Re: Disabled Parking Fine Schedule

Date: May 2, 2007

Synopsis:

Support for a resolution from the Board of Supervisors to amend the current penalty for violations of Vehicle Code section 22507.8(a) and section 22507.8(b) from the current \$275 penalty to an increase to \$450 (total penalty). The proposed increase would be consistent with the City of South Lake Tahoe's fine structure and ensure an effective enforcement tool for sheriff's deputies and California Highway Patrol officers patrolling the unincorporated areas of El Dorado County.

Details:

Based on information brought forth to the Board of Supervisors by the *Tahoe Area Coordinating Council for the Disabled*, a review of the structuring of parking fines and penalties for violations of California Vehicle Code sections 22507.8(a) and 22507.8(b) was examined. These sections are commonly known as unauthorized parking in designated disabled person parking spaces and obstructing, blocking or barring access to those parking spaces.

As can be expected, one of the goals of law enforcement is to obtain voluntary public compliance to government regulations. Voluntary compliance best addresses the needs of the social contract and promotes harmony in the community. Of specific concern to the group was the perception that persons with legally recognized disabilities, and who have obtained permitted disabled placards for parking in designated areas, were experiencing challenges to their lawful opportunity for preferred parking. In attempting to remedy the situation an analysis of scope of authority and historical enforcement of current application was addressed.

The California Vehicle code grants authority for cities and counties to adopt an ordinance or resolution to establish civil penalties for violations of parking statutes. This authority

can be found in the language of code section 40203.5(a) & (b). These sections state the following:

- (a) "The schedule of parking penalties for parking violations and late payment penalties shall be established by the governing body of the jurisdiction where the notice of violation is issued. To the extent possible, issuing agencies within the same county shall standardize parking penalties".
- (b) "Parking penalties under this article shall be collected as civil penalties".

While the County of El Dorado has no obligation to increase the penalty for violations of the disabled parking laws, some consideration should be addressed to the concerns of the affected community members and visitors. Additionally, since the City of South Lake Tahoe has already increased their parking penalty for violating Vehicle Code section 22507.8, some measure of consistency within the county is the "spirit of the law" as stated in section 40203.5(a).

In reviewing recent El Dorado County Sheriff's Office statistics:

29 citations were issued for violation of Vehicle Code section 22507.8 in calendar year 2006 and,

9 citations have been issued between January and April 2007.

While issuing of parking citation may not be a high priority in the average deputy sheriff's workday, the number of citations issued over the past 16 months indicates some validation to the concerns of the disabled.

Recommendation:

Support an amendment to the current parking fee structure allowing for an increase in penalty for violations of California Vehicle Code sections 22507.8(a) and 22507.8(b). A structured increase in the penalty can be expected to have a significant effect as a deterrent to the average driver. The current penalty is set at \$275. An increase to \$450 would place El Dorado County in a comparable position with the City of South Lake Tahoe and could be appropriate to the level that near future re-visiting of this issue will not be necessary. A fee structure increase coupled with a pro-active response from the Sheriff's Office should be sufficient to address the needs of the disabled and promote voluntary compliance by the non-disabled driver.

While there will be some initial fiscal impact to the County in educating the public of the change in penalty, no one should reasonably expect that all violators will cease their unlawful behavior. Some necessary spending of revenue will need to occur in signage changes for public parking areas. A suggestion may be worth considering regarding taking a portion of the increased penalty and utilizing it specifically for those fiscal needs. The Auditor's Office may have a format in place for such a process.

RESOLUTION OF THE EL DORADO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS ESTABLISHING A REVISED PENALTY SCHEDULE FOR VIOLATIONS OF VEHICLE CODE SECTION 22507.8 (PARKING IN SPACES DESIGNATED FOR DISABLED PERSONS)

WHEREAS, Section 22507.8 of the Vehicle Code generally prohibits any person from parking any vehicle in a stall or space designated for disabled persons and disabled veterans unless the vehicle displays either a special identification license plate or a distinguishing placard; and

WHEREAS, Section 42001.13 of the Vehicle Code requires that a person convicted of violating Section 22507.8 be punished by a fine of not less than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00); and

WHEREAS, Section 40203.5 of the Vehicle Code requires that the schedule for parking penalties be established by the governing body of the jurisdiction and that such penalties shall, to the extent possible, be standardized throughout the county; and

WHEREAS, the County's current penalty for violations of Section 22507.8 of the Vehicle Code is \$275.00, as established by El Dorado County Resolution No. 331-93, and the City of South Lake Tahoe's current penalty for violations of Section 22507.8 of the Vehicle Code is \$450.00, as established by City of South Lake Tahoe Resolution No. 2006-74; and

WHEREAS, the County desires to align the penalty for violations of Section 22507.8 of the Vehicle Code with that imposed by the City of South Lake Tahoe and also desires to increase the deterrent effect of the penalty.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby **RESOLVED** as follows: Pursuant to Sections 42001.13 and 40203.5 of the Vehicle Code, the fine imposed for violations of Section 22507.8 of the Vehicle Code (parking in spaces designated for disabled persons) is hereby increased to \$450.00 per violation.

