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SB 450 History


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- ✓ Signed into Law in 2016
- Allowed 5 Counties to pilot Vote Centers in 2018
- ✓ Allows remaining Counties Vote Centers in 2020
- ✓ Requires 1 11 day center for every 50,000 Voters
 - ✓ 3 required for EI Dorado County
- Requires 1 additional 4 day center for every 10,000
 Voters
 - ✓ 10 required for El Dorado County
- Requires 1 drop box for every 15,000 Voters
 - ✓ 9 required for El Dorado County
- As we work with Voters the numbers may increase

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
How our Voters Currently Vote

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
Senate District 1 March 26, 2019 DATA


The SD1 Special election on March 26, 2019 was indicative of what we

have seen over the past decade.



94% of the voter turnout was by Mail






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How our Voters Currently Vote



Every year more voters are registering to be Absentee. We have close to 80% of our Voters receiving a mail ballot.



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How our Voters Currently Vote

- ✓ Almost 80% of our voters are already voting by mail.
- ✓ Mail Ballot is consistently higher than Polling Locations. November, 2018: 81.88% Mail Ballot vs. 18.12% Precinct.
- ✓ Voters are continuing to return more Mail Ballots to the polls: 64 returned in 2002 and now 22,360 in November of 2018.
- ✓ Voters use Building C Drop Box with 9,965 dropped in November, 2018.
- ✓ Provisional ballots have increased significantly. There were 10 in 2002 and it peaked at 2,641 in November, 2016.
- ✓ Legislatively we are locked at the number of polling places (up to 102) even though the use has decreased from a high of 39,852 voters to a low of 7,549.

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Improvements for Voters

- Every Voter receives a mail ballot
- Provides more days and more locations where a voter can get services that are currently only available at the election office.
- ✓ At a Vote Center, voters can:
 - Vote at ANY location
 - Open at least 8 hours per day
 - Drop their ballot at a drop box or vote center
 - Conditionally Register to Vote
 - ✓ Vote with or without their mailed ballot (reduces provisional ballots)
- ✓ Voters who enjoy the polling place experience can still have it.


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Improvements for Voters

- More convenient for voters:
 - ✓ Open on the weekends
 - ✓ Open for up to 11 days
 - Drop boxes where they go:
 - ✓ Supermarkets, Libraries, etc.
- ✓ Sacramento saw an 11% increase in "Very Satisfied"

 voters from June, 2018 to November, 2018.



- Significant reduction in Provisional ballots (expensive to process):
 - ✓ Nevada County went from 1,500 to 7 provisional ballots.
 - ✓ Voters leave knowing their ballot is counted.
- ✓ "Never have to say No to a voter!" Greg Diaz, Registrar of Voters, Nevada County

- ✓ I have received positive feedback from many community groups (10+) I have spoken with about vote centers.
- ✓ New Legislation has been <u>proposed</u> that will add Vote Centers/Early Voting to polling place Counties. (AB 363)

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The Financials of Vote Centers



The Cost – Voting System

- Estimated new voting system cost approximately 48% (\$600,000) less.
 - ✓ Polling Place: \$1.25M
 - ✓ Vote Center \$650K
- ✓Initial investment will use some of the initial savings:
 - Transportation Carts
 - ✓ Laptops/Tablets
 - ✓ Inbound Sorter
 - Ballot on Demand Printers
 - Secure Network Connectivity

The Cost Per Election

- ✓ <u>Per election increase</u>: approximately 2.5% (\$7,062.23) per major election The primary reasons for the increase:
 - ✓ Outreach to voters 2 times prior to each election (@\$50K/election)
 - √ 11 Day Vote Centers
 - There are discussions to reduce these costs to make vote centers less expensive.

Available Funding and County Cost

- There is both Federal and State Funds available to help pay for the new voting system AND Vote Centers with a County required match.
- ✓ The Maximum County General Fund impact would be \$757,000

 - Hold Public Meetings
 - ✓ VAAC and LAAC input
 - Form Voting Advisory Committee (VAC) to solicit input
 - Continue with studies to identify locations for Centers and Drop Boxes:
 - Number of Vote Centers and Drop Boxes for our Community
 - Secure and Reliable Network Connectivity
 - ✓ Population Centers
 - ✓ Proximity to Low Voter Turnout Areas
 - ✓ Proximity to Public Transportation
 - Proximity to Voters with Disability
 - ✓ Availability of Free Parking
 - Distance for Voters to Travel
 - ✓ Serve our outlying areas


