RE: Proposed recommendation to sub-contract Senior Legal Services

We the undersigned residents of El Dorado County hereby request that the Board reconsider a proposed budget cut that would impact Senior Legal Services. Per the fact sheet posted to the County website 6/15/17, it appears the Board is considering abolishing 3.5 full time positions, which would effectively eliminate our legal staff, in order to save the County \$250,000 annually. El Dorado County is listed as one of the best places to retire, which is in part thanks to our outstanding senior services. The senior residents of El Dorado County do appreciate and rely on these services, as well as the individual care and compassion our County staff provide. Transferring us to a unknown "selected" contractor, away from our familiar and trusted legal providers does not sound like the best solution.

The fact sheet confirms the County Legal Services receives annual Federal funding in the amount of \$80,000. What would become of this funding? Additionally, with \$94,000 in donations for the fiscal year 2015/16, it is apparent that the residents of El Dorado County do appreciate the legal services provided, and are willing to give back as they are able. If legal services were transferred to an outside contractor, it is quite possible the annual donations would greatly decrease, or possibly cease entirely.

Please reconsider keeping our legal services intact. So much assistance has been provided to many of the El Dorado County senior residents, who without this program as it is, may not be able to seek help for legal matters.

I agree with Larry Weitzman's analysis and potential consequences of the abolition of Senior Legal Services: a boneheaded decision that will save a little money but will do a great deal of damage.

EDC has the largest percentage of seniors of any county in California. If this imbecilic decision is designed to do the most harm to the largest number of elderly people, success is guaranteed. EDC seniors are favorite targets of numerous scams, from Nigerian princes needing cash to collect their inheritance, to "grandchildren" needing quick cash for bail. The decision to close senior services seems to have been strictly an accounting exercise, with little thought given to the emotional and psychological needs of the elderly.

The BOS must explain to the voters what are its priorities; if the welfare of one of our more vulnerable groups is not a priority, then what is? What's next on the chopping block: child services? Why not abolish the position of Public Information Officer and staff? Having once been a military PIO, I always considered myself a parasite. Things have not changed. Or why not take some money from the Sheriff's Taj Mahalian office project?

The frankly-speaking dumb proposal to abolish Senior Legal Services must be generating considerable pushback. Undoubtedly, the BOS will try to finesse this decision, perhaps by slowly de-funding the office, while announcing with great fanfare that private donations will pick up the slack. Larry Weitzman has explained in detail that private donations cannot cover the merest fraction of the costs.

Seniors are many, and vote. PIO and Executive Officer supporters are few!

Honorable Board Members,

In my eight years sitting in the Elder Protection Unit ending December 2014, Senior Legal Services proved over and over its status as a county vanguard in early detection of senior fraud and elder abuse.

Much like Code Enforcement and Meals on Wheels drivers, Senior Legal are often first contact with our most vulnerable elderly population. All too many times members of the Elder Protection Unit team would quickly to render aid to a senior as a result of Senior Legal contact. Be it financial fraud commit by a new found "friend" or the horrific rescue of an 80 year old woman who was duct taped to a chair while her "friend" went out. If not for Senior Legal there would be far too undetected bad things happening out in the real world to our seniors.

In my eight year tenure I too experienced the institutional dislike of the Senior Legal. Many County Counsels worked each budget cycle to get rid of it. Health and Human Services Directors, for the most part, did the same. I listened, but my boards saw the value Senior Legal brings to our County in its current rendition.

I think our predecessors strategically placed Senior Legal in its now current form under HHSA because it allows interaction in peer to peer setting with HHSA, County Counsel and all other county departments. This is necessary for fluid and confidential discussions of all senior fraud and or elder abuse.

Senior Legal is far more than dispensing free wills or other advise. It is a workhorse, the tip of the spear in identification and fighting senior financial fraud and elder abuse inside El Dorado County.

I hope the questions you ask on Tuesday about Senior Legal centers around the good it delivers, the weak and infirmed it helps to aid. Senior Legal paltry budget repays thousands of untold dollars in savings to other county services and it does saves lives!
