SHERIFF'S CRIME ANALYST

DEFINITION

Under <u>general supervisiondirection</u>, gathers, categorizes, and analyzes narrative and statistical data pertaining to past and current criminal activity; prepares and disseminates reports and recommendations pertaining to existing and anticipated criminal activity to sworn personnel, in order to increase the effectiveness of patrol deployment, crime prevention, and the apprehension of suspects; <u>provides administration</u> with statistical analysis using records management, dispatch and jail databases; and <u>performs related duties as assigned</u>.

DISTINGUISHINGSUPERVISION RECEIVED AND EXERCISED

Receives direction from assigned supervisory or management personnel. Exercises no direct supervision over staff.

CLASS CHARACTERISTICS

This is an experienced, nonsworn class with responsibility for fully qualified, journey-level, non-sworn classification responsible for performing professional-level crime analysis requiring significant education and experience using statistics and probability, and knowledge of law enforcement operations. The incumbent is duties. Incumbents are responsible for collecting, analyzing, and evaluating criminal intelligence data, preparing and providing reports and crime mapping analysis, utilizing specialized law enforcement databases and software, and crime reports. This class reports to the Sheriff's Technology Manager. Positions at this level receive only occasional instruction or assistance as new or unusual situations arise and are fully aware of the operating procedures and policies of the work unit.

Must possess mobility to work in a standard office setting and use standard office equipment, including a computer, to operate a motor vehicle, and to visit various County and meeting sites; vision to read printed material and a computer screen; and hearing and speech to communicate in person, before groups, and over the telephone. The job involves occasional fieldwork requiring walking on uneven terrain. Finger dexterity is needed to access, enter, and retrieve data using a computer keyboard or calculator and to operate standard office equipment. Positions in this classification frequently bend, stoop, kneel, reach, and climb to perform work and inspect work sites. Employees must possess the ability to lift, carry, push, and pull materials and objects weighing up to 25 pounds. Reasonable accommodations will be made for individuals on a case-by-case basis.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONDITIONS
