began in 2023, as well as route reviews and waivers.</p> <p>Food waste collected by EDD goes to a Yolo County Composting facility for composting. Food waste collected by STR goes to Full Circle Compost (NV), where it is composted. TTSD's food waste goes to R.T. Donovan in Spanish Springs, NV, to be composted. Green Waste: STR has a Resource Recovery Facility (RRF) to process green waste. The RRF offers a state-permitted chipping and grinding operation, allowing for organics processing before transport to regional composting facilities outside of the Lake Tahoe basin. EDD and TTSD do not process green waste on-site at their MRF. Instead, green waste is stored on-site until it is collected and hauled to a composting facility. Both jurisdictions report organic recycling diversion numbers.</p>

The Master Gardeners of El Dorado County offer training and education on food waste composting. Both haulers encourage composting to divert organic materials if needed. El Dorado County gave away the last of its free food composters in 2023, after spending tens of thousands on the program. Over 1,000 composting kits were given away in total.</p>
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/> 3060-CM-GOV Government Composting Programs	<p>El Dorado County Facility grounds maintenance staff accumulates green waste generated by their maintenance activities behind the El Dorado County Fairgrounds. Facilities used the composted material for maintenance projects throughout the County and sold it to the public. Facilities use mulching lawnmowers on all grassed areas. Tall grasses and debris are redistributed back over the fields and hillsides. Pine needles collected in South Lake Tahoe are processed through the STR RRF. The El Dorado Hills CSD, Serrano Golf Course, and El Dorado Union School District also redistribute their grass cuttings to the fields.</p>

Master Gardeners give composting demonstrations at the Lake Tahoe Community College demonstration garden. In conjunction with the Master Gardeners on the Western Slope and Mother Lode Rehabilitation Enterprises (MORE), EDD has developed a demonstration garden complete with a vermiculture (worm) bin at their Truck Street location near their MRF. EDD reaches out to schools providing information regarding tours, composting, and gardening.

<input checked="" type="checkbox"/> 1060-SR-MTE Material Exchange, Thrift Shops	<p>There are many chain and independent thrift stores in El Dorado County. Examples include Goodwill Industries International and Snowline Hospice. El Dorado Disposal has a bin at the Material Refuse Facility to collect gently used items for the Partners In Care thrift store. In conjunction with Cameron Park Rotary, El Dorado Disposal provides for used bicycles collected at the MRF to be pulled aside and picked up by the Rotary. Folsom Prison inmates then refurbish these bicycles. The bikes are returned to El Dorado County to various charities distributing bicycles to those in need. South Tahoe Refuse collects bicycles, and a local contractor refurbishes them. El Dorado Hills Community Services District (CSD) and the Cameron Park CSD each organize annual community garage sales. Materials not exchanged at the events are donated to Snowline Hospice. Millwood Furnishings and Habitat for Humanity accept usable C&D wood, fixtures, cabinets furniture and resell that material back to the community.</p>
<input checked="" type="checkbox"/> 2000-RC-CRB Residential Curbside	<p>El Dorado Disposal (EDD) has a three-cart system that uses carts with black lids for trash, blue lids for recycling, and green lids for organic waste. EDD's side-loaded trucks have cameras in the hopper to monitor contamination. EDD's pickup frequency is weekly for trash and bi-weekly for recycling and organics. EDD offers one-time curbside pick-up vouchers per year for water-based household paint, fluorescent bulbs/tubes, one bulky item, and green waste. In addition, EDD will pick up curbside used oil/oil filters and household batteries by appointment. Finally, EDD has expanded its curbside service to offer unlimited green waste collection bi-annually. Residential curbside green waste service was developed in the Grizzly Flat, CA area part-time. South Tahoe Refuse (STR) conducts mandatory unlimited curbside collection. Blue bags are for the collection of recyclables. In the unincorporated area of the east slope, STR offers one bulk item curbside pick-up per residential customer per year, plus one annual curbside residential e-waste pick-up and unlimited battery and fluorescent tube curbside residential pick-up. Tahoe Truckee Sierra Disposal (TTSD) uses a per-can system, including regular household solid and green waste, and a blue bag system for recycling. The customer purchases blue bags. All jurisdictions are attempting to deter customers from placing non-recyclables in curbside bins. These items include film and Styrofoam. STR is transitioning to a three-cart system beginning in 2024.</p>

