A) Provide a description of Recovery Act projects for purposes of creating and sustaining economic growth and employment opportunities. Include a description of targeted individuals and families; services and activities; and how the services and activities are tailored to the specific needs of the community.

The El Dorado County Board of Supervisors is the designated Community Action Agency (CAA), and the Department of Human Services (DHS) is the County department designated to administer the Community Action programs and activities. DHS provides a variety of programs that serve clients of all ages, from infants to senior citizens, including the Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program and the Title IIIB Information and Assistance (I&A) Program. The CSBG Recovery Act funds will be used to retain program staff in the Federal Older Americans Act Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program and to reinstate and expand a Care Coordination & Monitoring (CCM) component in the Information and Assistance Program. In the Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program, the loss of local over-match funding threatened the closure of two congregate meal sites in El Dorado County starting in FY 10-11. CSBG ARRA funds will be used to offset salaries (specifically, 1.0 FTE Cook and 0.81 FTE Meal Site Coordinator), facility lease and direct meal preparation and service costs for the two congregate meal sites. Congregate meals are provided to senior citizens 60 years and older Monday through Friday regardless of income.

Title IIIB Information and Assistance Program care coordination activities were eliminated in FY 08-09. CSBG ARRA funds will be used to retain 1.95 FTE program staff to reinstate and expand I&A care coordination services provided through a new short-term Care Coordination and Monitoring (CCM) program. Services will be provided on a limited basis to individuals either waiting for or transitioning from format care management services. These services are a critical component of the continuum of care in El Dorado County and will help fill the gap in services that resulted from the elimination of the State-funded Linkages Program effective October 1, 2009. The Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program and Title IIIB Information and Assistance Program serve priority needs within the community.

B) Provide a description of the service delivery system for Recovery Act projects for purposes of providing a wide range of innovative services and activities. Include a description of the geographical area served.

The Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program's congregate meal sites not only provide a hot, nutritious meal to senior citizens 60 years and older Monday through Friday, but also provide an opportunity for recipients to access information about and connect with other community services. Referrals are made to other DHS and community resources such as Adult Protective Services, case management services, caregiver resources, energy assistance, health education resources and legal services. The two affected congregate meal sites are located in the Diamond Springs and Pollock Pines areas.

The I&A CCM Program will provide needs assessment, eligibility determination for appropriate community-based programs, service arrangement and more extensive care coordination that exceeds standard I&A follow-up. Short-term respite care and durable medical equipment will also be available. The short-term CCM Program will be available to eligible individuals throughout El Dorado County.

C) Describe how your agency will use Recovery Act funds to meet the short-term and long-term economic and employment needs of individuals, families and communities.

The CSBG Recovery Act funds will be used to retain program staff in the Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program and to develop the I&A CCM Program. A 1.0 FTE Cook and a 0.81 FTE Meal Site Coordinator will be retained in the Senior Nutrition Program. Loss of local over-match funding would have resulted in the closure of two congregate meal sites in El Dorado County in FY 10-11, which would have resulted in the reduction in force of these positions at that time. CSBG ARRA funds will be used to cover salaries, facility lease and direct meal preparation and service costs for the congregate meal sites in Diamond Springs and Pollock Pines, two communities with relatively large senior populations, providing nutritious meals for seniors, many of whom are on limited incomes, and alleviating the burden of responsibility on their extended families.

0.35 FTE Housing Program Coordinator and 1.6 FTE Program Assistant positions will be retained to develop a short-term Care Coordination and Monitoring (CCM) Program for senior citizens and adults with disabilities. Short-term CCM will provide needs assessment, eligibility determination for appropriate community-based programs, service arrangement and more extensive care coordination that exceeds standard I&A follow-up. Short-term respite care and durable medical equipment will also be provided when indicated. CCM will promote stabilization and help clients retain their independence to the extent possible, avoiding more costly and/or inappropriate institutionalization.

D) Provide a description of how linkages will be developed to fill identified gaps in services, through the provision of information, referrals, case management and follow up consultations.

Referrals are made to other DHS and community resources such as Adult Protective Services, case management services, caregiver resources, energy assistance, health education resources and legal services. The Title IIIB Information & Assistance (I&A) Program makes referrals to community agencies to promote independence among the vulnerable and at-risk populations of the County. The Title IIIB Information & Assistance Program has responsibility for providing a primary focus one-stop information service, limiting the need for clients to conduct multiple telephone inquiries or use limited transportation resources. This service accommodates clients by quickly addressing their concerns and limiting the time required for them to access program services. The Title IIIB Information & Assistance Program provides referrals to appropriate agency and community programs and provides follow-up to evaluate if services are in place.

The I&A CCM Program will provide senior citizens and adults with disabilities with services lost due to elimination of the State Community Based Services Program (CBSP) Linkages funding. Short-term Care Coordination and Monitoring is a supportive service that will be provided on a limited basis to individuals either awaiting or transitioning from formal care management services or to individuals who require more extensive care coordination that exceeds standard I&A follow-up.

E) Provide a description of how Recovery funds will be coordinated with other public and private resources, to avoid duplication and/or supplanting.

