The Department awards this Grant and the Grantee accepts and agrees to use the Grant funds as follows:

**AUTHORITY:** The Department has authority to grant funds for the Project under Health and Safety Code, Section 131085(a)(b).

**PURPOSE:** The Department shall provide a grant to and for the benefit of the Grantee; the purpose of the Grant is to provide SNAP-Ed allowable nutrition education and obesity prevention activities and interventions for low-income Californians. The focus of SNAP-Ed is health promotion to help the SNAP-Ed target audience establish healthy eating habits and a physically active lifestyle and for primary prevention of diseases to help the target audience who have risk factors for nutrition related chronic diseases, such as obesity, prevent and postpone the onset of disease by establishing healthier eating habits and being more physically active. The CDPH authority for these contracts is vested in the Federal-Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 (Public Law 111-296), Section 241, enacted on December 10, 2010, which established the Nutrition Education and Obesity Prevention Grant Program for eligible low-income individuals.

**GRANT AMOUNT:** The maximum amount payable under this Grant shall not exceed One Million One Hundred Fifty-Eight Thousand dollars \$1,158,000.

**TERM OF GRANT:** The term of the Grant shall begin on October 1, 2016, or upon approval of this grant, and terminates on September 30, 2019. No funds may be requested or invoiced for work performed or costs incurred after September 30, 2019.

All Contractors contracting for the procurement or laundering of apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, or the procurement of equipment, materials, or supplies, other than procurement related to a public works contract, declare under penalty of perjury that no apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, equipment, materials, or supplies furnished to the state pursuant to the contract have been laundered or produced in whole or in part by sweatshop labor, forced labor, convict labor, indentured labor under penal sanction, abusive forms of child labor or exploitation of children in sweatshop labor, or with the benefit of sweatshop labor, forced labor, convict labor, indentured labor under penal sanction, abusive forms of child labor or exploitation of children in sweatshop labor. The contractor further declares under penalty of perjury that they adhere to the Sweatfree Code of Conduct as set forth on the California Department of Industrial Relations website located at www.dir.ca.gov, and Public Contract Code Section 6108.

- 2). For the twelve-month period from the date he or she left state employment, no former state officer or employee may enter into a contract with any state agency if he or she was employed by that state agency in a policy-making position in the same general subject area as the proposed contract within the 12-month period prior to his or her leaving state service.

If Contractor violates any provisions of above paragraphs, such action by Contractor shall render this Agreement void. (Pub. Contract Code §10420)

Members of boards and commissions are exempt from this section if they do not receive payment other than payment of each meeting of the board or commission, payment for preparatory time and payment for per diem. (Pub. Contract Code §10430 (e))

- 2. <u>LABOR CODE/WORKERS' COMPENSATION</u>: Contractor needs to be aware of the provisions which require every employer to be insured against liability for Worker's Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions, and Contractor affirms to comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this Agreement. (Labor Code Section 3700)
- 3. <u>AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT</u>: Contractor assures the State that it complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to the ADA. (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.)
- 4. <u>CONTRACTOR NAME CHANGE</u>: An amendment is required to change the Contractor's name as listed on this Agreement. Upon receipt of legal documentation of the name change the State will process the amendment. Payment of invoices presented with a new name cannot be paid prior to approval of said amendment.

#### 5. CORPORATE QUALIFICATIONS TO DO BUSINESS IN CALIFORNIA:

- a. When agreements are to be performed in the state by corporations, the contracting agencies will be verifying that the contractor is currently qualified to do business in California in order to ensure that all obligations due to the state are fulfilled.
- b. "Doing business" is defined in R&TC Section 23101 as actively engaging in any transaction for the purpose of financial or pecuniary gain or profit. Although there are some statutory exceptions to taxation, rarely will a corporate contractor performing within the state not be subject to the franchise tax.
- c. Both domestic and foreign corporations (those incorporated outside of California) must be in good standing in order to be qualified to do business in California. Agencies will determine whether a corporation is in good standing by calling the Office of the Secretary of State.
- 6. <u>RESOLUTION</u>: A county, city, district, or other local public body must provide the State with a copy of a resolution, order, motion, or ordinance of the local governing body which by law has authority to enter into an agreement, authorizing execution of the agreement.
- 7. <u>AIR OR WATER POLLUTION VIOLATION</u>: Under the State laws, the Contractor shall not be: (1) in violation of any order or resolution not subject to review promulgated by the State Air Resources Board or an air pollution control district; (2) subject to cease and desist order not subject to review issued pursuant to Section 13301 of the Water Code for violation of waste discharge requirements or discharge prohibitions; or (3) finally determined to be in violation of provisions of federal law relating to air or water pollution.

#### 3. Jurisdiction Description

El Dorado County, located in east-central California, encompasses 1,805 square miles of rolling hills and mountainous terrain and has approximately 185,441 (Nielsen Claritas, 2016) residents. The County's western boundary contains part of Folsom Lake, and the eastern boundary is also the California-Nevada State line. The County is topographically divided into two zones. The northeast corner of the County is in the Lake Tahoe basin, while the remainder of the County is in the "western slope" the area west of Echo Summit.

There are two municipalities within El Dorado County. The largest city in the County is the City of South Lake Tahoe, with a population estimate of 21,529. The City of Placerville, the County seat, is located 45 miles northeast of Sacramento, the State capital. The City of Placerville has an estimated population of 10,556. The remainder of the County's 146,401 residents lives outside of the two incorporated areas which includes a large portion of El Dorado County's historic Gold Rush region. The area includes about 40 communities along the Highway 50 corridor including the towns of Placerville, El Dorado Hills, Cameron Park Shingle Springs, Camino, Pollock Pines, Kyburz, Strawberry, Myers and the South Lake Tahoe basin.

### Three-Year Integrated Work Plan FFY 2017–2019

Agriculture, tourism, and light industry are the area's primary industries. The County is served by Los Rios Community College District—El Dorado Center and Lake Tahoe Community College. The County's location and natural setting provide for outdoor activities including whitewater rafting on the American River and skiing on the eastern border.

El Dorado County is one of 58 counties in California. It has 1,710.8 square miles in land area and a population density of 102.9 per square mile. According to the SNAP-Ed County 2015 Profiles, 9% of the population is below the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). English is the predominant language spoken throughout the county. SNAP-Ed eligible population totals 36,712 with 9,629 of those being under the age of 18 years. The SNAP-Ed eligible demographic (< 185% FPL) is 36,712 or 20.5%. Of the SNAP-Ed eligible are made up of 13,261 CalFresh participants in other federal nutrition assistance programs. The SNAP-Ed eligible participants are 67.6% White (non-Hispanic), 25% Hispanic, 2.5% Asian (non-Hispanic), 1.1% American Indian/Alaska Native, 2.8 Multiracial (non-Hispanic) or another race and 1.0% classified as unknown. Children, 0-6 years of age comprise the largest percentage of SNAP-Ed eligible participants at 26%, followed by school age children (23.3%) and adults 18-64 (20%) and Seniors 65 and older (17%).

There are 42 census tracts in El Dorado County with one qualifying tract for SNAP-Ed services based on the SNAP-Ed County 2015 profiles. Of the 42 census tracts in El Dorado County, 2.4% are SNAP-Ed eligible (= < 50% incomes= <185% FPL) based on all races data for 2015. The county has 15 school districts, seven Charter Alternative Programs, six programs that operate under the El Dorado County Office of Education umbrella. Made up from the School Districts are 75 public schools, 29 of which are eligible for SNAP-Ed services. There are 8,408 Students eligible for Free/Reduced Price Meals (FRPM). Of the 75 schools in El Dorado County, 33 or (44%) are SNAP-Ed eligible (>50% FRPM Enrollment, 2012).