El Dorado Disposal levies extra fees on those residents who do not sort recycling. El Dorado Disposal also has three drop-off locations in El Dorado County: Placerville (just outside city limits), Cameron Park, and El Dorado Hills. These drop-off locations only accept cardboard, paper, plastic, metal, e-waste, household batteries, and fluorescent light bulbs. South Tahoe Refuse has one Material Refuse Facility, which accepts a wide variety of solid waste, recycling, green waste, C&D, and other specialized waste from resident.</p>

They allow food waste, food soiled paper products, yard waste and BPI approved compostable bags in the carts for this program.</p> <p>South Tahoe Refuse continues to service residential customers with a 1-bin collection system, but is transitioning to a 3-bin collection system in 2024 which will include curbside collection of yard waste in a green bin. However, STR has operated residential yard waste collection routes for many years and in 2023 sent 134.3 tons of yard waste collected from El Dorado County Unincorporated residential customers for composting.</p>

Note that the unincorporated portions of El Dorado County that are serviced by South Tahoe Refuse are all under a high-elevation waiver for curbside collection of food waste. STR does allow free drop-off of food waste for all residential customers and offers one free counter-top food waste bucket to each residential customer account.

EDD Commercial customers are assessed individually by the Sustainability Team to see what organics service is needed. The Sustainability Team keeps an eye on contamination or empty notation and reaches out to correct undesirable behavior.

South Tahoe Refuse and County staff continue to work to expand the commercial organics recycling program. STR provides on-site yard waste and food waste containers to customers if necessary, and also accepts self-haul material from commercial customers at the Resource Recovery Facility.

The South Tahoe Refuse Resource Recovery Facility (RRF) is located at 2121 Eloise Avenue, South Lake Tahoe. This state permitted facility accepts organic materials from all waste sectors. Yard waste material is chipped at this facility and used locally for soil erosion and revegetation projects. Excess material is sent to regional composting facilities in Nevada.

Commercial on-site food waste programs have expanded in 2023 to include 9 businesses in Unincorporated El Dorado County.

The El Dorado Disposal Sustainability Team is sent contamination notes daily. EDD communicates by phone, email, or mail to rectify undesirable behavior.

On-site mixed recycling and on-site cardboard recycling containers are offered at a discounted rate from the MSW price to all STR customers, and while many choose to separate on-site if they have adequate space, all commercial and multi-family customers remain compliant with the requirements of MCR as the South Tahoe Refuse Material Recovery Facility serves as a mixed waste processing operation that yields diversion results comparable to source separation. Information on MCR is provided to new commercial customers as they establish their accounts and is included on STR's website.

EDD "Oops Lets Recycle Right" - Residential notes are reported to the Sustainability Team daily, if contamination occurs in any cart we reach out with a phone call and send out a packet of information to rectify undesirable behavior. There is a separate packet for recycling, organics, and trash. This program allows three offenses before the account is penalized with a contamination fee.

With El Dorado Disposal all residents with an active account can have motor oil serviced curbside 2 gallons and a filter per week. EDD provides the container and removes the oil on your service day. All residents with an active account can request a battery container or oil container that is removed curbside once customer requests removal.

South Tahoe Refuse outreach regarding Household Hazardous Waste included social media posts on Facebook and Instagram and the creation of a new brochure for HHW materials and policies. The new brochure is distributed at events, through our Customer Service office, and to many customers as they bring other material to the Transfer Station.

The El Dorado Disposal Sustainability Team speaks about waste reduction when having conversations with customers. EDD does their best to offer promotional items that can be reused to stimulate conversation on things that can help reduce your waste output.

STR conducted classroom presentations in 2023 regarding waste sorting and recycling and also participated in events sponsored by South Tahoe Environmental Education Coalition (STEEC). STEEC organizes field trips for students to learn about environmental topics outside the classroom. At these events, STR led lessons about waste sorting, recycling, and impacts of litter/improper trash containment.

Also, in 2023 South Tahoe Refuse partnered with the City of South Lake Tahoe to hire two California Climate Action Corps fellows whose primary focus was food waste education in the local school district. Lake Tahoe Unified School District includes two schools located in unincorporated El Dorado County, Sierra House Elementary and Meyers Elementary, although all LTUSD elementary schools are available as an option for both City and County residents. CCAC fellows created classroom lessons on waste sorting in preparation for the introduction of food waste recycling in the schools for 2024.
