	There were 964 individuals served for domestic violence services. 71% were between the ages of 25 - 59. 3.5% were under 18; 7% were between the ages of 18-24. 7% were also over 60 years of age. 55% identified as of Caucasian decent. 10% identified as Latino/a. 25% declined to state a racial				
	identity. The remaining 10% of clients identified as Native American, African American, Pacific Islander, or other. Of the clients that stated the number of dependents in their household, 23%				
	didn't have dependents, 32% had one dependent, 27% had two dependents, and 18% had 3 or more dependents. Of the clients that stated a monthly income, 70% made less than \$1,500 a month.