The adult overweight or obesity prevalence is 64.5%. 48.8% of children (2-11) ate five or more servings of fruits and vegetables and only 37.6% adults ate fruits and vegetables three or more times yesterday. El Dorado County has an overall food insecurity rate of 13.6% and a child food insecurity rate over 21% for children 0-17 years of age.

El Dorado County also has a low number of recreational facilities per 100,000 residents; however the percentage of children and teens (ages 1-17 years) that have a park or open space within walking distance is higher than the state rate, 35% and 84.7% respectively. Even given this data, El Dorado County would stand to benefit from nutrition education paired with physical activity related interventions, due to its high number of fast-food restaurants and because of lack of access to low-cost and reliable transportation, many of the SNAP-Ed eligible residents do not have access to healthy foods within a .5 mile radius.

#### 4. Community Assessment

According to the recently released annual County Health Rankings 2016, compiled by Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute, El Dorado County ranks ninth among California's 58 counties. In 2015, El Dorado County ranked seventh in their county ranking position. Data indicates health disparities exist between the low-income population and population-at-large, and improvements are needed in several areas, including obesity rates. The assessment data was used to identify

intervention strategies and includes the following information on community and environmental settings, demographics, and health. By utilizing these assessment measures, El Dorado County Local implementing Agency partnership (LIA) has identified the populations and areas of the highest need and designed multiple strategies to implement a coordinated set of interventions that address the needs of all SNAP-Ed eligible populations.

Based on new and/or existing data sets, the following are examples of the assessment data used in Federal Fiscal Year 2017-19 (FFY17-19) to complete the Integrated Work Plan (IWP).

The SNAP eligible demographics increased from 19.2% to 20.5% in 2015. This might seem like a small difference however, reflects an increase of 2,271 residents. El Dorado County had 13,264 individuals participating in Cal-Fresh in 2015. Food Insecurity security rates remain a concern at 13.6% overall, but the rate is over 21% for children. This has direct bearing on children (under 18 years of age) living in households that experienced food insecurity at some point during the year. Research shows that food-insecure adults face higher risks of chronic disease (such as diabetes and hypertension), as well as depression and poor mental health. Children exposed to food insecurity are of particular concern given the implications scarce food resources pose to a child's health and development. Children who are food insecure are more likely to be hospitalized and may be at higher risk for developing obesity and asthma. According to the Food Bank of El Dorado County 1 in 10 residents face food insecurity.

The South Lake Tahoe Hunger Study indicated that 83% of those surveyed reported a need for more food assistance. It was also found that 23% of the households had no transportation and 12% of the households have medical/health problems that prevent them from getting emergency food and assistance. South Lake Tahoe has remote areas that have limited food pantries available. Residents in those areas must travel, sometimes further than resources allow, to access emergency food.

The 2015 SNAP-Ed County Profile indicates 9% of individuals residing in El Dorado County are living in households with income below the FPL. Research shows that income is a strong predictor of the health of an individual. The lower the income, the less likely a person will have a healthy diet or regular physical activity. This leads to greater chance of chronic diseases such as diabetes, heart disease, obesity and depression.

Additional data reported that 47% El Dorado County children and adolescents aged 3-11 watch television or play video games for three or more hours on the weekends. Children and adolescents are particularly

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vulnerable to many negative health messages conveyed through television shows and commercials, which influence their perceptions and behaviors

Nearly 49% of children (2-11) ate two or more servings of fruits and vegetables and only 37.6% adults ate fruits and vegetables three or more times per day. Fresh produce availably is limited in many of the outlying areas, and often poor in quality and quite expensive. Although fruit and vegetable consumption is difficult to assess for the SNAP population, it is estimated that only 48% of all children eat 5 or more servings of fruits and vegetables per day. Providing education specific to fruit and vegetable consumption is critical.

Sugar sweetened beverage (SSB) intake is also a concern with 32% of children and teens consuming one or more SSB each day. Although schools have policies related to the sale of SSB during school meals, more work is required to ensure schools have strong School Wellness Policies to address SSB at fundraisers, as well as during before and after-school activities. Working with parents, teachers and administrators will be crucial to develop policies and practices that support increase healthy beverage choices.

El Dorado County Healthy Stores for a Healthy Community (HSHC) data indicated the retail environment is lacking in fresh vegetables, whole wheat bread, corn/wheat tortillas and low-fat/non-fat milk. HSHC also revealed high amounts of tobacco, alcohol, and sugary drink advertisements. More than 83% of stores surveyed had sugary drinks at the check- out and only 42% offered a good quality of fruits and vegetables in low-income areas. Nearly 90% of the stores sold alcohol and over 74% displayed alcohol ads near candy/toys or below three feet. In-store marketing at the three feet and below level influences children's consumption of unhealthy products. Many SNAP-Ed eligible residents have to access the small independent owned stores, which are less likely to have a healthy food environment, but also have unhealthy interior/exterior advertising.

El Dorado County's access to exercise opportunities is 94% compared to the state average of 93%. Adults aged 20 and over reported no leisure-time physical activity at 14% with 64.5% of adults being overweight or obese, with 27.7% obese, compared to California's obesity rate of 24.7%. Only 28.6% of children and teens aged 2-17 are physically active at least one hour per day. While El Dorado offers a wide range of year round outdoor recreation, physical activity levels for adults remains low. Challenges for regular activity include the lack of sidewalks, little to no street lighting, dangerous roads the presence of wildlife.

Lack of transportation in rural areas makes it difficult to access healthy and varied food options within the many communities. Living in rural areas means traveling to a grocery store a minimum of 10 miles away, while non-rural areas may travel less than one mile. Many towns are widely spread apart. Travel for daily living items generally involves significant travel. Winter weather often creates additional travel barriers. Over 7% of low-income families have low access to a grocery store without driving more than 10 miles to a supermarket or large grocery store. People living further away from grocery stores are less likely to access healthy food options on a regular basis and more likely to consume foods that are readily available at convenience and corner stores, as well as fast food outlets. This is a contributing factor; in El Dorado County 57% of adults consume fast food at least one time in the last week.

#### 5. Community Change Goals

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Based on new and/or existing data, the implementing LIAs and with the assistance from the members of the County Nutrition Action Plan (CNAP), determined the direction of the community change goals. El Dorado County LIAs will address and support State Goals 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5.

The SNAP-Ed interventions have been aligned with the progression of the IWP from year one, to year two and through year three. The SNAP-Ed LIAs have based their rationale on the Theory of Change: 1) Social Norm Change which will change what the culture says we should do or shouldn't do about reducing unhealthy foods, reducing sugars and sodium; 2) Health Belief Model to promote Individual change through voluntary adoption of policies by SNAP-Ed partners; 3) The Diffusion of Innovations that show that once one program adopts a wellness policy, that others are more likely to make policy adoption. Adopting Wellness policies creates an effective way to exponentially improve the well-being of the community; and leading to 4) Community Organizing which states that people become engaged and motivated to participate when they perceive a need and feel capable of acting to address the need. People will remain involved when the issues remain relevant, they see a result of their efforts, and are rewarded, even if just intrinsically.

