It started where American River Conservancy posted a sign of their acquisition of 249 acres that doubled the size of the Marshall Gold Discovery State Park. Ben Cunha was under \$10 million bail bond, same as the King Fire arsonist, for starting fires throughout EDC. But because his family members were respected firefighters, the incident received little attention and Ben was shipped out of state to cover up the media embarrassment generated by that scandal. Not surprisingly, Andy suddenly adjourned the meeting before George could respond.

That's when Wendy Thomas remarked, "Sue Novasel exercised her First Amendment rights to free speech this morning." I responded, but John Hidahl interrupted and said, "This is no time for back and forth." Chairman Hidahl violated my First Amendment rights as the Brown Act Rights of the Public explicitly states:

"Care must be given to avoid violating the speech rights of speakers by suppressing opinions relevant to the business of the body. As such, members of the public have broad constitutional rights to comment on any subject relating to the business of the governmental body.

Any attempt to restrict the content of such speech must be narrowly tailored to effectuate a compelling state interest. Specifically the courts found that policies that prohibited members of the public from criticizing school district employees were unconstitutional. (Leventhal v. Vista Unified School Dist. And Baca v. Moreno Valley Unified School District.) These decisions found that prohibiting critical comments was a form of viewpoint discrimination and that such a prohibition promoted discussion artificially geared toward praising (and maintaining) the status quo, thereby foreclosing meaningful public dialog. (Dialog means to "converse back and forth.")

No action or discussion shall be undertaken on any item not appearing on the posted agenda, except that members of a legislative body or its staff may respond to statements made or questions posed by persons exercising their public testimony rights under Section 5954.3.

A fire that ignited around 4 p.m. on Sunday near Mt. Murphy and Bayne roads burned 80 acres before full containment was achieved four hours later.

The fire burned around both sides of Mt. Murphy, said Terry Armstrong, a graphics coordinator with the Village Courier magazine who observed the fire from Marshall Gold Discovery State Historic Park. Quite a few spectators watched as three helicopters repeatedly took turns dunking their 600-gallon buckets into the American River, Armstrong said.

The Bayne Fire, as it was dubbed, required 19 engines, five hand crews, five aircraft, two dozers and 160 fire personnel to extinguish, said Cal Fire spokesmar Tobic Editor Co.

Sandy Mancus was inside her home on top of Mt. Murphy

when she saw the fire creeping up the west and south slopes of her property toward the house. Sandy and her husband Lawrence have owned the 20acre lot, initially as part of a much larger parcet, for 28 years, is defended against fire due to and have seen the surrounding hillside burn four times during

that period. But this is the first fire they've experienced as a resident, Mancus said. They have lived in the house on top of the hill for the last two years.

The south side of the property diligent clearing, and the house itself, made of stucco with a tile roof, is surrounded by plenty of

stonework and cement. "But it's' not indestructible," Mancus said. The west side of the property, 17 with its tall trees and rough terrain making clearing difficult, caused the couple considerable. concern.

"It was very, very frightening," she said.

With the fire dangerously close to several homes, the El-Dorado Sheriff's Department took no chances by calling for evacuations in the area, sheriff? spokesman Lt. Kevin House said. Most of the fire had been put down by 6:30, when residents were allowed to return home.

"Except for needing some airing out, the house is fine," Mancus said.

Convicted arsonist Cunha arrested in stolen gun plot

Former local firefighter Ben Cunha, who was convicted less than nine months ago for arson, was arrested last week on suspicion of arranging a deal to sell stolen firearms.

Because of his prior record, an El Dorado County judge set his bail at \$10 million.

Placerville police say three men, at least one an acquaintance of Cunha's, burglarized a home the week of Nov. 23, and stole two guns.

Cunha, 26, while not involved in the burglary, allegedly

told a friend about the stolen guns for sale, and orchestrated the transaction.

"Ben set up the sale of the guns," said Placerville police Sgt. Kim Nida. "He was in possession of the weapons prior to us contacting him. He'd been out shooting that day, and handled the weapons prior to the sale."

Timothy Nahhas, 19, Nathan Picarello, 18, and Mathew Trudeau, 21, were arrested on suspicion of committing the burglary at a Placerville home.

Eric Summer, 25, was arrested for on suspicion of purchasing the stolen property from the men.

Nida said a citizen advised police that the guns were being sold, and gave police information about who was involved. Officers got a search warrant, and ultimately found the guns in a field near Cunha's house, said Nida.

"The suspects found out we were doing an investigation and hid the guns from us," said Nida.

At Cunha's arraignment Monday, Judge Douglas Phimister said he set the bail at \$10 million because Cunha "is a flight risk based on his prior case."

In March Cunha was convicted of starting three fires throughout the county, including one to forest land near Sand Ridge Road that consumed 19 acres.

He was sentenced to a year in jail, and was given credit for the time he served in jail before his plea deal.

Nida said Monday, "The big thing is that we got the guns off the street."

Mt. Murphy fire quickly contained by crews

COLOMA — A 30-plus acre wildland fire burned through Coloma Valley Thursday night.

The fire off Mt. Murphy Road began about 6:45 p.m., and was contained about 8:15 p.m., according to Cal Fire spokesman Chris Anthony.

There were no injuries, and no structures were damaged in the fire, said Anthony.

