Subject: Letter of Support for a Vegetation Hazard Abatement County Ordinance

April 18, 2017

Dear Supervisor Frentzen,

While the vast majority of the residents of El Dorado County do their best to maintain defensible space around their homes and are good stewards of the land, there is significant fire risk from absentee property owners, land speculators and those that just do not care.

The problem of overgrown vacant lots and general property hygiene is brought forward at nearly every meeting of our Fire Safe Council. Consistently mentioned in community surveys and meetings was an overall concern of overgrown and un-managed vegetation on vacant lots. A majority of the people surveyed rated untreated vacant lots adjacent to their residence as their highest wildland fire concern. Defensible Space has important implications not only for personal and property safety, but also for insurance coverage. Homeowners within the WUI (which includes all of the area covered by our Fire Safe Council) are facing greater challenges each year with obtaining and maintaining their fire insurance coverage. Numerous residents report outright cancellation of homeowners insurance. Others, while not cancelled, have had rates increased by amounts up to and over 300% in the past year. Annual rates of between \$2000 and \$3000 are now common in our area.

Regulation through codes and ordinances and subsequent enforcement is always a major challenge. The primary goal of Defensible Space is to reduce the chance of structural ignition and to provide a safety zone for residents and firefighters. State law (CA Public Resources Code 4291) does give CAL FIRE the authority to enforce the 100-foot (or to the property line, if less than 100') defensible space requirement around structures. However, it does not address unimproved parcels, even if they are immediately adjacent to residences. A few areas may have relief through local Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&R). However, these are not common in our area. Without a Vegetation Hazard Abatement ordinance, the vast majority of our residents do not have any enforcement tools to help mitigate the very real wildfire threat that the untreated and overgrown parcels present to their homes, businesses and neighborhoods.

The Pollock Pines-Camino Fire Safe Council supports the efforts of El Dorado County Fire Safe Council to work with our County and Fire Agency partners to develop an ordinance that helps to keep our citizen and homes safe, while respecting the rights of property owners.