Health problems are taking a terrible toll on communities with limited resources and government must direct resources to communities in greatest need. Reasons for this include that up-to-date evidence related to the nature of chronic diseases is not in the hands of decision makers and strong beliefs persist that chronic diseases afflict only the affluent and the elderly, that they arise solely from freely acquired risks, and that their control is ineffective and too expensive and should wait until infectious diseases are addressed. We believe that it is vital to elevate chronic diseases on the health agenda of key policymakers, providing them with better evidence about risk factors and of the need for health systems change. A more concerted, strategic, and multi sectoral policy approach, supported by research and data, is essential to help reverse the negative trends in the incidence of chronic disease.

Also, the interventions focus on fostering the skills among schools, retailers, Early Childhood and Education (ECE) programs, publics schools (elementary, middle and high schools), alternative school site settings (such as Charter Schools), WIC, CalFresh offices, employment services, Famers' Markets, emergency food assistance (including food pantries and soup kitchens), elderly service/senior centers, health centers and other community agencies/organizations to engage the SNAP-Ed eligible population to make a change under the assumptions made by the Health Belief Model.

Partnering with other agencies and meeting SNAP-Ed eligible clients in other community site settings increases a supportive warm hand-off and additional resources for the client. The following are some examples — providing a community resource/service brochure to nutrition education class participants may assist them in locating food pantries or employment services. Another example is providing transportation routes to the SNAP-Ed eligible clients who in turn may increase their access to Farmers' Markets and grocery stores.

To address the focus area as a whole, each LIA will work in their area of expertise and divide geographically, not to duplicate our efforts. The Local Health Department (LHD) will provide a solicitation of SNAP-Ed funding

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in the form of a Request For Proposal (RFP). The sub-contractor's work will be implemented within the emergency food assistance sites which include food pantries and soup kitchens, as well as Farmers' Markets.

Community agencies/organizations will be able to effectively and appropriately offer key messages to the SNAP-Ed eligible population to help them perceive they are susceptible to poor health if they continue unhealthy eating patterns There are a number of benefits from adopting wellness policies, from the consumers' improved health, to their pride in their healthy eating choices and health outcomes over a lifetime. The policies will reinforce this message. Partners are often an effective voice in an individual's life to cue them to take action. Nutrition and obesity issues have been determined to be the priority areas of focus in El Dorado County.

However, these are just two of the many concerns analyzed in community-wide assessments. Long-term community change goals for El Dorado County also include improving the number of residents who are in a healthy weight category and reverse the trend of increasing diabetes rates, improving wellness and quality of life for older adults, and increasing the proportion of residents who experience food security, emotional, and mental well-being throughout their lifespan.

El Dorado County's SNAP-Ed funded LIAs will focus their efforts on the SNAP-Ed eligible portion of the county's population and on SNAP-Ed allowable interventions and activities which align with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)-Western Regional Office (WRO) Evaluation Framework. LIAs support long-term community change goals in the county by working with community partners to identify strategic partners and convene community-wide, multi-sector coalitions to improve nutrition and physical activity; create an environment that makes healthy food and beverage options the routine, easy choice; improve availability, accessibility and demand for healthy foods and beverages; ensure opportunities for physical activity and enhance the physical and built environment around the targeted institutions where the SNAP-Ed population can be found; develop and support a sustained, targeted physical activity and nutrition social marketing program (e.g., community-wide campaigns to promote healthy eating and active living) and provide evidence-based education with a focus on behavior changes goals; build capacity and engagement at school sites for comprehensive nutrition and physical programs that help to achieve and further strengthen school wellness policies through nutrition education, increased access to physical activity as well as improvements to the school environments and practices, assist school sites to achieve federal healthy school recognition standards, educate community/partners about policy/legislative changes that would improve retail environment; establish zoning ordinances for type/amount of marketing; work with partners to attract and create an environment conducive to new healthy retail venues such as new grocery stores, healthy mobile markets, produce stores, and farm stands; improve transportation options to healthy retail venues and potentially provide Retailer Economic Incentives/Recognition to offer healthier food options.

Through coordination and collaboration, we aim to support partners and help low-income residents in El Dorado County create norms and environments in which the healthy choices become the easier and expected choices at home, at work, in school, shopping and in all places where lifestyle decisions happen. The LIAs have contributed to the development of the three-year IWP.

Specifically, El Dorado County SNAP-Ed LIAs will achieve the following three year objectives:

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- **1.** By September 30, 2019, increase access to and demand for healthy fruits, vegetables, and beverages at 3 SNAP qualifying neighborhood retail stores through adopted and implemented policy and physical site changes.
- **2.** By September 30, 2019, 8 ECE sites will develop and/or implement site wellness policies and procedures, including making healthy site changes to improve the nutrition, physical activity, and/or screen time environment for participating children.
- **3.** By September 30, 2019, 15 community agency/organization sites will develop and/or implement site wellness policies and procedures, including making healthy site changes to improve the nutrition and physical activity of participating CalFresh eligible populations.
- **4.** By September 30, 2019, 10 low resource schools will make changes to school policies, nutrition and physical activity education and physical environment to support improved nutrition and physical activity behaviors among students, parents, teachers, staff, and administrators.

Intervention strategies have been expanded and show progression from year one, to year two and through year three. Continued expansion of our reach and our ability to achieve our goals may be changing as our funding levels may be decreased and/or eliminated such as the case for the County Welfare Department (CWD) in FFY 2018—FFY 2019. The expanded reach written in the IWP may need to be decreased and/or eliminated to reflect the decreased funding levels. Should fund levels remain constant it still may be difficult to expand without increased funding.

These objectives allow us to focus on our larger community change goals within the parameters of the SNAP-Ed funds. We will focus on the following PSE strategies in the following settings:

- •Healthy Retail Environment
- Early Childhood and Education settings
- Community settings
- School settings

The Portfolio Settings — Live, Learn, Shop, Work, Play and Eat provides us with the strategies to support and correspond to the individual level approaches and the ability to layer different types of activities within a single organization to maximize impact. One example is a whole school approach to obesity prevention. The approaches move form one-time events to multiple informational and environmental changes.

This multi-level approach is what El Dorado County as a whole is moving toward — a prevention oriented system that addresses the community conditions that shape health. All partners can take key steps to promote community health and engage in population health strategies while delivering high-quality clinical, social support services and nutrition education, as well as physical activity environmental supports to individuals. We are exploring current movements in population health; examining the intersections of health equity, social justice, and the social justice determinants of health; understanding ways that population health is financed, assessed, and measured; and learn from place-based initiatives that promote healthy, equitable communities.

6. Partnerships and Collaborative Efforts [County Nutrition Action Plan (CNAP) Partners or comparable]

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El Dorado County's CNAP workgroup has been meeting for three years on a quarterly basis to exchange information, track progress and improve local coordination of SNAP-Ed efforts in the county. The group consists primarily of the USDA-Food and Nutrition Services (FNS) funded partners and select non-funded partners. FNS partners include the CWD, UCCE, LHD, AAA, Head Start, Summer Meal and other assistance programs. Non-funded partners include El Dorado County Office of Education, Food Bank of El Dorado County, Dairy Council of California, El Dorado County Employment Services, Healthy Roads for Community Health, Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC), El Dorado County Chronic Disease Prevention Coalition, the Tobacco Use Prevention Program, Healthy Stores, Healthy Community (HSHC) partners and other community-based organizations.

The CNAP has three primary goals: 1) Increase participation in all FNS programs, 2) Ensure coordination of education efforts and 3) Work with partners to attract and create an environment conducive to healthy eating and active living. The group jointly created a strategic plan that helps CNAP partners in achieving their goals. The strategic plan was based on the Spectrum of Prevention (Figure 1) developed by Larry Cohen in 1983. The Spectrum was derived from practice and developed to address complex issues with comprehensive solutions. The Spectrum helps the LIAS and community partners to specify the variety of activities necessary for effective campaigns. Also, the Spectrum emphasizes the importance of influencing policy and legislation.