Its cause is still under investigation.

"It was a good stop because the first responders thought it might go to well over 100 acres," Anthony said.

"There's a lot of potential for fires in that area because of the fuels on Mt. Murphy, and the steepness of the terrain. It's one of those areas that from an initial attack standpoint you have to get into really quickly, and hit the fire really hard in order to mitigate the incident as fast as you can," he said.

A camper at Coloma Resort noticed the smoke and called authorities, Anthony said.

Two air tankers, two heli-

copters and multiple fire engines were used to extinguish the fire.

El Dorado County Fire and several other agencies assisted.

Logtown fire

Another fire Thursday night burned down an outbuilding in Logtown near El Dorado.

A neighbor was able to contain some of the fire before firefighters arrived.

Diamond Springs Fire Department contained the remainder of the fire late Thursday night.

DA changes strategy in Cunha case

Third generation firefighter and convicted arsonist Ben Cunha still faces prison for allegedly arranging a deal to sell stolen firearms last December.

But the El Dorado County district attorney has dropped the main charges against him.

"We're proceeding with a probation violation charge,

but dismissed the pending charges against him. It's our expectation that the court will send him to prison for the probation violation," said deputy district attorney Joe Alexander.

"There isn't any new fact or information that made me think we can't prove these charges beyond a reasonable doubt. We simply view this as the most economical and judicious way of removing him from the community, which is in the community's best interest," Alexander said.

Cunha, 26, was convicted of arson one year ago, and was given a suspended prison sentence as part of his plea deal. His arrest in December may have violated the terms of his probation, thus putting him in jeopardy of serving prison time.

He reportedly faces a sixyear prison sentence. In the current case, he was charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, and receiving stolen property.

"The probation violation is based on the same facts and circumstances, but survives independent of what happens with the other charges. It's within our discretion to do that," Alexander said.

Cunha, a former local volunteer firefighter, was convicted of starting three fires throughout the county, including one that burned 19 acres near Sand Ridge Road in south county.

He also set fire to Big Cut Road in Placerville, and to timber land at Mosquito Road in Placerville.

He was sentenced to a year in jail, and was given credit for the time he served before agreeing to the plea deal.

In December, Cunha and four men were arrested after two guns were reportedly taken from a Placerville home.

Cunha, while not involved in the burglary, arranged adeal to sell the guns, said Placerville police.

Nathan Picarello, 19, and Mathew Trudeau, 22, were arrested on suspicion of burglarizing the home. Eric Summer, 25, was

arrested on suspicion of buying the stolen guns.

Trudeau was sentenced in December to 270 days in jail after pleading to first degree burglary.

Picarello was sentenced in December to a year in jail after pleading to a similar burglary charge.

Nahas has reportedly agreed to a plea deal, but the details of the deal were unclear at press time.

I would like to call your attention to a continuing issue here in El Dorado County.

Our county is primarily a rural one. And during fire season, we are a great big tinder box. Yet, careless people continue to toss their cigarette butts out their car windows!

But I digress.

On July 1st 2007, a fire was started at the base of My Murphy in Coloma, just above the Troublemaker Rapids. It started on newly "aquired" American River Conservancy land and attached to the Marshall Gold Discovery Park

Land that is now open to The Public. This land is in challenging terrain and surrounded by steep grassland that becomes very dry in summer.

All it takes is a hot catalytic converter or a cig butt, and WHOOSH! You have a wildland fire. There is a big new sign on this land that says the conservancy is supposed to protect this land, but to date, no plans or facilities nor staff have been implemented to help keep the area safe. 
We all would appreciate your attention, and investigation, into this matter, as we alone cannot get anyone's attention.

Former firefighter sentenced

SACRAMENTO — Former firefighter and Placerville resident Benjamin Cunha, 33, was recently sentenced to five years in prison for arson, U.S. Attorney Benjamin B. Wagner announced. In addition, United States District Judge John A. Mendez ordered Cunha to pay \$246,862 in restitution to Cal Fire.

According to court documents, Cunha, a former Cal Fire firefighter, admitted to setting at least 30 wildland fires during the summers of 2006 and 2007. Two of these fires burned onto federal land. Cunha indicated that his motivation for setting the fires was to overcome boredom, to earn overtime pay for fighting the fires and to impress his peers.

"As he admitted in his plea agreement, this defendant set a multitude of fires with a callous disregard for the danger to life and property that he was inflicting," said Wagner. "(This) sentence is a just result that takes a serial arsonist off the streets."

"Benjamin Cunha set over 30 fires in El Dorado and Amador counties. ATF worked with our local partners and utilized several resources to perfect an investigation for federal prosecution," Special Agent in Charge Jill A. Snyder said. "Cunha had no consideration for Cal Fire firefighters' safety when he set the fires, placing them in grave danger during the fire suppression efforts."

On Oct. 6, 2015, Cunha pleaded guilty to one count of arson for the July 6, 2007, Mine Fire, a vegetation fire that burned approximately 80 acres, including federally owned land. Cunha admitted to using a distinctive time-delay incendiary device, which he had also used to start many of his other fires.

This case was the product of an investigation by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, with assistance from Cal Fire. Assistant U.S. Attorneys William S. Wong and Audrey B. Hemesath prosecuted the case.
