Two of the most important federal revenue payment programs - the Secure Rural Schools Act and the Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) program - have struggled in recent years as Congress faces a number of fiscal pressures. Coupled with a number of inequities in the structure of these payments, long-term solutions need to be found. Mark Haggerty of Headwaters Economics will discuss the long-term status of these programs and present dynamic new alternatives to these programs.