Creating the CNAP Strategic Plan provided members with ways to improve our Collective Impact efforts. Additionally, LIAs and CNAP members are positioned to create sustained community change. This led to the following outcomes: 1) worked with El Dorado County Procurements/Contracts to improve healthy food choices in vending machines. The new Vendor now offers some healthy food choices; 2) partnered with the Tobacco Use Prevention and Alcohol/Drug Programs to provide input to the County Signage Ordinance regarding unhealthy marketing/signs. Also, the CNAP promotes programs that may need extra assistance to increase participation such as WIC. Nutrition education efforts and materials are shared to ensure coordinated core messaging and efficient use of available resources. In addition, the CNAP has been working with HSHC to improve the health of El Dorado County residents through changes in community stores and to educate people on how in-store product marketing influences the consumption of unhealthy products. The CNAP provides education with community/partners about policy legislation that would make El Dorado County a healthier place and maintain a vibrant retail/business community.

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We will rely on our partners to focus on other aspects of our community change goals. Our local partner, the El Dorado County Tobacco Use Prevention Program will focus on municipal and county level policy changes regarding the retail environment through their grant funding.

#### 2. Educational Materials, Resources and Curriculum

All educational materials, resources, and curriculum will be approved through the USDA SNAP-Ed Connection website (<a href="https://snaped.fns.usda.gov/">https://snaped.fns.usda.gov/</a>), and/or FFY 2017-2019 USDA approved UC CalFresh, California Department of Aging, California Department of Social Services, Catholic Charities of California or the California Department of Public Health—Nutrition Education Obesity Prevention Branch (NEOP) Approved Nutrition Education Materials list.

El Dorado County reviewed the approved integrated curriculum list provided by the state agencies, and reviewed each different piece to determine the best option for the specific target population, as well as the selected SNAP-Ed three-year and annual objectives. Most of the selected curriculum is geared towards early childcare and education, school and community settings, as this reflects the detail provided throughout the narratives summaries and below in the target audience description.

#### 3. Intervention and Evaluation Plan Narrative Summary [Not to exceed 8 pages]

The implementing agencies in El Dorado County will conduct nutrition education and obesity prevention services at SNAP-Ed eligible sites, reaching a large portion of the SNAP-Ed eligible population. They will be assisted by a subcontractor and extenders who will support these efforts. The intervention plan includes activities that provide comprehensive education on proper nutrition and physical activity; approaches, which when used in combination provide high strength intervention strategies, with implementation of nutrition education and physical activity (PA) focused direct delivery, staff training and coordinated implementation strategies for direct care and education providers, food service providers, and other staff that interface with and impact children in the multiple settings. Building upon relationships with elementary schools already

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existing within the county, LIAs will continue to provide direct nutrition education and begin to provide physical activity education. LIAs will also train and support teachers as extenders to provide direct education in the classroom and in after school programs. Additionally, nutrition education will be provided to the adult and older adult SNAP-Ed population that connects shopping behaviors and choices to better health outcomes as per MyPlate and Dietary Guidelines. Focus will be placed on selecting target foods and beverages; increasing the skills for label reading, menu planning and food budgeting; increasing knowledge of MyPlate recommendations and exposure to and acceptance of new healthy foods.

Progressing to the sector level of the SEM, LIAs will identify strategic partners and community-wide, multi-sector coalitions will be convened to improve nutrition and physical activity; conduct a community health needs assessment; and prioritize, select, and adapt approaches unique to the needs of El Dorado County. Community partners will be educated about policy/legislative changes and Smarter Lunchrooms Movement (SLM) principles that improve the school lunchroom and the retail environment and support efforts in establishing zoning ordinances for type and amount of marketing of less healthy foods and beverages.

The intervention plan progresses to interventions at the environmental level of the Social Ecological Model (SEM) via the inclusion of policy, systems and environmental (PSE) change efforts that include implementing school wellness policies that promote access to healthy foods, beverages and physical activity. Healthy nutrition and physical activity policies and procedures will be implemented in early childhood education settings, afterschool programs (e.g. Boys and Girls Clubs, Foothill Indian Education Center, etc.) and elementary schools, which will include (but are not limited to) standards for all foods and beverage offered on site, opportunities for daily structured physical activity, limits on screen time and the provision of quality nutrition education, youth engagement projects, Walking School Bus/Safe Routes to School programs, garden-based and physical activity education and marketing guidelines for materials posted and shared on site. PSE efforts will also be focused on improving the school lunchroom utilizing the Smarter Lunchrooms Movement (SLM) principles and retail store environments with product placement strategies, Healthy Checkout Lanes, Healthy Grab and Go, smart snacking stations, healthy items in prominent school lunchroom and store locations with the removal of child oriented advertising and less healthy foods and beverages at children's eye level. Additionally, healthy food and beverage standards for purchased and donated foods that enter emergency food distribution sites (food banks/pantries) will be implemented to support education efforts to improve nutrition and food resource management. Area Agencies will implement systems changes by establishing relationships with food banks to secure new food distribution sites to support El Dorado County older adults.

Evaluation processes will be used to improve services for all local objectives and intervention strategies. The evaluation plan includes formative, process and outcome evaluation activities using State and locally developed surveys. Past evaluation efforts have been helpful in informing the program and these efforts will continue. A locally developed Report of Activity (RAF) will be used to collect needed supporting documentation and verify SNAP-Ed Activity Tracking Form (ATF) and Reporting Tools Workbook (RTW) entries. Education and Administration Reporting System (EARS) and Semi Annual Activity Report results will be generated from the ATF and quarterly RTW. Separate tracking of direct education taught by LIA staff and site staff trained by LIAs, such as teachers, will continue in an effort to better monitor effectiveness. Impact

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Outcome Evaluation (IOE) and UC CalFresh approved direct education evaluation tools and SMART objectives, designed to measure change in dietary and physical activity behaviors, food resource management and the factors that influence these behaviors will be completed by the LIAs. Participants will be requested to complete evaluation surveys that addresses, but not limited to, the following indicators from the Western Region SNAP-Ed Evaluation Framework: Nutrition, Physical Activity, and Obesity Prevention Outcomes: MyPlate Behaviors (MT1), Shopping Behaviors (MT2), Physical Activity Behaviors (MT3) and Fruits and Vegetables (LT2), Physical Activity Recommended Labels (LT7) and Entertainment Screen Time (LT8). At the environment level, LIAs will also report as appropriate on the following SNAP-Ed Evaluation Framework priority indicators – Identification of Opportunities (ST4), Partnerships (ST6), Nutrition Supports Adopted (MT4) and Physical Activity Supports Adopted (MT5). An IOE Plan and Report will be submitted annually by LHDs and other LIAs will also collect, report and use evaluation data as well. All LHD PSE projects will be reported using the RE-AIM evaluation framework to assess Reach, Effectiveness, Adoption, Implementation, and Maintenance (RE-AIM). Other interested LIAs may also utilize the RE-AIM reporting as appropriate. The locally developed PSE tracking forms have made it consistently easier to monitor PSE site efforts and complete the RE-AIM Access database. Reports generated from the database will be used to track, inform and improve continued PSE program reports in El Dorado County as well.

