ELEMENT 2: PROJECT BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY

(I) BEYOND SCHOOL RESOURCE CENTER:

Cameron Park is a suburban community of 18,000 with children under the age of 18 in 36% of households. Our branch library is located in a family friendly neighborhood surrounded by three schools, a park and ballfield, multiple churches and the Community Services Park and Recreation Department. We are proud to be a nationally recognized "Family Place" library and have developed strong early childhood programming. We are also acutely aware of the needs of school-age children. Increasingly we see parents who don't know where to turn when their child falls through the cracks or is gifted in one discipline and failing in another. We see parents of children who struggle with enigmatic learning disabilities and parents who have taken on the complete role of educating their children and are overwhelmed by that decision. It is predicted that non-traditional schooling choices will increase 12% annually. Three local parenting groups representing 200 families have expressed interest in seeing the library expand its services. We want to give these families more opportunities and resources to help their children achieve academic success. This project will also align with the El Dorado County Library Strategic Plan to provide collections that enrich, entertain, inspire, and create welcoming library and community spaces.

We will establish a resource center to provide access to information and resources that go beyond books and promote multi-disciplinary literacies for elementary school children. We will create a venue that will promote local educational professionals and resources, and provide parental support. After completing a needs assessment survey we will purchase a wide variety of resources that will include educational philosophy books, curriculum guides and manipulatives, multi-age themed units of study, educational games, and science equipment. We will collaborate with the El Dorado County Office of Education and with various vendors to deliver best practices that meet educational competencies. We are fortunate to have proactive parents who have expressed the need for this new focus in our library. They have shared their visions of what the center could be, they are willing to participate in a survey to see exactly what the curricular needs are in our community, and they want to provide support to one another.

(II) EARLY LITERACY SUPPORT PROJECT:

Through the efforts of the statewide ELF grant and support from First 5 El Dorado, the El Dorado County Library has committed itself to leading the charge to get children ready for school by providing access to developmentally appropriate practices. Since our strategic plan clearly identifies lifelong learning, the promotion of reading and literacy, and creating enriching and inspiring collections as our focus, we propose sharing our Storytime Kits. We are enthusiastic about expanding opportunities to share early literacy expertise and to build relationships with other library systems by providing templates and ideas.

Our proposal uses the new digital format/medium of Pinterest. Our Storytime Kit templates will be available by logging on to Pinterest and easily and quickly finding the templates for use by library staff, families, and/or caregivers and schools. Each Storytime Kit includes a puppet, feltboard patterns with script, book titles, songs and rhymes, and craft ideas that help develop fine motor skills. Tehama Library will pilot the templates, and we will commit staff to collaborationg with them to create Storytime Kits and use the kits to provide programs that inspire parents and caregivers to increase the time they spend reading to their young children.

Assess the needs of our community regarding a new educational collection to support state academic standards.

Develop a new collection, based on this assessment, that will supplement the various curriculum and special needs of parents who are seeking resources to help their children achieve academic success.

(II)EARLY LITERACY SUPPORT PROJECT:

Develop and maintain an Early Learning @ Your Library Pinterest site to support public libraries providing quality early learning services to infants, toddlers, preschoolers and their families/caregivers.

Create templates for our Storytime Kits which may be replicated for use by libraries, preschools, and daycares to provide developmentally appropriate storytimes.

Engage in a mentoring relationship with Tehama Library to provide guidance and support during the piloting phase of the Storytime Kit templates as well as community outreach/training to their preschools and daycares.

B. Project Activities/Methods – How will the project be carried out? Include major activities from the timeline. (I)BEYOND SCHOOL RESOURCE CENTER:

Develop and distribute a survey (online and in-house) to parents in various interest groups to assess the curricular needs of our community.

Consult with County Office of Education to ensure the materials to be purchased meet state standards; invite them to also present at our workshops.

Purchase and process materials for circulation and create a welcoming space for these new resources.

Promote this new collection by hosting workshops and using our community room as a meeting site for parents and educators.

Conduct a post-survey to evaluate the usefulness of the materials and gather data for further collection development.

(II)EARLY LITERACY SUPPORT PROJECT:

Develop the Early Learning @ Your Library Pinterest Site, with a minimum of 50 boards. Each Board will have a developmentally appropriate description, and every pin will have a short descriptor of use/content.

Storytime Kits will be uploaded to the Pinteterst Site, with all needed templates, materials lists (books, puppets, flannel board sets, storage), and library proessessing procedures/forms. Two new kits will be created for the Summer Reading Program, "Reading is So Delicious" (Healthy Choices and Food Fun) and uploaded.

El Dorado County Library staff will engage in a mentoring relationship with Tehama Library to provide support and guidance for Tehama's "Story Hour in a Box" LSTA grant. Materials and training will be provided to Tehema for use during the community outreach/traing of their preschools and daycares, including site visits to Tehama and El Dorado County.

C. Anticipated Project Outputs – Measures of service or products provided.

(I)BEYOND SCHOOL RESOURCE CENTER:

We will host one science workshop presented by Lakeshore Learning.

We will host one CHADD support group.

75% of our new collection will be checked out at least once.

(II)EARLY LITERACY SUPPORT PROJECT:

The Early Learning @ Your Library Pinterest site will have a minimum of 20 followers and an average of 10 repins per week.

Tehama Library will create a minimum of 16 Storytime Kits using the Storytime Kit templates developed by El Dorado County Library

Tehama Library staff will make two visits to El Dorado County Libraries, and El Dorado County Library staff will make one visit to Tehama Library.

D. Anticipated Project Outcome(s) – What change is expected in the target audience's skills, knowledge, behavior, attitude, and/or status/life condition? How will you measure these outcomes?

(I)BEYOND SCHOOL RESOURCE CENTER:

75% of parents will report that using our new resources was instrumental in students completing projects and/or assignments. Surveys will be developed to measure this outcome but due to the time constraints of the grant we may not be able to gather data until the forthcoming academic year.

60% of parents who participate in the science workshop will feel better equipped and trained to teach their children. Post-workshop survey to be provided by Lakeshore Learning.

(II)EARLY LITERACY SUPPORT PROJECT:

Given the short duration of this grant, creating and populating the Pinterest Early Learning Boards and Storytime Kit uploads will require most of the alloted time. Compilation and analysis of outcomes will be addressed next year with the development of the Statewide Early Learning Initiative, where feedback on this project will be sought from throughout the state. However, El Dorado Library staff will assist Tehama County in the development of a feedback form for inclusion in each of their piloted Storytime Kits.