DHS has established partnerships and collaborations and coordinates services with a wide array of other organizations serving senior and low-income residents of the County, including charitable groups, community organizations, religious organizations, governmental and other social services programs to assure the effective delivery of services to low-income individuals and to avoid duplication of services. By providing services at several locations throughout the County, many utilizing volunteers, links are established among residents, community organizations and local government. The CAA and DHS participate in a cross-referral system that facilitates timely access to and provision of appropriate services to low-income residents county-wide. The CAA also partners with numerous private-sector and charitable organizations, such as the Salvation Army, Women's Centers, HELP (Housing Emergency Lodging Program), the El Dorado Community Foundation, local food closets, church groups and volunteer organizations that assist clients to reduce the conditions of poverty and to meet emergency needs, as well as to identify planning needs, gaps in service and service delivery concerns.

F) Provide a description of how the funds will be used to support innovative community and neighborhood based initiatives related to the purposes of the Recovery Act, which promotes food, housing, health services and employment-related services and activities.

Through the Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program, congregate meals are provided to senior citizens 60 years and older Monday through Friday regardless of income. At-risk seniors are encouraged to access the Senior Nutrition Program's home-delivered meals or congregate meal sites. DHS and the Senior Nutrition Program also provide information, outreach and referral to available food resources throughout the County. Congregate meal sites offer an opportunity for recipients to access information and assistance about other community support services. Program staff make referrals to other DHS and community resources including housing assistance, health services and employment-related services.

The I&A CCM Program will provide short-term care coordination and monitoring, providing needs assessment, eligibility determination for appropriate community-based programs, service arrangement and more extensive care coordination that exceeds Title IIIB Information & Assistance Program follow-up. The Title IIIB Information & Assistance Program provides referrals to appropriate agency and community programs and conducts follow-up to confirm receipt of services and evaluate the success of said services. This helps clients access critical food, health and employment-related services, including many programs administered by DHS such as Food Stamps, Medi-Cal, Housing Choice Voucher Program, Housing Rehabilitation Program, CalWORKs, Workforce Investment Act programs and the One Stop Employment Resource Centers.

G) Provide a description of the community-needs assessment (which may be coordinated with community-needs assessments conducted for other programs).

The following mechanisms are used to identify and assess the needs and problems of the low-income population of El Dorado County: community service needs identified by the Community Action Council (advisory council to the CAA) and the Commission on Aging (Advisory Council to the Area Agency on Aging), federal, state and local demographic data, the El Dorado Community Foundation 2007 Older Adult Research Project, planning sessions with advisory groups, community forums, and public hearings.

H) Provide a description of the service delivery system for benefit enrollment coordination activities for purposes of identifying and enrolling eligible individuals and families in Federal, State, and local benefit programs. Include a description of the geographical area served and a listing of sub-grantees provided the services and service areas.

El Dorado County is located in the Sierra Nevada Mountain Range between Sacramento and the State of Nevada and covers approximately 1,710 square miles. Within DHS, the Title IIIB Information and Assistance Program assists low-income individuals with achieving access to Medi-Cat, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and Food Stamps and other benefit programs. Congregate meal recipients needing assistance with benefit enrollment condination activities would be referred by staff to the Title IIIB Information and Assistance Program. All programs under the umbrella of the CAA and DHS assist County individuals and families to access all Federal, State and local benefit programs for which they are eligible. The I&A CCM Program will assist individuals requiring additional care coordination and monitoring services not provided through Title IIIB Information & Assistance.

J) Describe your education and outreach projects to advertise and market the Recovery Act services and outcomes.

DHS has expanded outreach efforts for other Recovery Act services, will initiate outreach specific to the I&A CCM Program and will further expand current outreach efforts for the Title IIIC Senior Nutrition Program to conduct extensive outreach in EI Dorado County to ensure compliance with the CSBG Recovery Act. This will be accomplished by targeting low-income clients through outlets such as local newspapers, radio, media, faith-based organizations, community fairs and other programs serving low-income residents. The Department of Human Services has a comprehensive network established to provide outreach to targeted populations.

A) Describe how your agency has/will establish a mutual referral service agreement with your local energy provider to ensure that clients receive services that support their progress towards achieving self-sufficiency.

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and Weatherization/DOE Programs, as well as ARRA DOE WAP, are administered by the El Dorado County Department of Human Services, as is the CSBG funding. The regular CSBG allocation supports DHS administration to support all senior and low-income direct service programs, including LIHEAP and DOE Weatherization programs to mitigate the high cost of energy consumption for low-income, senior and disabled households throughout the County. Mutual referral occurs Department-wide among all programs serving low-income clients, including the Senior Nutrition Program and the Information and Assistance Program.

B) Describe the activities your agency will conduct to actively coordinate with the local energy program in employment training and job placement of clients. When clients access the LIHEAP and DHS services in Placerville and South Lake Tahoe, information is available regarding CalWORKs, the Workforce investment Act Program and the OneStop Employment Resource Center. As appropriate, clients applying for services are also referred to available employment services.
