- A 24 hours a day, seven days a week telephone hotline for crisis calls.
- Temporary housing and food facilities.
- Psychological support and peer counseling provided in accordance with Section 1037.1 of the Evidence Code.
- Referrals to existing services in the community.
- A drop-in center that operates during normal business hours to assist victims of domestic violence who have a need for support services.
- Arrangements for school age children to continue their education during their state at the domestic violence shelter-based program.
- Emergency transportation as feasible.

In accordance with Section 18295, to the extent possible, and in conjunction with already existing community services, the domestic violence shelter-based program shall also provide a method of obtaining medical care, legal assistance, psychological support and counseling, and information regarding other available social services.

<p>There were 1,089 individuals were provided domestic violence services. Of these, 2% were under 18, 5% were between the ages of 18-24, 72% were between the ages of 25 – 59, 7% were over 60 years of age, and the remaining 14% declined to state; 59% identified as of Caucasian, 9% identified as Hispanic, 24% declined to state., and the remaining 8% of clients identified as Native American, African American, Pacific Islander, or Biracial/Multiracial/Other. 16% did not have dependents, 18% had one dependent, 16% had two dependents, and 11% had 3 or more dependents, and the remaining 39% declined to state. When asked to report a monthly income, 31% made less than \$1,500 a month, 19% made more than \$1,500, and 49% left the question blank.</p>
