



Highlights:

- Most funding coming into Behavioral Health is tied to delivery of services for specified programs.
- Base funding levels for individual counties are now set for 2011 Realignment.
- The county budgets full use of fund balance on the revenue side and an appropriation for contingencies on the expense side to allow flexibility throughout the year.
- MHSA Revenues are paid at an estimated rate all year long, a true up occurs in the July/August timeframe. The true up can either greatly increase or decrease revenues received for the year.

Areas of Concern:

- When the economy slows down and sales tax receipts drop statewide, we will experience a reduction in 1991 & 2011 Realignment.
- When the economy slows and California millionaire's income levels drop, MHSA revenues will likewise drop.





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
New Service Request Trends

Assisted Outpatient Treatment: (Rhapsody Flores)









- There were **41** Admissions in May, 2017; **20** Admissions were El Dorado County residents and **21** were Out of County residents.
- There were 18 El Dorado County residents discharged in May, 2017; 14 to Home with Support, 2 to Home without support, -- MHRC, 2 Board and Care, -- to ICM T-House, -- Shelter, and -- to Other.
- Upon discharge, **16** El Dorado County residents were insured and **2** El Dorado County residents were pending insurance.
- During the month of May, there were 0 Seclusion Episodes, 0 Physical Restraint Episodes (0 minute), 0 Assaults (0 clients), 0 Elopement, 3 Medication Errors (3 medication errors with no patient involvement), Client Surveys 19
- There were 4 denials of El Dorado County referrals: 1 had Medicare days available, 1 had Drug induced Psychosis, 1 had Dementia, 1 Private Insurance
- Average daily census was 9.35, with 6 average length of stay of days.





A member of the Sheriff's new Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) was present to discuss what interventions their team plans to implement to assist homeless individuals.



Mental Health Clients in Jail (Jamie Samboceti)





Quality Improvement/Utilization Review (Ren Scammon)

 On May 31, 2017, the BHD received the final report from the External Quality Review performed by Behavioral Health Concepts, Inc. on March 21, 2017. There were no surprises in this report. The full report is attached to this monthly update. Recommendations from Behavioral health Concepts, Inc. are:

- It is imperative that the BHD to take actions to stabilize staffing levels and reduce vacancies through examining and mitigating factors contributing to separations.
- Update the Cultural Competence Plan with a special focus on outreach and engagement to the Latino community and building on the MHSA programs to create clinics with a high degree of cultural competence.
- Advance the current Concept Only PIPs to Active PIPs so that the next review has two Active PIPs in process.
- Develop peer leadership to expand hours of the Wellness Center with peer stipends or salaries depending on scope of responsibilities.
- The State has not yet issued its final standards for implementing the "Mega Regs" related to Medi-Cal Managed Care. However, the QI team continues to review its data sources to determine the source of the data and identifying potential changes to Avatar that may be needed.

MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ACT (MHSA) (Ren Scammon/Tami Smith)

- The MHSA FY 17-18 Three-Year Plan is scheduled for the Board of Supervisors on June 20, 2017 at 11:00 a.m. or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard.
- Many good comments were received during the Public Comment period, and the MHSA Project Team is reviewing those further to determine how implement the ideas presented into the MHSA planning process, outcome measures and program implementation.

OUTPATIENT SERVICES

Wellness Center May Activities:

Tahoe:

• In recognition of Mental Health Awareness Month we had several activities to celebrate heightened awareness and stigma reduction. Our wellness party was themed to reinforce good mental health with foods that support brain health and activities to support good mental health- games (trivia & word search) to stimulate thinking, jokes (some good & some not so) to elicit laughter and movement activities (gentle, mindful stretching and a challenging fast action game of simon (keith) says. Wellness also traveled to Sacramento twice! On May 6 they participated in the NAMI walk and on May 24 in Mental Health activities on the state capitol.

