Recommendations:

Human Services, Community Services Division, recommends the Board conduct a public hearing, review and approve a Community Development Block Grant Planning and Technical Assistance Economic Development Application for up to a \$35,000 grant to complete a feasibility study for a potential Farmer's Market in the Cameron Park/Shingle Springs area. Human Services requests the Board adopt a resolution authorizing submission of said application to the California Department of Housing and Community Development, including a commitment of \$2,100 from the Department's current General Fund allocation for Housing Element Implementation to meet the required cash match, authorizing the Chair of the Board of Supervisors to act on behalf of the County in signing the Statement of Assurances and further authorizing Department Director John Litwinovich to act on behalf of the County in all matters pertaining to this grant application and to execute and administer the standard agreement, contingent upon approval by County Counsel and Risk Management, and any amendments that do not affect the dollar amount or the term and other grant related documents if the application is funded.

Reasons for Recommendations:

The Shingle Springs-Cameron Park (SSCP) Chamber of Commerce conducted an online survey from residents and businesses in their jurisdiction in July 2006. The survey questions covered many issues, including desired Community Events. A Farmer's Market was among the top 3 events that residents want to see in the Shingle Springs-Cameron Park area. Based on the results of this survey demonstrating the unmet community need for a Farmer's Market, El Dorado County is applying for an Economic Development Planning and Technical Assistance Grant to assist the Chamber in obtaining a Consultant to develop and complete a study of the feasibility of instituting a Certified Farmer's Market in the area. A copy of the application is on file with the Board Clerk.

Fiscal Impact: Total Cost (or Savings):

It is proposed to utilize \$2,100 of the Department's County General Fund dollars currently budgeted for Housing Element Implementation administration to meet the cash match requirement if the application is funded.

Net County Cost:

The required \$2,100 cash match will be met with funds budgeted for 2006/07. There is no change in Net County Cost.

Action to be Taken Following Approval:

Board Clerk to provide Human Services, Community Services Division, with four (4) certified resolutions and four (4) Statement of Assurances documents signed by the Chairman.

- f. Identifies how the needs of non-English speaking residents will be met in the case of public hearings where a significant number of non-English speaking residents can reasonably be expected to participate.
- 4. The CDBG Program has been developed so as to primarily benefit targeted income persons and households, and each activity in the program meets one of the three national objectives: benefit to low and moderate income persons, elimination of slums and blight, or meets an urgent community need certified by the grantee as such.
- 5.
