

Budget




Environmental Management's Fiscal Year 2022/23 Adopted Budget is \$10,877,686. Of this:

- Approximately 27% is allocated to General Fund Programs, including:
 - EMD Administration
 - Environmental Health Permit Fees
 - Hazardous Materials Permit Fees, CUPA/ER
 - WS Mosquito Control
- Approximately 73% is allocated to Non-General Fund Programs, including:
 - CSA #10 Solid Waste
 - CSA #10 Liquid Waste
 - CSA #10 Hazardous Waste (HHW)
 - CSA #3 Vector Control
 - Franchise Fees

* This amount also includes a portion of EMD Administrative costs.

Role in the Strategic Plan

- Good Governance:
 - Promote the development of resources to identify and pursue additional revenue including local, state, federal and private funding for new and existing projects
- Infrastructure:
 - Analyze need, coordinate and plan for County facilities, parks and trails including ongoing maintenance, operations and replacement
 - Encourage and support through policy and resources the pursuit of local, state, and federal, private and public funding opportunities to support the County's infrastructure
 - Explore the feasibility of implementing renewable energy sources e.g., solar, cogeneration, fuel cells at County properties
- Public Safety
 - Improved Communication and Coordination between public safety and other agencies and the public during emergencies