West Slope:

- WS Wellness Center had several activities this month in recognition of Mental Health Awareness month.
- To prepare for the month's festivities, on April 28th, Lesly Van Sloten, Program Coordinator II and Jan Melnicoe, President of NAMI decorated two display cabinets at the BOS entry with Mental Health Awareness and Each Mind Matters signs, brochures, and various informational products.
- May 4th was "May the Forth Be With You" costume party (dress up like your favorite Star Wars character) complete with a Peer written and Peer facilitated Star Wars trivia game. Also on this day, each Client signed a green ribbon for the Mental Health Awareness Bulletin board committing to work toward reducing stigma and increasing awareness.
- May 6th was the NAMI 5k walk in Sacramento where many EDC Staff (some with their pets) and Clients walked together in solidarity to reduce stigma.
- May 16th was our "Sock Hop", complete with 50s music, root beer floats and some good ol' fashioned dancing (mostly the twist).
- May 23rd, Jan Melnicoe returned to the Wellness Center to speak to our Clients and their supports about the benefits of joining NAMI as a community resource.

- Jan spoke to the group and then facilitated a really fun trivia game with the group.
- We added a Peer Leader to co-facilitate our Living Skills Group with Melissa Prophet until he feels comfortable taking the group over completely.
- We added a Peer Leader to teach computer literacy to WC guests during WC open hours.

ICM - May Activities:

Tahoe:

 All the individuals in both t-houses in SLT have been making good progress in their own recovery and in offering support for others.

West Slope:

- The Pedometer Competition between TTP residents and staff ended on May 1st.
 Residents participated in the competition to get ready for the NAMI Walk on May 6th.
- Nearly 20 clients from West Slope and SLT_ICM, Wellness Center, and TTP attended the NAMI Walk
- May 27th was First of the Summer Fishing trips. An ICM client caught a 16 inch Trout at Union Valley Reservoir.

Children's Services (Angie Larrigan)

- AB 403 CCR provides the statutory and policy framework to ensure services and supports provided to the child or youth and his or her family are tailored toward the ultimate goal of maintaining a stable permanent family. AB 403 CCR emphasizes that reliance on congregate care should be limited to short-term, therapeutic interventions that are just one part of a continuum of care available for children, youth, and young adults.
- El Dorado County has implemented the treatment option identified in AB403 known as Children and Family Teams (CFT's). The California Department of Social Services (CDSS) and the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) recognize the unique needs of children and youth in the child welfare and probation systems as well as children and youth receiving Specialty Mental Health Services (SMHS). CFT's are designed to enhance the opportunity for success in obtaining and maintaining stability in a youth's life through coordinated care and case planning.
- Per DHCS, a child or youth is required to have a CFT within the first sixty (60) days of entering into the child welfare or probation foster care placement. As defined in Welfare and Institutions Code, Section 16501, a CFT is also required for those children and youth residing in a group home or Short Term Residential Therapeutic Program (STRTP) placement with an existing case plan. Best practice dictates that meetings should occur as soon as possible for, but not limited to, case planning purposes, placement determination, emancipation planning and/or safety planning. The CFTs should also be in place for children and youth receiving certain Specialty Mental Health Services (i.e. Intensive Care Coordination and Intensive Home Based Services).

TAY DBT/FEP Program (Sabrina Owen and Lesly Van Sloten)

Tahoe

• The two DBT groups currently offered on both STHS and Tallac campus will be concluding at the end of the school year (June). Social and recreational activities will be scheduled for summer break to allow for continued support and skill use in a community setting. Active recruitment of new DBT participants & skill coaches will begin when school resumes in the fall. Participants of the DBT groups are eligible for individual and family counselling and Anastasia is currently working with 2 participants and their families. Currently we have 3 FEP clients, substance use and treatment engagement continue to be challenging.

Placerville

- Kris continues to provide 5 DBT Groups at Independence High School and 2
 DBT Groups at Charter Community School along with providing individual
 therapy and family therapy. Teachers and staff members continue to compliment
 the success of these groups and Kris' presence on both campuses. Both School
 Principals approached Kris to thank her for providing DBT on their campuses and
 to make sure she would be returning next year. Attendance in all groups began
 to dwindled due to summer approaching and various outings/field trips scheduled
 by the schools. Last day of school was May 26th.
- Kris currently has 2 FEP Clients who she provides extensive treatment for in the NAVIGATE Model and there is 1 current opening.
