Day 1 (Thursday)

- Integrative Leadership Practices in Action — Hennepin County (MN) case study examines practices: integrating intuition, reason and imagination in decisions; strategic relationships;

JOHN M. BRYSON

John M. Bryson is McKnight
Presidential Professor of Planning and
Public Affairs at the Hubert H.
Humphrey School of Public Affairs at
the University of Minnesota. He works
in the areas of leadership, strategic
management, and the design of
organizational and community change



processes. He wrote the best-selling and award-winning, Strategic Planning for Public and Nonprofit Organizations (2011), and co-wrote with Barbara C. Crosby the award-winning Leadership for the Common Good (2005).

Prof. Bryson has received many awards for his work, including four best book awards, the General Electric Award for Outstanding Research in Strategic Planning, and the Charles H. Levine Memorial Award for Excellence in Public Administration given jointly by the American Society for Public Administration and the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration. In 2011 he received the Dwight Waldo Award from the American Society for Public Administration for outstanding contributions to the professional literature of public administration over an extended scholarly career of at least 25 years. He holds a doctorate and master of science in urban and regional planning and a master of arts in public policy and administration, all from the University of Wisconsin.

BARBARA C. CROSBY

Barbara C. Crosby is associate professor at the Hubert H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs and former academic co-director of the Center for Integrative Leadership at the



University of Minnesota. She is a fellow of the Leadership Trust in the UK. Dr. Crosby has taught and written extensively about leadership and public policy, integrative leadership, cross-sector collaboration, women in leadership, media and public policy, and strategic planning. She is the



author of Leadership for Global Citizenship (1999) and coauthor with John M. Bryson of Leadership for the Common Good: Tackling Public Problems in a Shared-Power World (2005).

A frequent speaker at conferences and workshops, she has conducted training for senior managers of nonprofit, business and government organizations in the United States, the United Kingdom, Poland and Ukraine. She is a former gubernatorial press secretary and speech writer. She also has been a newspaper reporter and editor. Dr. Crosby has a B.A. in political science from Vanderbilt University and an M.A. in journalism and mass communication from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Her Ph.D. is in leadership studies from the Union Institute and University.

The Symposium will be held Thursday, February 27, through lunch on Saturday, March 1, at the Hayes Conference Center in San Jose. Classes will begin at 1:00 on Thursday and conclude with lunch on Saturday. The Symposium includes a Thursday evening session.


The Hayes is a residential conference center designed for intensive learning experiences. The center features outstanding conference facilities, lodging and meals. All
