BH DIRECTOR & DEPUTY DIRECTOR UPDATES
(Nicole Ebrahimi-Nuyken)

- The External Quality Review report for the Mental Health Plan (MHP) has been received. The report highlights the following strengths for our Mental Health Programs:
 - The MHP created a project management and system improvement plan to address the priorities of staffing shortages, responsiveness to community needs, quality improvement and utilization review capacity, service delivery integration, and fiscal stewardship with acute hospitalizations.
 - The MHP was identified by DHCS as one of the small counties to successfully claim under the new payment reform guidelines.
 - The MHP partners with the Sheriff's office to ensure warm handoffs in the jail facilities for justice-involved members.
 - For Calendar Year (CY) 2022, the MHP consistently upheld efficient monthly claiming practices, ensuring timely submissions. As a result, the overall rate of denied claims was 2.48 percent.
 - Overall penetration rates are trending up as compared to state and like sized counties.
- The report for the Drug Medi-Cal Organized Delivery System (DMC ODS) highlights the following strengths for our Substance Use Disorder Programs:
 - El Dorado reallocated staff resources and created more intake slots in order to promote easier access; this change has shown to improve access across all demographic groups. Improvements include a “no callback” process with a goal that the caller is screened without hanging up the phone. Additionally, the average number of days to the first dose of methadone for members in El Dorado was one fifth of the statewide average wait time (0.64 days for the DMC ODS versus 3.19 days statewide).
 - Recruitment efforts to address staff shortages have been significant through implementation of telework, flexible schedules, financial supports for new and renewing credentials associated to the position requirements, recruitment bonuses, and other incentives.
 - El Dorado providers express a high regard for the DMC ODS, particularly toward care coordination and responsiveness to member needs. The DMC ODS County care coordination team engage with members seeking treatment, identify and provide additional services and resources, and sustain contact particularly during the initial transition stage into treatment as well as between treatment settings. Providers state El Dorado is

accessible and consistently offers support for providers in terms of both member and agency needs.

- El Dorado continues to address challenges associated with linkage to medical services, particularly with winter and snow conditions, including county efforts in tandem with Public Health to identify a dedicated obstetrician gynecologist who will serve Medi Cal eligibles and treat perinatal and post-partum women. The new Managed Care Plan (MCP) provider, Mountain Valley, is in discussion with El Dorado regarding member needs, e.g., transportation and other ways in which the MCP can assist members.
- The DMC ODS partnership with Marshall Hospital and its ED provides dedicated support for the Behavioral Health Quality Improvement Program (BHQIP). The partnership encourages efficiencies such as utilization of the existing Substance Use Navigator (SUN) position to expand member assessments within the ED. Providers confirmed that referrals from the ED are occurring directly through the hospital to the program as well as through assistance from El Dorado's care coordination team.






- There were **39** Admissions; **18** Admissions were El Dorado County residents and **21** were Out of County residents.






A Certification Review Hearing is to be held at the ED (MMC/Barton), if a client continues to meet criteria for a 5150, and has been placed on a second hold, until transfer and placement arrangements to a LPS designated facility are completed or the hold is lifted.

PROGRAM ACTIVITY UPDATES

SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER SERVICES (Salina Drennan)

- The SUDS QA team is in the process of collecting documents to submit to DHCS for annual review while simultaneously updating department tools to conduct our annual contract compliance monitoring cycle, reviewing all network providers. The QA team is also working closely with the Avatar IT team to have a successful first DMC 274 data submission by March 10, 2024, as required.
- The SUDS Prevention has been onboarding a new staff member, Chase Suomi - Youth Prevention and Treatment coordinator for SUDS. Chase is formulating the Youth Action Council (YAC) in partnership with El Dorado Coalition for Overdose Prevention and Education (COPE) as well as other community partners such as County Office of Education, New Morning Youth and Family Services, Sierra Child Family Services, Tahoe Alliance for Safe Kids, Summitview Child & Family Services and Recovery in Action. Through education, outreach, and advocacy, the YAC will seek to promote mental well-being, education, and prevention of substance use among EDC youth. Prevention Staff have also been working with Public Health TUPP and FNL youth to educate the Board of Supervisors as well as Tahoe and Placerville City Councils about tobacco policies that would regulate the proximity of tobacco retailers to youth sensitive area as well as provide funding for tobacco and vape education and compliance checks of underage access to products.
- The CCC team continue to offer a SUDS treatment group and a Seeking Safety group for our clients at the Probation Community Corrections Center. The CCC program is at capacity with both of these groups, and we continue to move clients from the waiting lists as openings become available. We are looking forward to holding a graduation ceremony on April 23, 2024; we anticipate graduating at least three of our clients. We also continue to offer case management services to our AB109 Community Clients and have been able to move some of these clients into the CCC programs when appropriate.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ACT (MHSA) (Meredith Zanardi)

