G. EOP Description

The El Dorado County / Operational Area Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) addresses El Dorado County's planned response to extraordinary emergency situations associated with natural disasters, technological (man-made) emergencies, acts of war and terrorism. The operational concepts reflected in this plan focus on large-scale emergencies and disasters that often generate situations requiring planned and coordinated responses by multiple disciplines, agencies and jurisdictions. Such disasters and emergencies pose a danger to life and property and have long-term social, economic, political, and/or environmental implications.

The plan establishes the policies, responsibilities, and procedures necessary to protect public health and safety, property and infrastructure, and the environment from the affects of emergencies and disasters. The EOP also establishes the operational concepts and procedures associated with both field responses and Emergency Operations Center (EOC) activities.

The plan is the principal guide for the agencies of El Dorado County and other local government entities to prevent, prepare for, respond to, and recover from emergencies and disasters affecting El Dorado County. Secondly, this plan is intended to facilitate multi-agency and multi-jurisdictional coordination, particularly between local, state, and federal agencies, in emergency operations. The Standardized Emergency Management System (SEMS) is the organizational framework for emergency response and operations in El Dorado County, and the EOP complies with the National Incident Management System (NIMS) and the National Response Framework (NRF). The plan is also integrated with the State Emergency Response Plan, and California's mutual aid system.