# **Exhibit B**Budget Detail and Payment Provisions

#### 1. Invoicing and Payment

- A. Upon completion of project activies as provided in Exhibit A Grant Application, and upon receipt and approval of the invoices, the State agrees to reimburse the Grantee for activities performed and expenditures incurred in accordance with the costs specified herein.
- B. Invoices shall include the Grant Number and shall be submitted in triplicate not more frequently than quarterly in arrears to:

#### C. Invoices shall:

- Be prepared on Grantee letterhead. If invoices are not on produced letterhead invoices must be signed by an authorized official, employee or agent certifying that the expenditures claimed represent activities performed and are in accordance with Exhibit A Grant Application under this Grant.
- 2) Bear the Grantee's name as shown on the Grant.
- 3) Identify the billing and/or performance period covered by the invoice.
- 4) Itemize costs for the billing period in the same or greater level of detail as indicated in this Grant. Subject to the terms of this Grant, reimbursement may only be sought for those costs and/or cost categories expressly identified as allowable and approved by CDPH.

#### 2. Budget Contingency Clause

- A. It is mutually agreed that if the Budget Act of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the State shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Grantee or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement and Grantee shall not be obligated to fulfill any provisions of this Agreement.
- B. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the Budget Act for purposes of this program, the State shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to the State, or offer an agreement amendment to Grantee to reflect the reduced amount.

#### 3. Prompt Payment Clause

Payment will be made in accordance with, and within the time specified in, Government Code Chapter 4.5, commencing with Section 927.

# **Exhibit B**Budget Detail and Payment Provisions

#### 4. Amounts Payable

- A. The amounts payable under this Grant shall not exceed:
  - 1) \$386,000 for the budget period of 10/1/16 through 9/30/17.
  - 2) \$386,000 for the budget period of 10/1/17 through 9/30/18.
  - 3) \$386,000 for the budget period of 10/1/18 through 9/30/19.
- B. Payment allocations shall be made for allowable expenses up to the amount annually encumbered commensurate with the state fiscal year in which services are fulfilled and/or goods are received.

#### 5. Timely Submission of Final Invoice

- A. A final undisputed invoice shall be submitted for payment no more than sixty (60) calendar days following the expiration or termination date of this Grant, unless a later or alternate deadline is agreed to in writing by the program grant manager. Said invoice should be clearly marked "Final Invoice", indicating that all payment obligations of the State under this Grant have ceased and that no further payments are due or outstanding.
- B. The State may, at its discretion, choose not to honor any delinquent final invoice if the Grantee fails to obtain prior written State approval of an alternate final invoice submission deadline.

#### 6. Travel and Per Diem Reimbursement

Any reimbursement for necessary travel and per diem shall be at the rates currently in effect as established by the California Department of Human Resources (CalHR).

#### **EXHIBIT C**

#### STANDARD GRANT CONDITIONS

- 1. APPROVAL: This Grant is of no force or effect until signed by both parties and approved by the Department of General Services, if required. The Grantee may not commence performance until such approval has been obtained
- 2. **AMENDMENT:** No amendment or variation of the terms of this Grant shall be valid unless made in writing, signed by the parties, and approved as required. No oral understanding or Agreement not incorporated in the Grant is binding on any of the parties. In no case shall the Department materially alter the scope of the Project set forth in Exhibit A.
- **3. ASSIGNMENT:** This Grant is not assignable by the Grantee, either in whole or in part, without the written consent of the Grant Manager in the form of a written amendment to the Grant.
- 4. AUDIT: Grantee agrees that the Department, the Bureau of State Audits, or their designated representative shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to this Grant. Grantee agrees to maintain such records for a possible audit for a minimum of three (3) years after final payment or completion of the project funded with this Grant, unless a longer period of records retention is stipulated. Grantee agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, Grantee agrees to include a similar right of the State to audit records and interview staff in any subcontract related to the project.
- **5. CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** Grantee certifies that it is in compliance with all applicable state and/or federal conflict of interest laws.
- 6. INDEMNIFICATION: Grantee agrees to indemnify, defend and save harmless the State, its officers, agents and employees from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, and any other person, firm or corporation furnishing or supplying work services, materials, or supplies in connection with the project, and from any and all claims and losses accruing or resulting to any person, firm or corporation who may be injured or damaged by Grantee in the performance of any activities related to the Project.

#### 7. FISCAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS AND ACCOUNTING STANDARDS:

Grantee agrees that, at a minimum, its fiscal control and accounting procedures will be sufficient to permit tracing of all grant funds to a level of expenditure adequate to establish that such funds have not been used in violation of any applicable state or federal law, or the provisions of this Grant. Grantee further agrees that it will maintain separate Project accounts in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

- **8. GOVERNING LAW:** This Grant is governed by and shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- 9. INCOME RESTRICTIONS: Grantee agrees that any refunds, rebates, credits, or other amounts (including any interest thereon) accruing to or received by the Grantee under this Grant shall be paid by the Grantee to the Department, to the extent that they are properly allocable to costs for which the Grantee has been reimbursed by the Department under this Grant.
- **10. INDEPENDENT GRANTEE:** Grantee, and its agents and employees of Grantee, in the performance of the Project, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees or agents of the Department.
- 11. **MEDIA EVENTS:** Grantee shall notify the Department's Grant Manager in writing at least twenty (20) working days before any public or media event publicizing the accomplishments and/or results of the Project and provide the opportunity for attendance and participation by Department's representatives.
- **12. NO THIRD-PARTY RIGHTS:** The Department and Grantee do not intend to create any rights or remedies for any third- party as a beneficiary of this Grant or the project.
- **13. NOTICE:** Grantee shall promptly notify the Department's Grant Manager in writing of any events, developments or changes that could affect the completion of the project or the budget approved for this Grant.
- **14. PROFESSIONALS:** Grantee agrees that only licensed professionals will be used to perform services under this Grant where such services are called for.

- **15. RECORDS:** Grantee certifies that it will maintain Project accounts in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Grantee further certifies that it will comply with the following conditions for a grant award as set forth in the Request for Applications (Exhibit D) and the Grant Application (Exhibit A).
  - Establish an official file for the Project which shall adequately document all significant actions relative to the Project;
  - Establish separate accounts which will adequately and accurately depict all amounts received and expended on this Project, including all grant funds received under this Grant;
  - Establish separate accounts which will adequately depict all income received which is attributable to the Project, especially including any income attributable to grant funds disbursed under this Grant;
  - Establish an accounting system which will adequately depict final total costs of the Project, including both direct and indirect costs; and,
  - Establish such accounts and maintain such records as may be necessary for the state to fulfill federal reporting requirements, including any and all reporting requirements under federal tax statutes or regulations.
- **16. RELATED LITIGATION:** Under no circumstances may Grantee use funds from any disbursement under this Grant to pay for costs associated with any litigation between the Grantee and the Department.
- 17. RIGHTS IN DATA: Grantee and the Department agree that all data, plans, drawings, specifications, reports, computer programs, operating manuals, notes, and other written or graphic work submitted under Exhibit A in the performance of the Project funded by this Grant shall be in the public domain. Grantee may disclose, disseminate and use in whole or in part, any final form data and information received, collected, and developed under this Project, subject to appropriate acknowledgment of credit to the Department for financial support. Grantee shall not utilize the materials submitted to the Department (except data) for any profit making venture or sell or grant rights to a third-party who intends to do so. The Department has the right to use submitted data for all governmental purposes.
- 18. **VENUE:** The Department and Grantee agree that any action arising

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out of this Grant shall be filed and maintained in the Superior Court, County of Sacramento, California. Grantee waives any existing sovereign immunity for the purposes of this Grant, if applicable.

