The Facts

- Effective efforts to build strong families are less costly to California than trying to treat the perilous effects of child abuse and neglect after they have occurred.

► California ranks 49th on measures of kids' economic well-being. While it is a prosperous state, around 1 in 4 California children live in poverty.

► The most costly health and social concerns in our nation arise as a consequence of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). <http://www.acesconnection.com/>

► The leading risk factors of abuse include poverty, substance abuse, mental health and generational child abuse within the family.

► More often than not, children who are removed from their homes due to difficult circumstances are reunified with their parents and this is always the number one goal.

► 1 in 4 children have experienced abuse or neglect at some point in their lives.

Preventing child abuse is a shared responsibility for all community members. Together, we can raise awareness and lower the risk factors of child maltreatment. Please join the effort to eliminate child abuse!

Volunteer

- » Help out at your local Family Resource Center.

» Become a mentor for a child. Having a stable and caring adult presence can make a big difference!
» Start a neighborhood watch for families to keep an eye out for one another.

Speak Up

- » Plant a pinwheel garden to raise awareness.

» Attend a local government meeting to voice the needs of families.
» Hold an open house and invite neighbors to learn what they can do to prevent child abuse.

Reach Out

- » Organize a block party and invite your neighbors.

» Stress and isolation are child-abuse risk factors. Offer to baby-sit for a friend or family member. Parenting is hard work and everyone deserves a break now and then.

» Demonstrate the meaning of *Community in Unity* by organizing a fundraiser or a food drive to support an organization that helps families.