RECOMMENDATION:

Resolution to amend the current parking violation fine schedule for the City of South Lake Tahoe to ensure a fair and effective tool of enforcement. Specifically, to increase the fine for unlawful handicapped parking to \$450.00 and for unlawful parking during snow removal conditions to \$200.00. All other violation fines would remain the same.

ISSUE AND DISCUSSION:

· Examination of illegal handicapped parking and snow parking fines.

Our current parking violation fine schedule, and when it was established.

• An informal analysis of the fines of like jurisdictions.

Number of citations issued, and revenue generated to the City from these citations.

Our current strategy to reduce handicapped parking violations.

Purpose:

In terms of enforcing safe and legal parking practices within the city, the goal of the South Lake Tahoe Police Department is to generate the public's voluntary compliance to laws and local ordinances. Where violations exist, employees of the police department, or those of private agencies on contract, may issue parking citations. The purpose behind such sanctions is to ensure, by way of leveling a fair but effective fine, our parking problems do not linger unabated and that safe, fair and optimal parking is offered in consideration of all affected community stakeholders.

Background:

The City of South Lake Tahoe has held the lawful authority to issue parking tickets since its incorporation. The police department and privately contracted security furns have accomplished this task over the years. The City of South Lake Tahoe has historically contracted to an independent corporation for processing parking tickets generated by the city. This entity is responsible for collection of fines and distribution of these fines back to the city. The city contracted to the current administrative company "Judicial Data Systems Corporation" (JDS) in 1988. The fine schedule for parking violations was recommended at that time by JDS, and based upon what other jurisdictions were then using. The fine schedule was last revised in 2003.

Project Work Scope & Workload Impacts:

An appeal process is available for contested parking citations. Contested citations are returned to the police department by JDS to be reviewed by a designated officer. If a defendant loses a first hearing, another is offered by an official of higher rank in the police department. This may be either in person or by written declaration. The determination of the second review would be final. A conservative estimate of the number of contested parking citations currently reviewed by the police department is approximately two hundred per month. A great majority of these are generated in the Heavenly Village shopping complex and redeveloped area of the City. Increasing the fines of our current schedule may impact the number of contested citations reviewed by the police department. This is the only predictable impact to scope and load of duties performed by the city should our fine schedule be increased.

Evaluation:

Our current parking fine schedule provides for a \$50.00 penalty for most general violations. For this report we are particularly interested in the fines associated with illegal handicapped parking and unlawful parking during snow conditions. This report compares our own fine schedule to similar parking violation fines of 9 other queried jurisdictions. Most jurisdictions contacted advised their fine structures had not been altered in several years; even decades. Most other jurisdictions felt it was time to readdress their own fine structures to reflect a more effective schedule.

There exists no requirement to increase our current fine schedule for parking violations. Our current parking fine schedule is equal to, or higher than, most other jurisdictions in or near our geographic area. Our City appears to have a moderate fine for handicapped parking violations as compared to these other jurisdictions. Nevertheless it seems reasonable that this matter should be given consideration, given that the current schedule has not been changed for past 20 years.

The strategy to reduce handicapped parking violations in the City falls to the police department. This is handled primarily through our Community Service Officers. CSO's enforce the majority of handicapped and snow condition parking laws in our city. The CSO unit participates in an annual public information campaign to educate locals and visitors about snow condition parking issues. They also work with our business community to help maintain the proper markings, postings and enforcement of handicapped parking places.

Conclusion

A fine schedule for parking violations should be fair and effective, while reflecting our community values attached to specific parking concerns. It seems that a \$50.00 fine for most general parking violations is reasonable. However, an increase in the fine for violations of handicapped and snow removal condition parking could be both fair and effective.

Because of the resort status of our city, parking is most often a premium commodity. Our severe winter weather increases the parking and walking hazards to handicapped individuals above that of many other jurisdictions. It is often more difficult for our disabled locals and visitors to safely park and conduct their affairs. We have a specific duty to safeguard their ability to do so.

The need to keep vehicles off the street during snow removal conditions is also a highly valued objective for our city. Unlawfully parked vehicles which hinder the sufficient plowing of our streets represent a real danger. Residents may not be able to drive to their necessary destinations. Emergency service responses to the community may be delayed or even prevented.

We believe a \$450.00 fine for handicapped parking violations is appropriate for our city. We also believe a \$200.00 fine for unlawful parking during snow removal conditions is also appropriate.

FINANCIAL AND/OR POLICY IMPLICATIONS:

An analysis of snow parking and handicapped parking citations issued in the City of South Lake Tahoe from September of 2005 through August 2006 revealed:

Handicapped Parking Violations:

46 citations were issued

9 fines were paid \$2,475.00 in fines paid

Snow Conditions Parking Violations:

255 citations were issued 91 fines were paid \$9,282.00 in fines paid.