#### Exhibit E

#### **Additional Provisions**

#### 1. Additional Incorporated Documents [Optional]

- A. The following documents and any subsequent updates are not attached, but are incorporated herein and made a part hereof by this reference. These documents may be updated periodically by CDPH, as required by program directives. CDPH shall provide the Grantee with copies of said documents and any periodic updates thereto, under separate cover. CDPH will maintain on file, all documents referenced herein and any subsequent updates.

#### 2. Cancellation / Termination [Required]

- A. This Grant may be cancelled by CDPH <u>without cause</u> upon thirty (30) calendar days advance written notice to the Grantee.
- B. CDPH reserves the right to cancel or terminate this Grant immediately <u>for cause</u>. The Grantee may submit a written request to terminate this Grant only if CDPH substantially fails to perform its responsibilities as provided herein.
- C. The term "for cause" shall mean that the Grantee fails to meet the terms, conditions, and/or responsibilities of this agreement. Causes for termination include, but are not limited to the following occurrences:
  - 1) If the Grantee knowingly furnishes any statement, representation, warranty, or certification in connection with the agreement, which representation is materially false, deceptive, incorrect, or incomplete.
  - 2) If the Grantee fails to perform any material requirement of this Grant or defaults in performance of this agreement.
  - 3) If the Grantee files for bankruptcy, or if CDPH determines that the Grantee becomes financially incapable of completing this agreement.
- D. Grant termination or cancellation shall be effective as of the date indicated in CDPH's notification to the Grantee. The notice shall stipulate any final performance, invoicing or payment requirements.
- E. In the event of early termination or cancellation, the Grantee shall be entitled to compensation for services performed satisfactorily under this agreement and expenses incurred up to the date of cancellation and any non-cancelable obligations incurred in support of this Grant.

#### Exhibit E

#### **Additional Provisions**

- F. In the event of termination, and at the request of CDPH, the Grantee shall furnish copies of all proposals, specifications, designs, procedures, layouts, copy, and other materials related to the services or deliverables provided under this Grant, whether finished or in progress on the termination date.
- G. The Grantee will not be entitled to reimbursement for any expenses incurred for services and deliverables pursuant to this agreement after the effective date of termination.
- H. Upon receipt of notification of termination of this Grant, and except as otherwise specified by CDPH, the Grantee shall:
  - 1) Place no further order or subgrants for materials, services, or facilities.
  - 2) Settle all outstanding liabilities and all claims arising out of such termination of orders and subgrants.
  - 3) Upon the effective date of termination of the Grant and the payment by CDPH of all items properly changeable to CDPH hereunder, Grantee shall transfer, assign and make available to CDPH all property and materials belonging to CDPH, all rights and claims to any and all reservations, grants, and arrangements with owners of media/PR materials, or others, and shall make available to CDPH all written information regarding CDPH's media/PR materials, and no extra compensation is to be paid to Grantee for its services.
  - 4) Take such action as may be necessary, or as CDPH may specify, to protect and preserve any property related to this agreement which is in the possession of the Grantee and in which CDPH has or may acquire an interest.
- I. CDPH may, at its discretion, require the Grantee to cease performance of certain components of the Scope of Work as designated by CDPH and complete performance of other components prior to the termination date of the Grant.

#### 3. Avoidance of Conflicts of Interest by Grantee [Required]

- A. CDPH intends to avoid any real or apparent conflict of interest on the part of the Grantee, subgrants, or employees, officers and directors of the Grantee or subgrants. Thus, CDPH reserves the right to determine, at its sole discretion, whether any information, assertion or claim received from any source indicates the existence of a real or apparent conflict of interest; and, if a conflict is found to exist, to require the Grantee to submit additional information or a plan for resolving the conflict, subject to CDPH review and prior approval.
- B. Conflicts of interest include, but are not limited to:
  - An instance where the Grantee or any of its subgrants, or any employee, officer, or director of the Grantee or any subgrant or has an interest, financial or otherwise,

whereby the use or disclosure of information obtained while performing services under the grant would allow for private or personal benefit or for any purpose that is contrary to the goals and objectives of the grant.

- 2) An instance where the Grantee's or any subgrant's employees, officers, or directors use their positions for purposes that are, or give the appearance of being, motivated by a desire for private gain for themselves or others, such as those with whom they have family, business or other ties.
- C. If CDPH is or becomes aware of a known or suspected conflict of interest, the Grantee will be given an opportunity to submit additional information or to resolve the conflict. A Grantee with a suspected conflict of interest will have five (5) working days from the date of notification of the conflict by CDPH to provide complete information regarding the suspected conflict. If a conflict of interest is determined to exist by CDPH and cannot be resolved to the satisfaction of CDPH, the conflict will be grounds for terminating the grant. CDPH may, at its discretion upon receipt of a written request from the Grantee, authorize an extension of the timeline indicated herein.

The use of headings or titles throughout this exhibit is for convenience only and shall not be used to interpret or to govern the meaning of any specific term or condition.

The terms "Grantee" and "SubGrantee" shall also mean, "agreement", "grant", "grant agreement", "Grantee" and "Subgrantee" respectively.

The terms "California Department of Public Health" and "CDPH" shall have the same meaning and refer to the California State agency that is a party to this Agreement.

This exhibit contains provisions that require strict adherence to various contracting laws and policies.

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#### 1. Federal Funds

(Applicable only to that portion of an agreement funded in part or whole with federal funds.)

- a. It is mutually understood between the parties that this Grant may have been written before ascertaining the availability of congressional appropriation of funds, for the mutual benefit of both parties, in order to avoid program and fiscal delays which would occur if the Grant were executed after that determination was made.
- b. This Grant is valid and enforceable only if sufficient funds are made available to the State by the United States Government for the fiscal years covered by the term of this Grant. In addition, this Grant is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, or conditions enacted by the Congress or any statute enacted by the Congress which may affect the provisions, terms or funding of this Grant in any manner.
- c. It is mutually agreed that if the Congress does not appropriate sufficient funds for the program, this Grant shall be amended to reflect any reduction in funds.
- d. CDPH has the option to invalidate or cancel the Grant with 30-days advance written notice or to amend the Grant to reflect any reduction in funds.

#### 2. Federal Equal Opportunity Requirements

(Applicable to all federally funded grants entered into by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) formerly known as California Department of Health Services (CDHS).)

- a. The Grantee will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era. The Grantee will take affirmative action to ensure that qualified applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, national origin, physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and career development opportunities and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Grantee agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the Federal Government or CDPH, setting forth the provisions of the Equal Opportunity clause, Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the affirmative action clause required by the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974 (38 U.S.C. 4212). Such notices shall state the Grantee's obligation under the law to take affirmative action to employ and advance in employment qualified applicants without discrimination based on their race, color, religion, sex, national origin physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era and the rights of applicants and employees.
- b. The Grantee will, in all solicitations or advancements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Grantee, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, national origin physical or mental handicap, disability, age or status as a disabled veteran or veteran of the Vietnam era.
- c. The Grantee will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding a notice, to be provided by the Federal Government or the State, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Grantee's commitments under the provisions herein and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- d. The Grantee will comply with all provisions of and furnish all information and reports required by Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended, the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974 (38 U.S.C. 4212) and of the Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

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- e. The Grantee will furnish all information and reports required by Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to its books, records, and accounts by the State and its designated representatives and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- f. In the event of the Grantee's noncompliance with the requirements of the provisions herein or with any federal rules, regulations, or orders which are referenced herein, this Agreement may be cancelled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Grantee may be declared ineligible for further federal and state contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- g. The Grantee will include the provisions of Paragraphs a through g in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to Federal Executive Order No. 11246 as amended, including by Executive Order 11375, 'Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,' and as supplemented by regulation at 41 CFR part 60, "Office of the Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor," or Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 or (38 U.S.C. 4212) of the Vietnam Era Veteran's Readjustment Assistance Act, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subGrantee or vendor. The Grantee will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the Director of the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs or CDPH may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance provided, however, that in the event the Grantee becomes involved in, or is threatened with litigation by a subGrantee or vendor as a result of such direction by CDPH, the Grantee may request in writing to CDPH, who, in turn, may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the State and of the United States.