- The FY 23/24 Plan Amendment public hearing was held at the February 21, 2024 Behavioral Health Commission Meeting. Comments were reviewed and analyzed in consideration of the final Plan Amendment, scheduled before the Board of Supervisors on February 27, 2024. .
- MHSA Reform:
 - Continue to attend information sessions to better understand the implications of SB 326 and potential impacts to the El Dorado County system of care.
- Continued contract development of FY 23/24 new contracts and amendments.

SUICIDE PREVENTION (Nicole Ebrahimi-Nuyken/Meredith Zanardi)

ADULT OUTPATIENT SERVICES

(Jody Kwachak-Hall (SLT); Doris Jones (WS))

Tahoe:

- Adult Outpatient Clinicians and Mental Health Workers actively work with Clients to provide MH services in the office, in Clients' homes, by telephone and by telehealth. The Clinicians and Mental Health Workers provide services in community settings.
- SLT has 4 F/T & 1 extra-help Clinicians, and 54 F/T & 1 P/T Mental Health Workers providing services to 193 outpatient Clients.

West Slope:

- Individualized services are provided to adults 18 years and older who meet criteria for Specialty Mental Health Services by a multidisciplinary team of Psychiatrists, Nurses, Mental Health Clinicians, and Mental Health Workers/Aides. Services include screenings, assessments, medication evaluations, co-occurring assessments and treatment groups, individual therapy, group therapy and case management services and supports. Services are delivered in the Clinic, in clients' residences, in the community or via telehealth. Western slope outpatient program is currently being covered by a Program Coordinator, and one full-time and one half-time Clinician due to multiple Clinician position vacancies.

Wellness Center Activities:

The Wellness Center is a safe, welcoming space to partake in a meal, socialize, participate in a variety of groups, activities, and outings that emphasize, independence, self-sufficiency, healthy living, healthy relationships, self-improvement and to share, learn, and to secure support, resources, education, and information.

There have been several WS Wellness Center participants who have begun to volunteer regularly and consistently in the Wellness Center in various roles such as thoughtfully engaging participants in activities to encourage socialization, decorating for the seasons and kitchen clean-up activities, stating that they want to "give back" because they have benefitted from attending and have received so much from their participation at the Wellness Center.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES (JustineCollinsworth)

Sierra Child & Family Services:

- Sierra attended several meetings in collaboration with EDCOE and other community partners to further efforts at solidifying mental health services in all El Dorado County schools. The past month's focus has been to continue working toward increased sustainable funding for multi-level mental health services, and to adopt a universal electronic health record that could be used by all schools. Sierra and Summitview also participated in a statewide presentation with Full Circle Health Network, exploring ways to provide families with expanded options for accessing behavioral health services
- The agency continues to monitor the state budget process and advocate for preservation of funding for children. With the current projected cuts in state and local funding, Sierra will be facing drastic cuts in Wellness Center staffing across both slopes. Sierra and EDCOE are exploring possible grants and partnership opportunities to replace some of the lost funding, but this is an uphill climb.
- Sierra has no vacancies on the behavioral health team, and in fact the agency is approaching being over-staffed due to the matters described above and ongoing CalAIM implementation challenges. Staff continue to collaborate with all community partners to attempt to overcome these hurdles and avoid staff reductions in the coming months.

Summitview Child and Family Services:

- Wellness - recently found out that MHSA funds can be used for elementary schools, so we are excited to begin expanding out wellness centers for the 24-25 school year.