Various signs within the City would need to be changed to reflect updated fines. Signs would be produced by City staff. Cost would be under \$2,000.00 which is off set by the increased penalties. No change in enforcement would occur until signs have been changed to reflect the new fine.

Prior to implication Public Works and the Police Department will collaborate to educate the public on parking issues. Regarding "Snow Parking", during the first two storms of the season, only warnings will be issued to illegally parked vehicles.

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In terms of enforcing safe and legal parking practices within the city, the goal of the South Lake Tahoe Police Department is to generate the public's voluntary compliance to laws and local ordinances. Where violations exist, employees of the police department, or those of private agencies on contract, may issue parking citations. The purpose behind such sanctions is to ensure, by way of leveling a fair but effective fine, our parking problems do not linger unabated and that safe, fair and optimal parking is offered in consideration of all affected community stakeholders.

Background:

The City of South Lake Tahoe has held the lawful authority to issue parking tickets since its incorporation. The police department and privately contracted security firms have accomplished this task over the years. The City of South Lake Tahoe has historically contracted to an independent corporation for processing parking tickets generated by the city. This entity is responsible for collection of fines and distribution of these fines back to the city. The city contracted to the current administrative company "Judicial Data Systems Corporation" (JDS) in 1988. The fine schedule for parking violations was recommended at that time by JDS, and based upon what other jurisdictions were then using. The fine schedule was last revised in 2003.

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Project Work Scope & Workload Impacts:

An appeal process is available for contested parking citations. Contested citations are returned to the police department by JDS to be reviewed by a designated officer. If a defendant loses a first hearing, another is offered by an official of higher rank in the police department. This may be either in person or by written declaration. The determination of the second review would be final. A conservative estimate of the number of contested parking citations currently reviewed by the police department is approximately two hundred per month. A great majority of these are generated in the Heavenly Village shopping complex and redeveloped area of the City. Increasing the fines of our current schedule may impact the number of contested citations reviewed by the police department. This is the only predictable impact to scope and load of duties performed by the city should our fine schedule be increased.

Evaluation:

Our current parking fine schedule provides for a \$50.00 penalty for most general violations. For this report we are particularly interested in the fines associated with illegal handicapped parking and unlawful parking during snow conditions. This report compares our own fine schedule to similar parking violation fines of 9 other queried jurisdictions. Most jurisdictions contacted advised their fine structures had not been altered in several years; even decades. Most other jurisdictions felt it was time to readdress their own fine structures to reflect a more effective schedule.

Alternatives

There exists no requirement to increase our current fine schedule for parking violations. Our current parking fine schedule is equal to, or higher than, most other jurisdictions in or near our geographic area. Our City appears to have a moderate fine for handicapped parking violations as compared to these other jurisdictions. Nevertheless it seems reasonable that this matter should be given consideration, given that the current schedule has not been changed for past 20 years.

The strategy to reduce handicapped parking violations in the City falls to the police department. This is handled primarily through our Community Service Officers. CSO's enforce the majority of handicapped and snow condition parking laws in our city. The CSO unit participates in an annual public information campaign to educate locals and visitors about snow condition parking issues. They also work with our business community to help maintain the proper markings, postings and enforcement of handicapped parking places.

Conclusion

A fine schedule for parking violations should be fair and effective, while reflecting our community values attached to specific parking concerns. It seems that a \$50.00 fine for most general parking violations is reasonable. However, an increase in the fine for violations of handicapped and snow removal condition parking could be both fair and effective.

Because of the resort status of our city, parking is most often a premium commodity. Our severe winter weather increases the parking and walking hazards to handicapped individuals above that of many other jurisdictions. It is often more difficult for our disabled locals and visitors to safely park and conduct their affairs. We have a specific duty to safeguard their ability to do so.

The need to keep vehicles off the street during snow removal conditions is also a highly valued objective for our city. Unlawfully parked vehicles which hinder the sufficient plowing of our streets represent a real danger. Residents may not be able to drive to their necessary destinations. Emergency service responses to the community may be delayed or even prevented.

We believe a \$450.00 fine for handicapped parking violations is appropriate for our city. We also believe a \$200.00 fine for unlawful parking during snow removal conditions is also appropriate.

FINANCIAL AND/OR POLICY IMPLICATIONS:

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An analysis of snow parking and handicapped parking citations issued in the City of South Lake Tahoe from September of 2005 through August 2006 revealed:

Handicapped Parking Violations:

46 citations were issued

9 fines were paid

\$2,475.00 in fines paid

Snow Conditions Parking Violations:

255 citations were issued

91 fines were paid

\$9,282.00 in fines paid.

Various signs within the City would need to be changed to reflect updated fines. Signs would be produced by City staff. Cost would be under \$2,000.00 which is off set by the increased penalties. No change in enforcement would occur until signs have been changed to reflect the new fine.

Prior to implication Public Works and the Police Department will collaborate to educate the public on parking issues. Regarding "Snow Parking", during the first two storms of the season, only warnings will be issued to illegally parked vehicles.