#### 3. Debarment and Suspension Certification

- a. By signing this Grant, the Grantee/Grantee agrees to comply with applicable federal suspension and debarment regulations including, but not limited to 7 CFR Part 3017, 45 CFR 76, 40 CFR 32 or 34 CFR 85.
- b. By signing this Grant, the Grantee certifies to the best of its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals:
  - (1) Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency;
  - (2) Have not within a three-year period preceding this application/proposal/agreement been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against them for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (Federal, State or local) transaction or contract under a public transaction; violation of Federal or State antitrust statutes or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property;
  - (3) Are not presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a governmental entity (Federal, State or local) with commission of any of the offenses enumerated in Paragraph b(2) herein; and
  - (4) Have not within a three-year period preceding this application/proposal/agreement had one or more public transactions (Federal, State or local) terminated for cause or default.

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- (5) Shall not knowingly enter into any lower tier covered transaction with a person who is proposed for debarment under federal regulations (i.e., 48 CFR part 9, subpart 9.4), debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in such transaction, unless authorized by the State.
- (6) Will include a clause entitled, "Debarment and Suspension Certification" that essentially sets forth the provisions herein, in all lower tier covered transactions and in all solicitations for lower tier covered transactions.
- c. If the Grantee is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, the Grantee shall submit an explanation to the CDPH Program Contract Manager.
- d. The terms and definitions herein have the meanings set out in the Definitions and Coverage sections of the rules implementing Federal Executive Order 12549.
- e. If the Grantee knowingly violates this certification, in addition to other remedies available to the Federal Government, the CDPH may terminate this Agreement for cause or default.

#### 4. Covenant Against Contingent Fees

The Grantee warrants that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit/secure this Grant upon an agreement of understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, except bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies retained by the Grantee for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, CDPH shall have the right to annul this Grant without liability or in its discretion to deduct from the Grant price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such commission, percentage, and brokerage or contingent fee.

#### 5. Air or Water Pollution Requirements

Any federally funded grant and/or subgrants in excess of \$100,000 must comply with the following provisions unless said grant is exempt under 40 CFR 15.5.

- a. Government Grantees agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or requirements issued under section 306 of the Clean Air Act [42 U.S.C. 1857(h)], section 508 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1368), Executive Order 11738, and Environmental Protection Agency regulations (40 CFR part 15).
- b. Institutions of higher education, hospitals, nonprofit organizations and commercial businesses agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or requirements issued under the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401 et seq.), as amended, and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.), as amended.

#### 6. Lobbying Restrictions and Disclosure Certification

(Applicable to federally funded grants in excess of \$100,000 per Section 1352 of the 31, U.S.C.)

- a. Certification and Disclosure Requirements
  - (1) Each person (or recipient) who requests or receives a grant, subgrant, which is subject to Section 1352 of the 31, U.S.C., and which exceeds \$100,000 at any tier, shall file a certification (in the form set forth in Attachment 1, consisting of one page, entitled "Certification Regarding Lobbying") that the recipient has not made, and will not make, any payment prohibited by Paragraph b of this provision.
  - (2) Each recipient shall file a disclosure (in the form set forth in Attachment 2, entitled "Standard Form-LLL 'disclosure of Lobbying Activities'") if such recipient has made or has agreed to make any payment using nonappropriated funds (to include profits from any covered federal action) in connection with a grant or any extension or amendment of that grant, which would be prohibited under Paragraph b of this provision if paid for with appropriated funds.
  - (3) Each recipient shall file a disclosure form at the end of each calendar quarter in which there occurs any event that requires disclosure or that materially affect the accuracy of the information contained in any disclosure form previously filed by such person under Paragraph a(2) herein. An event that materially affects the accuracy of the information reported includes:

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- (a) A cumulative increase of \$25,000 or more in the amount paid or expected to be paid for influencing or attempting to influence a covered federal action;
- (b) A change in the person(s) or individuals(s) influencing or attempting to influence a covered federal action; or
- (c) A change in the officer(s), employee(s), or member(s) contacted for the purpose of influencing or attempting to influence a covered federal action.
- (4) Each person (or recipient) who requests or receives from a person referred to in Paragraph a(1) of this provision a grant or subgrant exceeding \$100,000 at any tier under a grant shall file a certification, and a disclosure form, if required, to the next tier above.
- (5) All disclosure forms (but not certifications) shall be forwarded from tier to tier until received by the person referred to in Paragraph a(1) of this provision. That person shall forward all disclosure forms to CDPH Program Contract Manager.

#### b. Prohibition

Section 1352 of Title 31, U.S.C., provides in part that no appropriated funds may be expended by the recipient of a federal contract or agreement, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement to pay any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with any of the following covered federal actions: the awarding of any federal contract or agreement, the making of any federal grant, the making of any federal loan, entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any federal contract or agreement, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.

#### 7. Additional Restrictions

Grantee shall comply with the restrictions under Division F, Title V, Section 503 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2012 (H.R. 2055), which provides that:

"SEC. 503.(a) No part of any appropriation contained in this Act or transferred pursuant to section 4002 of Public Law 111–148 shall be used, other than for normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships, for publicity or propaganda purposes, for the preparation, distribution, or use of any kit, pamphlet, booklet, publication, electronic communication, radio, television, or video presentation designed to support or defeat the enactment of legislation before the Congress or any State or local legislature or legislative body, except in presentation to the Congress or any State or local legislature itself, or designed to support or defeat any proposed or pending regulation, administrative action, or order issued by the executive branch of any State or local government, except in presentation to the executive branch of any State or local government itself.

- (b) No part of any appropriation contained in this Act or transferred pursuant to section 4002 of Public Law 111–148 shall be used to pay the salary or expenses of any grant or contract recipient, or agent acting for such recipient, related to any activity designed to influence the enactment of legislation, appropriations, regulation, administrative action, or Executive order proposed or pending before the Congress or any State government, State legislature or local legislature or legislative body, other than for normal and recognized executive-legislative relationships or participation by an agency or officer of a State, local or tribal government in policymaking and administrative processes within the executive branch of that government.
- (c) The prohibitions in subsections (a) and (b) shall include any activity to advocate or promote any proposed, pending or future Federal, State or local tax increase, or any proposed, pending, or future requirement or restriction on any legal consumer product, including its sale or marketing, including but not limited to the advocacy or promotion of gun control."

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#### 8. Human Subjects Use Requirements

(Applicable only to federally funded agreements in which performance, directly or through a subcontract/subaward, includes any tests or examination of materials derived from the human body.)

By signing this Agreement, Contractor agrees that if any performance under this Agreement or any subcontract or subagreement includes any tests or examination of materials derived from the human body for the purpose of providing information, diagnosis, prevention, treatment or assessment of disease, impairment, or health of a human being, all locations at which such examinations are performed shall meet the requirements of 42 U.S.C. Section 263a (CLIA) and the regulations thereunder.

#### 9. Financial and Compliance Audit Requirements

By signing this Agreement, the Contractor/Subcontrac tor agrees to abide by all requirements specified in 2 CFR 200 *et seq.*, 2 CFR *et seq.*, as applicable, including but not limited to obtaing an annual audit, and any subsequent federal regulatory additions or revisions.

- a. The definitions used in this provision are contained in Section 38040 of the Health and Safety Code, which by this reference is made a part hereof.
- b. Direct service contract means a contract or agreement for services contained in local assistance or subvention programs or both (see Health and Safety [H&S] Code section 38020). Direct service contracts shall not include contracts, agreements, grants, or subventions to other governmental agencies or units of government nor contracts or agreements with regional centers or area agencies on aging (H&S Code section 38030).
- c. The Contractor, as indicated below, agrees to obtain one of the following audits:
  - (1) If the Contractor is a nonprofit organization (as defined in H&S Code section 38040) and receives \$25,000 or more from any State agency under a direct service contract or agreement; the Contractor agrees to obtain an annual single, organization wide, financial and compliance audit. Said audit shall be conducted according to Generally Accepted Auditing Standards. This audit does not fulfill the audit requirements of Paragraph c(3) below. The audit shall be completed by the 15th day of the fifth month following the end of the Contractor's fiscal year, and/or
  - (2) If the Contractor is a nonprofit organization (as defined in H&S Code section 38040) and receives less than \$25,000 per year from any State agency under a direct service contract or agreement, the Contractor agrees to obtain a biennial single, organization wide financial and compliance audit, unless there is evidence of fraud or other violation of state law in connection with this Agreement. This audit does not fulfill the audit requirements of Paragraph c(3) below. The audit shall be completed by the 15th day of the fifth month following the end of the Contractor's fiscal year, and/or
  - (3) If the Contractor is a State or Local Government entity or Nonprofit organization (as defined in 2CFR Part 200) and expends \$750,000 or more in Federal awards, the Contractor agrees to obtain an annual single, organization wide, financial and compliance audit according to the requirements specified in 2CFR Part 200. An audit conducted pursuant to this provision will fulfill the audit requirements outlined in Paragraphs c(1) and c(2) above. The audit shall be completed by the end of the ninth month following the end of the audit period. The requirements of this provision apply if:
    - (a) The Contractor is a recipient expending Federal awards received directly from Federal awarding agencies, or
    - (b) The Contractor is a subrecipient expending Federal awards received from a pass-through entity such as the State, County or community based organization.
  - (4) If the Contractor submits to CDPH a report of an audit other than a single audit, the Contractor must also submit a certification indicating the Contractor has not expended \$750,000 or more in federal funds for the year covered by the audit report.

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- d. Two copies of the audit report shall be delivered to the CDPH program funding this Agreement. The audit report must identify the Contractor's legal name and the number assigned to this Agreement. The audit report shall be due within 30 days after the completion of the audit. Upon receipt of said audit report, the CDPH Program Contract Manager shall forward the audit report to CDPH's Audits and Investigations Unit if the audit report was submitted under Section 16.c(3), unless the audit report is from a City, County, or Special District within the State of California whereby the report will be retained by the funding program.
- e. The cost of the audits described herein may be included in the funding for this Agreement up to the proportionate amount this Agreement represents of the Contractor's total revenue. The CDPH program funding this Agreement must provide advance written approval of the specific amount allowed for said audit expenses.
- f. The State or its authorized designee, including the Bureau of State Audits, is responsible for conducting agreement performance audits which are not financial and compliance audits. Performance audits are defined by Generally Accepted Government Auditing Standards.
- g. Nothing in this Agreement limits the State's responsibility or authority to enforce State law or regulations, procedures, or reporting requirements arising thereto.
- h. Nothing in this provision limits the authority of the State to make audits of this Agreement, provided however, that if independent audits arranged for by the Contractor meet Generally Accepted Governmental Auditing Standards, the State shall rely on those audits and any additional audit work and shall build upon the work already done.
- The State may, at its option, direct its own auditors to perform either of the audits described above. The Contractor will be given advance written notification, if the State chooses to exercise its option to perform said audits.
- j. The Contractor shall include a clause in any agreement the Contractor enters into with the audit firm doing the single organization wide audit to provide access by the State or Federal Government to the working papers of the independent auditor who prepares the single organization wide audit for the Contractor.
- k. Federal or state auditors shall have "expanded scope auditing" authority to conduct specific program audits during the same period in which a single organization wide audit is being performed, but the audit report has not been issued. The federal or state auditors shall review and have access to the current audit work being conducted and will not apply any testing or review procedures which have not been satisfied by previous audit work that has been completed.

The term "expanded scope auditing" is applied and defined in the U.S. General Accounting Office (GAO) issued Standards for *Audit of Government Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions*, better known as the "yellow book".

#### 10. Audit and Record Retention

(Applicable to agreements in excess of \$10,000.)

- a. The Contractor shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence, accounting procedures and practices, sufficient to properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of whatever nature claimed to have been incurred in the performance of this Agreement, including any matching costs and expenses. The foregoing constitutes "records" for the purpose of this provision.
- b. The Contractor's facility or office or such part thereof as may be engaged in the performance of this Agreement and his/her records shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, audit, and reproduction.
- c. Contractor agrees that CDPH, the Department of General Services, the Bureau of State Audits, or their designated representatives including the Comptroller General of the United States shall have the right to review and to copy any records and supporting documentation pertaining to the performance of this Agreement. Contractor agrees to allow the auditor(s) access to such records during normal business hours and to allow interviews of any employees who might reasonably have information related to such records. Further, the Contractor agrees to include a similar right of the State to audit records and

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interview staff in any subcontract related to performance of this Agreement. (GC 8546.7, CCR Title 2, Section 1896).

- d. The Contractor shall preserve and make available his/her records (1) for a period of three years from the date of final payment under this Agreement, and (2) for such longer period, if any, as is required by applicable statute, by any other provision of this Agreement, or by subparagraphs (1) or (2) below.
  - (1) If this Agreement is completely or partially terminated, the records relating to the work terminated shall be preserved and made available for a period of three years from the date of any resulting final settlement.
  - (2) If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the expiration of the three-year period, the records shall be retained until completion of the action and resolution of all issues which arise from it, or until the end of the regular three-year period, whichever is later.
- e. The Contractor shall comply with the above requirements and be aware of the penalties for violations of fraud and for obstruction of investigation as set forth in Public Contract Code § 10115.10, if applicable.
- f. The Contractor may, at its discretion, following receipt of final payment under this Agreement, reduce its accounts, books and records related to this Agreement to microfilm, computer disk, CD ROM, or other data storage medium. Upon request by an authorized representative to inspect, audit or obtain copies of said records, the Contractor and/or Subcontractor must supply or make available applicable devices, hardware, and/or software necessary to view, copy and/or print said records. Applicable devices may include, but are not limited to, microfilm readers and microfilm printers, etc.
- g. The Contractor shall, if applicable, comply with the Single Audit Act and the audit reporting requirements set forth in Title 2 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 200 (2CFR Part 200).

#### 11. Federal Requirements

Grantor agrees to comply with and shall require all subgranteers, if any, to comply with all applicable Federal requirements including but not limited to the United States Code, the Code of Federal Regulations, the Funding Opportunity Announcement, the Notice of Award, the funding agreement, and any memoranda or letter regarding the applicable Federal requirements.
